Quick Facts!

- The attention span for adults is 20 minutes. For Children, it is equal to their age in minutes (AS=Age). The average attention span for a 4 year old is 4 minutes; a ten year old is ten minutes and so on. Therefore, it is important to create instructional activities in intervals.
- 3 times is the minimum number of times a student needs to hear something before it sticks.
- Students tend to remember best that which comes first in a learning segment, and remembers second best that which comes last (Primacy-Recency effect). Make sure to effectively utilize the first few minutes of your instruction and the last few minutes to ensure memory and minimize forgetting.

Engage the Brain During Testing Prep

It is that time of the year when teachers are methodically reviewing standards to ensure students are thoroughly prepared for the Florida Standards Assessment and End-of-Course Exams. As a classroom teacher, your goal is to maximize retention and minimize forgetting. You can increase students chances of success and ensure they excel at a high level by implementing Marcia Tate's 20 brain based strategies. Regularly include them in your lessons and watch your students excel.

- Brainstorming and Discussion: We remember what we talk about with each other.
- Drawing and Artwork: Drawing helps encode new content for later recall.
- Games: When playing a game, the stress level goes down and the retention rate goes up.
- Graphic Organizers, Semantic Maps, and Work Webs:
 Having students design a mind map addresses both
 hemispheres of the brain.
- **Humor**: *He who laughs most, learns best.*—John Cleese
- Metaphors, Analogies, and Similes: Take what is unfamiliar to students and connect it to what is familiar and they will get it.
- **Mnemonic Devices**: Acronyms and acrostics enable students to memorize lists of items.
- Movement: Anything the brain learns while the body is in motion is long remembered.
- Music, Rhythm, Rhyme, and Rap: Nursery Rhymes and song lyrics learned while we are children are easily remembered as adults.
- Project-Based and Problem-Based Solving: When students are completing real-world projects or solving real-world problems, comprehension is facilitated.

- Reciprocal Teaching and Cooperative Learning: We remember 90% of what we teach someone else.
- Roleplay: Involve me, I understand. Chinese Proverb
- Storytelling: The brain remembers stories because they are connected together with a beginning, middle, and end.
- Visualization and Guided Imagery: Everything happens twice: once in the mind and once in reality. Stephen Covey
- Visuals: A picture is worth a thousand words.
- Writing and Journals: The brain remembers what we write in long hand better than what we type on a computer.
- Field Trips: We remember where we go in the real world. A virtual field trip from the class will work as well.
- Manipulatives, Experiments, Labs, and Models: There is a strong correlation between what our hands hold and what our minds comprehend.
- Technology: Technology is a workplace competency which enables students to be college-or career—ready.
