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RESEARCHING YOUR NEXT STEPS

Year 12

This is typically the time when Year 12s start thinking about undergraduate courses, university choices, Open Days, UCAS and personal statements. It is all too easy to lose yourself in the process and get swept along so, as a starting point for your research and to avoid feeling overwhelmed by the sheer volume of information, it may be helpful to ask yourself the following questions. After all, it's your future and you will be spending at least three years at your chosen university, studying your chosen course, so some time taken now may prevent heartache and "if only" later one.

- What size of university? Large or small? Hundreds or thousands of fellow students?
- Country or city?
- Campus or civic?
- Are the courses you are interested in available at your preferred university?
- Are there any specific entry requirements for your chosen course? Do you fulfil those requirements?
- What is the course content? While every course will have modules you may not enjoy, take time to make sure the majority of the course appeals.
- For vocational subjects, such as medicine, how is the course taught? Does this style work for you?
- How are the courses assessed? This will vary from course to course and university to university. If you know you perform better in coursework and assignments rather than end of year exams, play to your strengths and think about a course that gives more weight to coursework.
- Where/what do graduates go onto afterwards? What is the employment rate like for graduates of your chosen subject at your chosen universities?
- What's the social life like? How important is this to

"While it may be impossible to wander around the campus at the moment, you can still see it in all its glory. Virtual tours let you watch videos and use interactive maps so you can get a feel of the university and its surroundings. Make sure you see examples of accommodation, lecture halls and the city/town streets to get as good a feel of the place as possible.

Thanks to the lack of travel, it's possible to sit in the comfort of your own room and visit a wide range of different universities without worrying about the cost and practicalities of travelling the entire country. The coronavirus situation might also encourage you to consider virtual Open Days overseas, in the US, Canada, the Netherlands or other international universities. Why not check those out too? Use this to your advantage to compare and contrast each city/town and uni. Think about the accommodation and facilities, and how each university ticks the boxes you're looking for.

Perhaps a friend is looking at the same universities, or similar subjects. It might be a good idea to chat with them and discuss what you've seen at different universities so far. Two people looking at the same place may notice different things, so you can discuss the pros and cons together. Remember to focus you should still keep the plans you have for your future and continue your university application and journey as planned. Any changes will be clearly communicated and new deadlines/dates confirmed as and when the information becomes available."

LIFE AFTER MAYFIELD - TOP 100 GRADUATE EMPLOYERS Parents and Pupils

Each year, High Fliers carries out the UK Graduate Careers Survey - the largest and most authoritative annual survey of final year students at the UK's leading universities - on behalf of more than 60 major national and international graduate employers, in association with *The Times* newspaper. The results are based on face-to-face interviews with up to 20,000 finalists and on-campus research groups with student jobs hunters. Each survey gives employers an exclusive insight into the career expectations and aspirations of final year students and provides a definitive record of how they have conducted their search for a graduate job. Since its launch in 1995, the survey results have been used by more than 150 of the UK's best-known employers to review, assess and develop their campus recruitment campaigns.

High Flier's latest annual review (September 2019) of graduate vacancies and starting salaries at the UK's leading employers is via the link below, but here is a selection of findings on graduate starting salaries from this year's report.

- Graduate starting salaries at the UK's leading graduate employers are expected to remain unchanged for the sixth consecutive year in 2020, at a median starting salary of £30,000.
- Fifteen of the country's best-known graduate employers are paying salaries in excess of £45,000 this year.
- The most generous salaries in 2020 are those on offer from the investment banks (median of £50,000), consulting firms (median of £45,800), law firms (median of £45,000), and oil and energy companies (median of £38,500).
- The highest published graduate starting salaries for 2020 include law firms Clifford Chance (£48,000), White & Case (£48,000), Baker McKenzie (£48,000), Linklaters (£47,000), consulting firm Newton (£45,000), technology company TPP (£45,000) and retailer Aldi (£44,000).
