Reynolds Named Head of School.

n March 4, 2020, the REF Board of Trustees announced that Paul "Chance" Reynolds had been named the next Head of School assuming the position at the end of the academic year following the departure of outgoing Head John Melton.

Reynolds served as the Assistant Head at Greenfield School, an independent school in Wilson, North Carolina. After a nationwide search process that began in the fall of 2019, the search committee enthusiastically recommended Reynolds to the Board who then finalized his selection. He began working immediately with a team of Fuqua School representatives to facilitate a smooth transition into his eventual full-time leadership role. As the school worked through COVID and re-opening plans, Reynolds played an active role in the planning process.

After Reynolds's on-campus visit, the Board received overwhelmingly positive feedback about him from a wide array of stakeholders, many who cited his familiarity with the goals and challenges of operating an independent school in a rural area. Prior to his position at Greenfield School, Reynolds held additional leadership roles there, and at Stratford Academy in Macon, Georgia—including positions as Upper School Assistant Principal and Middle School Dean of Students. Additionally, in 2018, Reynolds earned his Ed. S. degree in Educational Leadership from Liberty University. According to search committee chair John Gantt '84, "Reynolds's effectiveness in connecting with the community and commitment to advancing the school's values and agenda were also important factors in making him the right fit for Fuqua."

"An experienced school leader, Chance has a great vision for our school and he's eager to share it," commented incoming Board Chair Joyce Eggleston '76. "With the Board's approval, he is preparing to move Fuqua School forward into the 21st century for the benefit of our students."

Reynolds's wife, Charlotte, and children, Colton, a 6th grader, and Dane, a sophomore, joined the Fuqua family with him.

In sharing his vision for the future of Fuqua School, Reynolds says, "Everywhere I look, I see a school on the verge of fulfilling its own *Boundless, Individual Potential*; not only as an institution of learning, but as a catalyst for positive change and a better tomorrow for us all." "Chance has a great vision for our school and he's eager to share it."

The next event occurred on Tuesday evening of Senior Week. The class gathered for the first ever joint Academic and Athletic Awards Banquet. Students were awarded the traditional awards, medals, and

This evening concluded with the class presenting their class gift to the school. The class bought Mr. Fore "the nicest golf cart he had ever seen." The traditional service was held in front of the bell tower as the graduating class sat on either side of the stage, socially distanced. Learning at All Levels

3D Printing Helping the Front Lines

uring the time of school closures, local 3D Pprinting enthusiasts, including Fuqua's own STEAM teacher Kathy Jefferson, worked together to create face shields for emergency responders and face mask adjusters for local health care professionals. Face shields are just an added layer of protection to keep police and other emergency responders safe when they cannot social distance. Face mask extenders are in high demand to keep ears from getting rubbed raw while wearing them for extended lengths of time. Fuqua School donated the printers, filament, and expertise to fabricate the shields and extenders. The face shield took about 50 minutes to print, and the mask extender took about 20 minutes. Due to the size of the print bed, only one print could be run at a time.

Kathryn Jefferson, Fuqua School STEAM teacher, used the 3D printers to teach 3D printing in class and ran a 3D printing camp over the summer. Head of School John Melton commented, "I was so grateful for Mrs. Jefferson's suggestion that we begin using our technology for the benefit of first responders in our community. Her kindness, creativity, and genuine concern for others are indicative of our Fuqua School Core Values."

Students Attend Prejudice Awareness Summit

iddle school students Vivian Eason, Marissa MDempsey, Marina Morris, Joshua Milligan, Bradley French, and Julian Price attended the Virginia Center for Inclusive Communities Prejudice Awareness Summit at Randolph College in Lynchburg, Virginia. The summit was a one-day program designed to bring together approximately 100 Central Virginia 7th and 8th grade students to help equip them with the necessary tools to assist in areas of conflict resolution, prejudice and stereotype reduction, multicultural communication, leadership, and advocacy. The students worked in teams to develop achievable and concrete solutions to the tough challenges that they may face during their middle school years. This group of student leaders worked alongside Head of the Lower and Middle Schools, Dara Tucker, and Lower and Middle School Counselor, Amy Rostan, to create a campaign bringing awareness about verbal dehumanization, bullying, and deliberate avoidance to our middle school students. Through



programs, opportunities, and collaborations such as this, Fuqua School will continue to work toward its efforts to increase awareness for all students in grades PK-12. This awareness is what leads to students' increased cultural understanding, stronger critical thinking skills and enhanced creativity, all of which better prepare our students for life outside of the classroom.

Learning at a Distance

While schools across the state were mandated to close from March 2020 through the remainder of the school year, Fuqua School students understood that "while campus is closed, Fuqua School is not closed" by embarking on a new learning experience. Our faculty and staff continued to provide inclusive learning environments, support for students' academic success, and ensured their social and emotional needs were being met, even as they cared for their own families and communities while working from home.

Students in grades PK-12 continued to learn with the help of online platforms such as Zoom, YouTube, and Edmodo where they were still able to receive instruction from their teachers. Even our specials and electives teachers joined through a "we provide, you decide approach," which allowed parents and students to go onto our school website to access a wealth of activities and lessons. In addition, Lower School and Middle School Counselor Amy Rostan held Friday "lunch bunches" with groups of students. Facilitated through Zoom, Mrs. Rostan invited groups of students to join her for a "virtual lunch." During their Zoom lunches, students shared the highs and lows of school at home, suggestions of ways to improve the facilitation of online learning, and just generally enjoyed each other's company. As Mrs. Rostan shared, "While it was not the same as seeing them in person each day at school, seeing their faces and hearing their ideas was such a joy."

To further maintain this personal connection between the students and school, many online social media competitions and spirit days were held that allowed our faculty and students to bond over their pets, their pajamas, and of course, rocking their red and black. Students and faculty alike learned how to navigate distance learning.

Model United Nations

This past November, students from Fuqua School's Model United Nations team went to a mock U.N. meeting on the campus of Hampden-Sydney College. The event was structured over two days to replicate a meeting of the United Nations General Assembly. Students from four different regional schools—Appomattox County High School, Cumberland County High School, Prince Edward County High School, and Fuqua School—represented countries from around the globe. While at the two-day summit, representatives addressed current events and global issues, and the event organizers invented "crisis" situations to test the students' responses. Several students were recognized for their impressive performances, including Senior Roman Davis who passed a bill during the process.



Virtual Model General Assembly

The Model General Assembly program was stablished in 1948 and is designed to introduce high school students to the legislative process of the Commonwealth of Virginia. Legislation is debated in committees and on the floors of the actual Virginia Senate and House of Delegates. However, this year, due to COVID, the Model General Assembly was quite different than in the past. Rather than cancel the event all together, YMCA officials moved forward using technology. Delegates and Senators presented and debated bills, campaigned for offices, and voted through Zoom sessions while in their own homes. Over 200 young people around the Commonwealth participated; students discussed every bill that was in the bill book, lobbyists helped relay facts to their peers, and media students created a podcast to report on the event. We are proud of these students and their leadership and initiative; while debating on a Zoom call certainly wasn't ideal, they made the best of it and we heard some great debates. Staff from several other states observed the debates as they made decisions to make some of their own conferences virtual, and they were impressed with what they saw. Fuqua School senior Roman Davis served as the House Speaker Pro Tempore. He monitored the debate over several days of chamber sessions.



Audra Murphy, who was assigned one of Fuqua School's six bills, was able to successfully move her bill through committee and chamber proceedings and even to the Governor's desk for his signature. At the conclusion of the program, Roman Davis and Sophie Watson were both selected to attend the Conference on National Affairs through the Model General Assembly program. Sophie was also elected as the Lieutenant Governor for MGA 2021. Sophie will be in charge of monitoring senate debate during the 2021 Model General Assembly conference. Fuqua School is proud to state that our students have held a leadership role in the MGA for 10 out of the last 12 years. Way to go Falcons!

For only the second time in school history, our Battle of the Brains team advanced to the semifinals of the competition. Battle of the Brains is a quizbowl show in the Richmond area that invites local high schools to try out and compete for the show. WTVR airs the competitions throughout the fall and spring on Saturday mornings. Our young team was able to defeat both Thomas Dale and Hermitage High Schools, both of which are seven times the size of Fuqua, before losing to Steward School in the semi-finals. Our team was made up of Captain Zach Eason '21, Josh Huggard '22, George Magnotti '22, and Hunter Melton '22. We were very pleased as to how far our team advanced and hope to be able to make it through to the finals next year.



The Beat Goes On

The Music Department's 2019-2020 year started with a bang as the Marching Falcons' percussion line began the cadence and every band student from 7th to 12th grade took the football field to play The National Anthem. The Marching Falcons did this at each home game along with their halftime show "Rocking the Hits!" which included Bruno Mars' "24K Magic," "Some Nights" by Fun, and an arrangement of the 1990s grunge hit, "Smells Like Teen Spirit" by Nirvana. At Homecoming the senior band partnered with the PE Ruritans for the Brunswick Stew Fundraiser and performed a special halftime ceremony for the announcement of Fuqua School's Homecoming King and Queen.

On November 11th, the Senior Band proudly hosted their annual Community Veteran's Day Program at Crute Stage in Downtown Farmville. The combined middle school bands started the program with the playing of "America the Beautiful" and "God Bless America." An inspiring speech was given by the keynote speaker, Bob Gillette, and the senior band performed three patriotic pieces. This program has been said to be one of the greatest contributions Fuqua School provides to our community.

December has always been a busy time of year on campus and the band is no different. On the first Thursday of December, the music department held the Lower School Holiday Program and the Upper School Opus. Both programs were greatly attended and talked very highly about. At Opus, the music department had a poinsettia fundraiser that every music student participated in. This helped decorate the stage for Opus, and allowed the department to purchase much needed equipment for the lower and upper school music/band rooms.



After returning from winter break, the middle school and senior bands hit the ground running to prepare for concert assessment and the spring trips. In late February, the senior band traveled to Powhatan High School to take part in the Virginia Band & Orchestra Directors Association Concert Assessment. The senior band received wonderful comments and pointers from the adjudicators, and brought those back to the band room to continue perfecting out music for the Music in the Parks competition they planned to attend.

When Fuqua School transitioned to distance learning, the senior band continued rehearsing from home. Students worked to complete a four-movement piece that they hope to play in the 2020-2021 school year. The band utilized Zoom to meet and discuss issues they were having with this difficult piece of music, and submitted video recordings of practice sessions for assessment. Campus Improvements

Changes to Lower/Middle School Campus

A nyone familiar with the lower school campus may remember three white buildings. Over the years, these buildings have served multiple purposes to Fuqua School students and faculty. Originally, the three buildings were used as classrooms and many of our alumni may remember spending their elementary school days there. Eventually, theses classes moved into the main lower school buildings and became the home of our specials classes, such as art and music. Once the Commons was built in 1994, the specials



classes moved into that new space and Fugua School's daycare program and summer camps found a new home within those white buildings. Eventually, the white buildings began to show their age and all students were moved to other spaces on campus. The buildings became a storage space for all of Fuqua School, holding many essentials such as extra student desks, teacher bookcases, and Opus costumes. These buildings continued to deteriorate and eventually became a safety hazard. After much deliberation, it was decided that the space where those buildings sat was much more beneficial to the students than the buildings themselves, and the decision was made to demolish them. Now that they have been removed, the space left is a wonderful open grassy field. There are so many visions for the future of this space—an outdoor classroom space for students to explore their environment through hands-on learning, a schoolwide playground that would service all students in grades PK-5, or additional parking for our lower school families and faculty. The possibilities with this space are endless and we look forward to seeing how it unfolds in years to come.

Lower School's SCA Playground Renovations

The Lower School SCA had a mission as they began the 2019-2020 school year. They wanted to create change. One way they sought to create change was to improve their current 4/5 playground that was up the hill near the football stadium. The problems were many with this location—balls rolled down the hill into the main street when playing kickball; cars pulled through at all times throughout the day causing the students to stop play out of safety concerns; and the trees around the space continued to be home to many stinging insects and poison ivy-no matter how many times it was sprayed. So, through a lot of planning, designing, fundraising, and parent help and support, they not only improved their playground but they also moved it! Their new space is located in front of the school's bus shop. This fenced-in large, grassy space saw much change itself over the winter and spring. Trees and tree stumps were cleared to make a path for the students and to allow a site of vision from the lower school campus to the playground. In addition, the swing sets were moved down to the new space and painted school colors, a GaGa Pit



was built, a storage shed for play equipment and first aid supplies was moved to the space, and a basketball hoop was added to the area. Through all of these combined efforts, the students at the lower school now have a special space that they helped bring from a vision to a reality.

Science Lab Gets Facelift

This past March, when schools closed to I in-person instruction because of COVID, Fuqua School took this as an opportunity to update our science quad. This closure also gave us an opportunity to totally redo our science lab that is shared by all of our science classes. New paint on the walls, new tile on the floor, new blinds, as well as new overhead LED lighting were added. Our science department, along with other staff members, were able to inventory all of our science equipment and spend the necessary time to get everything organized. After the lab was complete, the department moved into reorganizing and cleaning out the science prep room. Chemicals were grouped by the recommended organization methods, new cabinets for flammable liquids and acids were purchased, and equipment was inventoried and organized throughout the room. A new dishwasher and hot water heater were also purchased to help with the sterilization of lab equipment. The new renovations will provide excellent opportunities for all of our science classes to benefit from this lab space. Currently, the space is being shared by multiple science classes in the fall semester including Environmental Science, Biology, Chemistry, Physics, and Zoology.

Homecoming festivities were an opportunity to celebrate all the wonderful ways our school has prepared our students for learning and for life over so many years. Multiple generations of Falcons returned to the Nest to re-connect with each other and support Fuqua School.
