
Introduction













Year 4 were treated to a beautiful piece played on the Chapel organ by Mr Millward, our Head of Music in the Senior School.



















Year 1's jam packed week of learning










We have been investigating number bonds to 10 using our zooming Numicon rockets and recording our addition number sentences.





They have also been learning about tuned percussion, notes and pitch.






They can all now play 'Hot Cross Buns' on the Glockenspiel.

In illustrators club the children have become illustrators. We have drawn pictures based on a character description as well as a setting.




It is excellent and one of my favourite clubs. I love to draw! We played a super fun drawing whispers game (it's Chinese whispers but drawing)

I really enjoy all the activities we do, we've done something different every week.


