English 9 Honors Curriculum Guide

Pacing Guide:

English 9 Honors is a full year course that meets on a rotating basis for three (3) 55-minute blocks and one (1) 40-minute block for every five (5) day cycle.

Narrative Writing-should be reviewed and assessed over the course of 6 weeks-assessment

The Research Paper- 8 weeks-the paper is the assessment

Career Project-1 week-the project is the assessment
