



Dear Families and Friends of The Woodlands Christian Academy,

On behalf of our Governance Board, administration and faculty, we are pleased to present this annual report, summarizing highlights from the 2019-2020 school year.

At Woodlands Christian, we strive to equip leaders – spiritually, academically, physically and socially - to fulfill God's purpose for each of their lives. Through His transforming power, we believe that students can find their unique gifts and talents and reach their highest potential. Thus, we offer a rigorous Christian college-preparatory curriculum taught by an engaging faculty that delivers the personal mentoring and encouragement necessary to help our students succeed

and develop a love of learning. Whether in the classroom, at an athletic competition or on the mission field, we challenge our students to become servant-leaders for Christ, capable of making an eternal impact for His kingdom.

This was an extraordinary year at Woodlands Christian. We began in August with record student enrollment and the opening of the Micah Academic Center, a three-story high school building which added the Ruth Auditorium, three state-of-the-art science labs, an art studio, 27 classrooms, a coffee bar, student gathering areas, offices and space for a 16,000 sf STEAM lab to our campus.

Our annual spiritual theme of Godly Grit was most appropriate as we also faced unprecedented challenges. Due to the rapid spread of COVID-19 around the world, we closed our campus on March 13 and remained closed for the rest of the school year. However, without missing a beat, our faculty immediately pivoted to distance learning, enabling our students to continue learning and interacting with their teachers and classmates through technology. Unfortunately, we had to cancel many cherished traditions including spring athletics, the passing of the torch from the seniors to the juniors, baccalaureate, prom, awards ceremonies, and the annual auction and gala.

After so much turbulence, it was a joy to conclude this year with a kindergarten graduation car parade and an outdoor commencement held in Warrior Stadium for the Class of 2020. We are proud of all of our students for their flexibility and willingness to be challenged with new methods of learning. Ultimately, they have all become better students as a result of this experience.

We hope you enjoy the annual report, in which we focus on our previous year's achievements and on the annual report of gifts. We are, as always, grateful for the contributions of time, talent and treasure that we receive from the families and friends of Woodlands Christian.



THE ACE PROGRAM

The Academic Center for Empowerment (ACE) program at Woodlands Christian is a valuable resource for students in all grades. Led by Dr. Teresa Voltz, the ACE team provides personalized attention to students with common learning disabilities, dyslexia, ADHD, dysgraphia, dyscalculia, and anxiety disorder–using proven methods that help them to be successful in the classroom. In 2019, the ACE team completed the National Institute for Learning Development (NILD) Level III training and became Professionally Certified Educational Therapists (PCET).

While our curriculum has always been rigorous and innovative, we have recently focused our efforts toward the expansion of our STEAM program. Our students are introduced to challenge-based learning beginning in pre-k and on through graduation.

This not only helps students to develop exceptional problem solving and critical thinking skills, it introduces valuable lessons in failure with almost all projects requiring them to revisit past failures and rebuild.

LACY GOEDEKE



Before beginning her second year teaching lower school science at TWCA, Lacy Goedeke participated in Rice University's STEM Engagement Program. Lacy was one of a small number of Houston-area teachers selected to be a part of the year-long program. It is designed to provide high-quality, largescale training and resources focusing on STEM concepts, research-based inquiry teaching strategies, teacher leadership, and new developments in the fields of science, technology, engineering, mathematics, and computer science. Reflecting on her experience, Lacy believes she has become a better leader and STEM advocate on our campus.

TANYA SHARRON



The Lower School News Team was formed in the fall of 2019. STEAM teacher Tanya Sharron directed the group of 15 4th grade students. Each member was assigned one of several roles – including producer, camera operator, film technician and reporter – and tasked with compiling daily newscasts for the entire lower school to view before the start of each day. The broadcasts included the pledges, Bible verse of the day, the lunch menu, birthdays, and special reports that covered stories from campus. Capabilities expanded with each week that passed as the students learned how to use the equipment to enhance the newscast and viewer experience. These upgrades included including photography for green screen backgrounds, digital animations and creating music for individual segments.

LOWER SCHOOL STEAM LAB

Located on the 2nd floor of the Joshua Building is our brand new Lower School STEAM Room. It is equipped with a variety of outfitted resources that allow our students to thrive in a stimulating environment that supports creativity and exploration. Highlights from this space include:



IPADS

Early experience with Apple devices offer valuable lessons in creativity and an introduction to technology. Younger students benefit from practicing and getting familiar with the functionality of these sophisticated machines. Older students are able to practice coding through applications like Kodable, as well as digital animation and videography through resources like Apple Clips.



LEGO BUILDING WALL

The LEGO Building Wall is a stimulating way to task students with creative problem-solving challenges using LEGO building blocks. This provides opportunities for younger students to think critically and learn through play.








WARRIOR FUND


1. S.T.E.A.M. to further equip the new STEAM lab in the Joshua Academic Center and the 3rd floor makerspace in the Micah Academic Center.

VENTILATOR PROJECT



Q: WHAT IS YOUR FAVORITE MEMORY FROM YOUR TIME HERE?



JESSICA ROBINSON, CLASS OF 2015


