

COVID-19 Health Protocols

We have reimagined many of our spaces throughout both campuses in order to allow for COVID-19 prevention and protocols.

The COVID Assessment Response and Evaluation Unit (CARE Unit) is on the first floor and is separate from classrooms, as well as the nurses office. If a student presents COVID symptoms, they are able to isolate in these rooms in order to prevent the spread of COVID.





The third floor library in the Manhattan campus has been rearranged to accommodate social distancing during free periods.

The library in Queens now functions as a hybrid classroom. Each desk is six feet apart with a trifold divider on each and students livestream in to join their classmates.

Lunch now looks a bit different, but is still filled with plenty of laughter! All school lunches are preordered and individually packaged. The parking lot has been transformed into a tented cafeteria. The traditional cafeteria has a strict capacity and only allows for two students per table.







Spotlight: Director of Diversity, Equity & Inclusion



Judith King-Calnek has been a member of the UNIS community since 1994. During that time she has served as teacher (TH Anthropology, Theory of Knowledge, History, and MS Humanities), head of department (Humanities), President of Staff Association, and UNIS parent. This fall, Judith became the school's first Director of Diversity, Equity and Inclusion.

Judith holds a Ph.D. in Comparative Education and Anthropology from Teachers College Columbia University, two master's degrees (Curriculum and Teaching; Anthropology and Education) from the same institution, and a BA from Pomona College. She has taught at Manhattanville College and in Brazil, and has conducted extensive research in Brazil and the U.S. focusing on the intersection(s) of race/color, education and citizenship. She is also an IB examiner for social and cultural anthropology. Prior to joining UNIS, Judith was part of a consulting team that managed a workforce initiative with an emphasis on diversity in the workplace at a manufacturing company in Connecticut.

In addition to her work in school settings, Judith has worked for over 30 years as a radio programmer and producer of Brazilian music and jazz, for which she has received numerous commendations.

Spotlight: Dr. Judith King-Calnek

What are you most looking forward to in your new position?

"I am looking forward to many things in this new position and it's difficult to identify just one superlative. I will say though, I am thrilled that I will be working with the full spectrum of the UNIS community. For many years I have had the good fortune to work most closely with our students, who are the heart of our school, and of course I've worked with a wide variety of faculty, staff and administrators. One of the things that I love about the director of diversity, equity & inclusion position is that as part of my job I can reach out to alumni, parents, and board members in a more purposeful way, and engage with them in new areas of collaboration."

What is something you would like the UNIS community to know?

"I would like the UNIS community to know that diversity, equity and inclusion are our collective work. We have a wonderful school and community, but we have a lot of work to do in this area and it can only be done with concentrated effort. There will be uncomfortable conversations and moments, as in any relationship, but they will be followed by satisfying and rewarding growth and a deeper understanding of ourselves as individuals and as a community. Additionally, we should all be cognizant of the fact that the need to address these issues is nothing new. Calls for diverse people to be included (in school and society) in equitable ways have gone unnoticed and/or unaddressed for a long time, which is why recent voices have had to speak up so loudly in order to be heard. This is true here at UNIS, in New York City, around the world, and on countless digital and virtual platforms as witnessed in recent months. I think of the adage *think globally, act locally,* and it is clear that there is an urgent need to act now, and to act here at UNIS. I look forward to questions, comments and ideas for collaboration with our community members. Please stop by (virtually and/or physically) and share your thoughts and concerns with me as we embark on this work together."

What's Happening Inside UNIS?


