In maths, Year 3 have been studying 3D shapes. We have learnt the properties and made our own shapes from straws and blu tack. We have also created our own shapes from nets.

























Saturday Sport Festival


I love the sound of the piano and I really enjoyed playing the big piano, in the Music Room.
