Classical civilisation is completely separate from Latin and is not a language. Classical civilisation is a subject which takes some of the key skills from other subjects and combines them, giving pupils the opportunity to develop a breadth of learning not found in many other subjects. The subject promotes:

- An appreciation of how the classical world influenced and shaped the trajectory of western culture.
- · An appreciation of political history and propaganda.
- The forming of opinions and defending them in reasoned debate.
- · An appreciation of religion, culture, literature and art.

Classical civilisation serves as an excellent complement to both the arts and the sciences, covering a diverse range of topics. Classical civilisation also gives pupils the opportunity to study some of the most important texts and figures in world history, led by enthusiastic and experienced teaching staff.



WHAT WILL YOU STUDY?

You do not need to have studied classical civilisation previously to take the subject at A Level. The four topics covered are separate from earlier courses and do not pose any obstacle for a pupil who is new to studying the subject.


