GPA is computed using the above quality points. A minimum of 26 credits are required for graduation. In addition, each student must complete a 120-hour community service graduation requirement. Grade point averages are reported on the transcript as both weighted and unweighted. In recognition of the added commitment of AP® and Honor courses, a weighted grade point average is calculated by adding 0.5 to Honor courses and 1.0 to AP® courses.
