


MATHEMATICIAN OF THE WEEK

The pupils have worked really hard to produce them, and enjoyed being given the opportunity to use Latin as a spoken language, as well as show off their considerable acting skills!





BLACK HISTORY MONTH

This week's Headmistress' Assembly focussed on the impact of black people in Britain over time, to coincide with Black History Month. The recent Black Lives Matter movement has shed new light on the history of Black British History with a wealth of new histories being read and, in many cases, republished due to the interest generated by historians such as David Olusoga and Toby Green in recent months.

Beginning the assembly with Olaudah Equiano, whose remarkable story from slave to abolitionist set the scene, Mrs Shayler charted the stories of six influential black Britons who were to change the course of history and in many cases, were pioneers in their field. The lives of Mary Prince who helped to change the views of Parliament and those of the British people, and Claudia Jones, who began her own newspaper to share stories of black British people, also showed the role of black women. In more recent history, Lord Learie Constantine, a professional cricketer and first black member of the House of Lords, and Eniola Aluko, footballer and trained solicitor who bravely shone a light on racism and bullying in football at a select committee, were also considered.

Launched to mark Black History Month 2020, these stories of important black Britons helped our pupils understand the impact of black British people that are the focus of the UK Parliament project. Next year, the History Department will be introducing a new enquiry focussing on black Tudors in Year 8, which we hope our pupils will find as fascinating and informative as the subject of this week's assembly.

CHAPLAIN'S THOUGHT OF THE WEEK

Earlier this month, the London Marathon went ahead in a new way. Elite athletes competed in London whilst 45,000 runners ran their 26.2 miles wherever they could. It was a windy and wet weekend, yet it was inspiring to see such a range of runners, from novice to elite, participating. It was even more inspiring to hear the stories behind some of the runs. The capacity of people to bring hope, to demonstrate love and compassion is amazing.

Brigid Kosgei, world record holder and winner of the elite women's race on 4 October said, "I continued to follow my guiding principles of hard work, discipline and perseverance; that's all I can do and then hope that's enough for a great performance on race day. Some days you have to be more patient than others, and some days you may not feel like running, but in the end it will pay off.... You must be disciplined and persevere with everything you have talent in."

Brigid's words also reflect words from the Bible, where the Gospels tell us about using our gifts and talents well. Letters throughout the New Testament speak of discipline and perseverance, of patience, consistency and hope.

'For this very reason, make every effort to add to your faith goodness; and to goodness, knowledge; and to knowledge, self-control; and to self-control, perseverance; and to perseverance, godliness; and to godliness, mutual affection; and to mutual affection, love.' 2 Peter 1.

Be inspired, take your opportunities, create opportunities, and know that you, the young people and the families you support can – with perseverance, patience, hope, love – achieve anything.

Thank you that with perseverance, patience, hope and love we can achieve great things. Help me to persevere, with patience, hope and love to achieve great things for common good. Amen

TODDLER SWIMMING

For toddlers aged 1 and 2 (must be accompanied in the water by a responsible adult)

Parents/guardians can gain confidence in the water with their little ones and learn how they can progress their child's swimming whilst staying safe. Children will learn safety skills in getting in and out of the water and will gain independence and confidence.

The lessons are run by staff with a Swim England Level 2 Swimming Teacher qualification or above.

Lessons last 25 minutes and cost £6.50 per week, payable termly. Your child's day and time of attendance will be confirmed prior to the start of the term.
