Tips about Teacher Recommendations

Teacher recommendations should come from a teacher in an academic subject (not arts classes) because they help colleges understand how you will perform in their classrooms. The teacher provides insight into why your grade is what it is, how you interact with students and teachers, and how you approach assignments, while also shining light on your personality.

Which teachers should you ask?

When deciding which teachers to select for recommendations, be sure to consider who will be your strongest advocate. Think about teachers who fit the following criteria:

- Teacher with whom you have a good relationship
- Teacher who taught you relatively recently
- Teacher who taught classes in which you were successful (this doesn't always
 mean you got a high grade...maybe you achieved a grade that's not as impressive
 as your other grades, but you are proud of your achievement and it reflected your
 work ethic, perseverance, study habits, passion, etc.)
- Teacher that taught you in more than one class or also worked with you in a club or activity
- Teacher who teaches subjects related to one of your future fields of study
- Teachers from different departments (i.e. humanities & sciences)

You can also read the comments your teacher put on your report cards and progress reports. There might be some good nuggets worked into those comments that will help you gain some clarity on how the teacher might advocate for you in a letter of recommendation.

When and How Do You Ask?

If you have some good options from junior year and want to request a letter on the front end of the summer, email the teacher and ask to chat briefly over Zoom. If you prefer to wait until your senior year when you have more certainty about who your teachers will be and how many recommendations you need, that also works. You have probably spoken with your college counselor about this already, but feel free to revisit this topic with us at any time. We would be happy to help you sort through your options. We will walk you through the logistics of how the letters actually make it to colleges sometime in the early fall.
