

DEADLINE: College Essay Draft is Due!

Saturday, August 1 is the deadline to submit a draft of your college essay to your college counselor. Please email as a Google document. The college counselors will read the essays during the month of August with the goal of getting you feedback before the start of the school year. If you have not prepared a draft yet, please email your college counselor and give an estimated date of when you plan to submit.

August 1 is also the day when the Common Application goes live for this year's admission cycle.⁻ When you have a chance, login to your Common Application account to update your information, add the colleges where you are planning to apply, and look at the requirements for each school.

STANDARDIZED TESTING UPDATE

SAT's at Thayer

Because the coronavirus outbreak has impeded your ability to take standardized tests, Thayer has arranged to offer the SAT on two different Wednesdays this fall: September 23 and October 14. This opportunity is for Thayer seniors only, and you will have the option of taking one or both of these exams. These SAT's will not include the optional essay. You will register for the exams through Thayer, not your College Board account. If you have already registered for another SAT this fall and would like to switch to one of the Thayer test days, you can cancel that registration and be reimbursed by contacting the College Board directly. You could also speak to them about moving your registration to a later national testing date (one not offered at Thayer). Registration and payment for Thayer's SAT is separate and will be handled through the Business Office.

ACT Registration

Registration for the ACT testing dates in the fall opened on April 27, but their website could not handle the traffic so the ACT closed down their registration portal. At the time of this Virtual Brickyard publication, the ACT states that they hope to resolve the technical difficulties and re-open the registration platform on Monday, August 3. The registration deadline for the ACT exams offered on September 12, 13, and 19 is August 14.

Do you wish to share anything on this topic? Please use this space to describe how these events impacted you. This question will be optional and will appear in the Additional Information section of the application. The response length will be limited to 250 words."

SPOTLIGHT ON MAJORS: Communications

With the pandemic trapping us in our homes for many months, our main lines of communication with the broader world have mainly been through our computers, TV's, and mobile devices. The importance of communications, in its multiple forms, has become increasingly evident during this global crisis. And in an era when we question the source and veracity of our news and information, the need for reliable and trustworthy communications sources has become even more critical. The study of communications in college has evolved significantly in the past decades in an effort to keep pace with the fast-changing media landscape. This academic field of study emphasizes how we communicate through a variety of applications: (1) Journalism, electronic media, TV & radio broadcasting, and film production; (2) Politics and public administration; (3) Global and inter-cultural communications; (4) Business and corporate communications, marketing, advertising, and public relations.

Communications majors develop analytical skills and proficiency in comprehension, analysis, writing, and speaking, enabling them to become critical thinkers and problem solvers. Communication majors benefit from a well-rounded liberal arts education, but they also develop practical experience to be effective communicators in a host of career fields through multiple platforms. As a communications major, you will take courses in research strategies, theory, rhetoric, public speaking, writing, and journalism/media.

Communications programs vary from school to school, so look at each of the school's philosophies, core requirements, and specializations. An education in communications will blend theory-based courses with skill-based and experiential learning. Most institutions will require foundational communications courses, introducing you to the field and exposing you to different research methodologies, media outlets, and writing skills. You will likely become familiar with mass communication, interpersonal communication, communication technology, and political and legal communication. Most programs should also give you the opportunity to concentrate in a communications major, developing specialized skills and experience in your areas of interest. A communications major is versatile, granting students access to a wide variety of professions. Communication majors often work in advertising, business, education, film and TV production, government and politics, healthcare, human resources, international relations, journalism, law, marketing, public relations, social media, social work, writing and editing.
