ACTIVITY PASSES FOR HOME HIGH SCHOOL SPORTING EVENTS WILL ONLY BE AVAILABLE ELECTRONICALLY THROUGH GOFAN.

All versions of the activity passes including student and adult passes as well as punch passes are available for purchase.

Passes will grant admittance to all regular season home athletic events. Passes do not grant admittance to section or state tournament play. An adult activity pass will still admit one adult and up to two elementary-aged students.

REFUND POLICY:

Students who are cut or quit from the sport or activity are subject to the following refund guidelines:

- 1. During the first 2 weeks of the season -100% Refund
- 2. After the first 2 weeks, within the first 25% of the season 75% Refund
- 3. Within the first 25%-50% of the season -50% Refund
- 4. After 50% of the Season No Refund
- Refunds must be requested in writing and submitted to the Activities Office and must be received by the end of that sport's season. A link to the refund forms are available online at www.faribaultfalcons.com/documents
- Refunds will only be processed when all equipment/school materials have been turned in and the student has been cleared by the coach/advisor.
- Administration reserves the right to deny a refund for extenuating circumstances (property damage, etc)

IPAD PROTECTION PLAN NEW FEE FOR 2020-2021 SCHOOL YEAR

Faribault Public Schools recognizes that the implementation of a 1:1 technology learning initiative requires a need to protect the investment by both the district and families. Faribault Public Schools is offering an iPad Protection Plan to help cover the cost of accidental breakage or damage. Enrollment in the plan is optional.

This year with the implementation of ipads at our elementary schools we are offering participation into the program at an annual payment of \$10.00 for all students in grades K-12. BUS INFORMATION

If you are new to the Faribault Public Schools, if you've moved, have changes to your daycare or added daycare, or changed schools, please call Faribault Transportation at 334-5121 so we can ensure that your child is on the correct bus route. Busing eligibility includes K-8 public and parochial students who live one mile or further from school, grade 9-12 students who live two or more miles from school and school-aged handicapped students. Also eligible are students in grades K-3 who have hazardous crossings. Call 333-6000 if you have questions regarding your busing eligibility.

BUSING GUIDELINES:

- Students in K-1 who are eligible for bus transportation will receive one bus identification card in August. This card will include the student's name, address, school, and grade so they can easily be identified by supervisors and bus drivers.
- If a student moves or loses his/her identification card, parents can make a card with the student's information and attach it to the students back pack.
- Students must ride the assigned bus to and from School; there are no exceptions. Bus stops are established by school district administration.
- Please remember, school bus transportation is a privilege, not a right.
- Families are required to designate one pick-up site in the morning (am) and one drop-off site in the evening (pm).



- Students will be transported to those sites only.
- Requests to ride different buses or to get off at unassigned addresses make it difficult for students, teachers, parents, and Faribault Transportation to know where each child is and should be. Seats are often unavailable for students attempting to ride unassigned buses; and each bus must adhere to a legal load count. Consistency in ridership helps our bus drivers to get to know each student on his/her bus. This requirement also helps avoid miscommunication and confusion, and ensures the safety of all riders.

The decision to keep schools open or closed during winter weather is made with the well being and safety of our students and families in mind. We take into consideration student's time outside walking to school or waiting at the bus stop.

The decision to delay, release early or close schools is made from weighing several factors:

- If road conditions and bus travel is unsafe roads are driven and checked by bus company and school personnel during inclement weather.
- Wind chill temperatures
- Excessive snow accumulations

During winter season, always be sure to dress your child warmly for the bus stop or the walk to school. Buses may occasionally be delayed with bus pickup times due to weather conditions and bus stops may need to be modified depending on road conditions in your area.

Decisions to close or delay schools will be made as soon as possible. Please look for announcements the day before a winter storm or by 6:00am the day of the closing or delay of school. Please refrain from calling the schools and check the notification sources on page 7.

Faribault High School Assistant Principal Shawn Peck isn't one to use the pronoun "I" very often. He prefers the word "we."

That's one of many reasons why FHS Principal Jamie Bente says he nominated Peck for the Assistant High School Principal of the Year award. Earlier this week, Peck learned the Minnesota Association of Secondary School Principals (MASSP) selected him for the award in the Southeast Minnesota division.

"It was certainly unexpected," said Peck. "I did not see it coming at all. Once I had a chance to reflect, it really is a great honor because it speaks to the tremendous work being done at the high school ... I think it's a representation of the work people are doing, and I think people are taking note of some of the things that are happening."

Bente said the district is fortunate to have Peck on its team, as he delivers beyond what his job requires of him. In particular, Bente noted Peck's vision for equity in the FHS building and his vision for restorative practices have both transformed the way students' needs are handled at the high school.

"As a person, as a friend of his, they don't come much better than Shawn Peck," said Bente. "His caring and passion for the education of students is second to none. He's an amazing guy who cares about students and their learning."

If you ask Peck, it's the teachers and supporting staff that deserve the accolades. He considers

the high school and the district's success a team effort and said he loves going to work with people who share the common vision of creating a positive school experience for students.

He's proud of the student voices club, which gives teenagers a say in what happens in the district, and parent groups that also accept new viewpoints and perspectives.

Peck also commends the district for changing its climate to a more positive one in a short time. He believes it's contributed to a drop in administrative referrals and suspensions.

"Faribault Public Schools is not afraid to be bold and do some bold things if we feel like it's going to support students," said Peck. "Moving from a six-period to a seven-period day was a bold move, but the community supported it. Some schools may want to maintain the status quo, but Faribault Public Schools is not one of them."

Reflecting on his own high school experience in Chippewa Falls, Wisconsin, Peck said he had a lot of influential teachers. His social studies teacher, Mr. Ekern, had a unique impact on him that put him on the path to becoming a social studies teacher himself.

" ... When I think about why I liked him and his class so much, it had less to do with the curriculum but the fact that he liked me and saw something in me that I didn't see in myself," said Peck.

Believing each student who walks through the doors of FHS has greatness inside of them, Peck said he follows his former social studies teacher's example of pointing out skills students may not recognize in themselves.

"For me, it's always just been about being around young people and helping them figure out who they are, figure out what their strengths are, helping them find their way, helping them find their purpose," said Peck. "That's never really changed ... I've always been focused on the people we serve. I just find a lot of purpose in that and I've really enjoyed that."



AP SAGE RECEIVES LEADERSHIP AWARD

Faribault High School assistant principal Joe Sage has been selected by Minnesota Campus Compact as a recipient of the 2020 Presidents' Engaged Campus Award for his commitment to civic responsibility and community leadership. Now in its sixth year, Falcons for Change is still growing and finding new ways to help those in need.

This year 222 students are part of the community service club at Faribault Middle School. The club has a simple yet ambitious goal: to provide volunteer service to those who need it, in the school, in the community and throughout the world.

Due to its size, the group meets just once at the start of the school year. From there, students and advisers stay in contact online using Schoology. Students can either sign up for activities, such as visiting residents at Pleasant Manor, working with younger students at McKinley Early Childhood Center or assisting adult English language learners at the Faribault Education Center, or they can present their own ideas for projects. Advisers then help them work out the details and come up with the materials they need.

Some of this year's projects include making care packages for military families and cancer center patients, collecting canned foods for the Faribault Food Shelf, making blankets for patients at the children's hospital, and making pillows for residents at Ruth's House.

"The students bring forward the ideas themselves. It really gives them an opportunity to develop leadership skills while making a difference in their community," Falcons for Change adviser April Coppess said. "The students we have in Falcons for Change are the best leaders we have in the school. They are super passionate about helping others and other kids see that and want to be a part of it."

Sixth-grader Fatumo Ahmed signed up because she wanted to help people and she wanted to make new friends. Now she's learning how to make pillows and blankets while working closely with classmates. She's

excited to deliver the pillows to Ruth's House.

Another sixth-grader, Kaylie Bertram, said she feels bad for kids who are stuck in drab hospital rooms. So she decided to make colorful blankets that will be delivered to the children's hospitals in the Twin Cities.

"I wanted them to have vibrant colors in their rooms, not just boring white sheets," Bertram said.

Eighth-grader Zuhur Abdullahi signed up for Falcons for Change at the start of sixth grade because her cousin told her it would be fun. Now she's working on care packages that will go to patients at the District One Cancer Center.

Eighth-graders Lupita Rodriguez, Morgan Borchert and Ahliyah Reyes have three projects keeping them busy. To raise funds for their projects in support of Gillette Children's Hospital, Hope Center and Ruth's House, they held a fundraiser on Unity Day and worked in the concession stand at basketball games.

"It makes you feel good to make people happy," Borchert said. "When people have gone through so much, you want to make them smile and brighten their day."

"It feels good to make a difference," Reyes added. "Even if it's just one person at a time, you can change their world."

Music students solo with YouTube presence during quarantine

Sixth-grader Brandon Petricka never performed a saxophone solo before a live audience before, but now, he's among 25 Faribault Public Schools music students with a YouTube presence.

An online playlist called "Songs for Souls," featuring the musical talents of Faribault Middle School and Faribault High School students, has been shared with local senior centers and nursing homes during the pandemic.

Said Brandon, "I feel good about that."

For his solo, Brandon chose to play "The Pink Panther" and recorded a video of his performance from his home. It took a few takes to get it right, but he said he feels great about the finished video.

Brandon's sister Stacie, an eighth-grader at Faribault Middle School, performed a cello solo as part of the community music project. She chose to record herself playing "Hallelujah," a song she never before played for an audience. Although she's performed duets in the past, she preferred playing alone because she didn't need to coordinate practice times with anyone else.

"I'm pretty proud of [my solo], and I'm glad I'm brightening up someone's day so they can enjoy it too," said Stacie.

Elizabeth Barron, Faribault Middle School band director and chair of the middle school music department, collaborated with other music directors in the district to create "Songs for Souls" after schools closed in response to COVID-19.

"At the beginning of distance learning, we brainstormed what we want students to get

out of this time," said Barron. "... We want students to understand the power music can have in connecting people together, even from a distance."

Band, choir and orchestra students selected songs of their own choosing to sing or play for their solo contributions and then rehearsed their performances on their own time. Students then sent their draft recordings to their music directors for evaluation, and the final recordings were added to the YouTube channel. About 25 solos are included in the playlist, among them pieces featuring clarinet, euphonium, violin, flute, piano and more.

Apart from allowing music students the chance to grow in their skills, Barron said "Songs for Souls" is a creative way to let community members know someone cares and wants to offer support for them. Students have expressed interest in performing more solos for the playlist through the remainder of the school year. Since band, choir and orchestra concerts have been cancelled, the project also gives students an another way to show what they've learned. Stacie said she was thankful and excited about performing for the "Songs for Souls" playlist. Apart from this project, she's continued practicing her cello by using apps like SmartMusic since schools closed.

Having a video on YouTube "feels great," said Brandon, but he also misses being at band class.

"It's very different to not see your friends around and not seeing the teacher," he said.

BEST OF 2019-20 FEATURE FHS opens The Nest, a store that provides necessities for students

When Faribault High School Falcons come together to build a nest, the result is far from a structure made of twigs.

The Nest, a new school store located in an infrequently used study room, is an idea two FHS students conceptualized just before the 2018-19 school year. Two more students, with the help of a teacher, brought the project to fruition throughout the past nine months. Now, as the school year wraps up, a whole team of Falcons prepares to open the doors to The Nest this fall.

"We have no idea where it's going to go," said FHS teacher Kaylee Wiens, who helped supervise the project. "Who knows what it will expand into."

According to Wiens, students at the Faribault elementary schools take clothes and necessities from closet spaces at each of the schools. Creating a safe space for teens to take what they need, she said, presented itself as more of a challenge. At The Nest, which recently began accepting donations, students may grab items in privacy.

In a business class, sophomore Bennett Wolff researched a store used in the Shakopee High School where students grab the things they need throughout the day. That includes items such as school spirit attire, notebooks, pencils, deodorant and socks. Wolff saw a need for a store like that at FHS, where she recognized that a number of students are unable to afford some of those supplies, clothes and toiletries.

Excited about her idea, Wolff told friend and classmate Skylenn Hunt about the Shakopee High School store. The pair brought the idea to Dean of Students Joe Sage, who quickly approved the plan. He previously worked for the Shakopee School District and knew about that store's success.

Wiens, who teaches Family and Consumer

Sciences (FACS), soon hopped on board after Sage sought assistance from an interior design perspective. Wiens and two of her students, junior Carly Doyle and senior Evie Nigon, put their heads together to decide on furniture, layout and colors to incorporate into The Nest.

"I think the three of us working together, it was our goal to get it at least ready for next year," said Nigon, who recently graduated. "... I think my work's been completed."

Having served as president of The Falcon Project, the club that helped make The Nest possible, Nigon passes the torch to Doyle, a rising senior.

"I wanted to get a good footing on the ground to get things to take off," said Doyle.

Making The Nest look just right took "a lot of trial and error," according to Doyle. The design trio, plus Hunt and Wolff, initially expected the school store to open halfway through the 2018-19 school year. Instead, the project timeline lasted from last fall to this spring.

"It's always easy to underestimate how long a project will take," said Wiens. "... Once we settled on furniture, it fell into place."

Nigon, Doyle and Wiens took the concept of the school store at Shakopee High School and "Falcon-ized" it to fit the FHS demographic. They painted twigs and leaves on the walls, which they coated with gray paint. Doyle and Nigon also painted a green arrow on the wall, welcoming students into The Nest. White shelves create an enclosed space that separates The Nest from a study area of the classroom.

One main objective of The Nest is to increase students' participation, both as volunteers and as FHS Falcons in general. Wiens noted many students who don't participate in school spirit weeks, like Homecoming, miss out because they don't own Falcon attire. Likewise, If students find formal wear at the Nest, it may increase their interest in attending prom or the Sadie Hawkins Dance, and help them feel more a part of the school community. The Faribault Booster Club even made a donation to The Nest due to its efforts to increase school spirit.

To become involved with The Nest, Wiens invites students to join The Falcon Project, which she advises.

"Kids will come restock [the shelves] and make sure something isn't vandalized," said Hunt.

Unlike a traditional store, The Nest operates on an honor system and requires no payment. Students may take whatever they want and need throughout the day without other students watching them "shop."

"It feels so cool because it's going to be here for years and years," said Hunt.

Added Wolff: "I think kids will feel at home [at The Nest]."

Early Childhood Special Education Program (ECSE)

Faribault Public School's concern for children doesn't begin in kindergarten and end at graduation. Our teachers are on hand to work with children who need additional developmental and educational help from birth through age

21. This program is designed to meet the developmental needs of our youngest learners. Eligible children are those with developmental delays or with a certain diagnosed physical or mental conditions or disorders that results in a delay.

Infant and Toddler

Early Intervention services for children birth to three years old are provided within the child's natural environments. These "Routines-Based Interventions" are based on the child's daily lives and are guided by your family's priorities. ECSE teachers will provide coaching to parents and caregivers to help promote a child's development. Families are coached in strategies to help improve developmental areas such as cognition and communication, as well as social, motor, and selfhelp skills.

Preschool Special Education

Our program strives to help young children interact successfully with friends and family at home, in the community, and at school. To achieve this goal, the ECSE staff work as partners with the parents and teachers.

Faribault Public Schools provides a continuum of special education and related services depending on each student's unique special education needs and the goals determined by the student's Individual Education Plan (IEP). Services are provided in the least restrictive environment which is appropriate for the individual student.

SCREEN AT 3

Minnesota law requires all children to be screened prior to school enrollment. Age **three** is the recommended age for this health and developmental screening.

3 Reasons to Screen at age 3:

- 1. Early screening can help set your child up for success in school.
- 2. Any health or learning concerns can be found earlier and help provided sooner.
- 3. Because screening is **FREE**, it's easy and it's good for your child! *Screening is preferred at three, but can be done at four or five

Early Childhood Family Education

What is ECFE?

Early Childhood Family Education (ECFE) recognizes that parents are their child's first teacher and provides resources and support for parents of children from birth to kindergarten. ECFE program offers a variety of classes for families to attend. Classes range from one-time events to weekly classes that vary in length depending on the age of the children attending.

Infant and Baby Options

ECFE classes for new parents are offered in collaboration with Rice County Health Department and Allina Health. Parents and caregivers can ask questions about development and share concerns, do weight and growth checks, have expert advice from lactation consultants and nurses while meeting other new parents.

Toddler, Preschool, and Mixed Age Classes

Each session offers a variety of classes to meet the needs of families and young learners. We are in the process of mapping out safe, healthy procedures to protect our staff and community members, while still offering quality programming for our youngest families. Classes will offered with smaller capacities and will have options for virtual partnerships. The COVID-19 task force and early childhood site teams are still in the process of finalizing all class schedules. Final class schedules and enrollment opportunities will be shared on Faribault Public School's website and social media outlets by August 31st, 2020.





Classroom opportunities will be available at the FEC and include Parent-child Interaction Time as well as Children's Activity Time. Parent Education components will be offered in both virtual and inperson settings, while adhering to specific health and safety measures put in place. Parents and staff will be required to wear masks while participating in ECFE classes and events, but children five and under will not be required to wear a mask in programming.



THE BASICS

- Students may enroll at 14 years of age, but they must be 15 to take the permit test.
- This course consists of the state-required 30 hours of classroom instruction and six hours of Behindthe-Wheel. The classroom prepares students for the written permit test. Upon completion of the classroom and obtaining a driver's permit, the Driver Education Coordinator schedules Behind-the-Wheel after students have passed the permit test. The Behind-the-Wheel component prepares students for the road test.
- A student is required to have their permit for six months and be 16 years of age before they are eligible to take the road test for their driver's license.

COST

- Driver Education costs are \$155 for 10 classroom days and \$240 for six hours of Behind-the-Wheel
- The cost for taking classroom elsewhere and taking six hours of Behind-the-Wheel sessions with Faribault Community Education is \$300
- Money will be forfeited for:
 - Discipline reasons, or failure to complete the requirements of the course
 - Missing two or more days of class

• If you fail to attend the class you are registered for:

- A drop/add fee of \$50 will be assessed to register for another class
- If money is refunded, \$50 will be subtracted from the registration fee




