A Year in Italia

Note: This article was submitted for last year's alumni newsletter; however, no newsletter was published.

Hello. To many of you my name has no meaning. I only attended Countryside for two years. However, the memories and the passion for learning which I acquired there remain with me. I moved at the end of my third grade year to Charlotte, NC. Last year, I decided to get out into the world and experience it from a new perspective. Having spoken with a couple of exchange students at my school, I decided to look into various exchange programs. Although I looked into many programs, the Rotary International's Youth Exchange Program stood out from the rest. Before I knew it, I was embarking on a plane sent for a year in Italia.

I arrived in Milan, Italy having traveled 24 hours straight. My tutor, Marco DiPrisco, picked me up and drove me to my first host family's home in Erba. I spent the entirety of my sophomore year with that family and two others in the quiet mountain valley just north of Milan and east of Lake Como. With roughly 10,000 inhabitants, the town soon became my stomping grounds. I quickly made friends with people who had never before met an American and spent many of my hours hanging out at the local café. At 2 meters (6' 7") tall, I stuck out like a sore

thumb. I have to say that I do not think my Italian basketball coach minded!

Many people ask me how my year went, or what my favorite memory was. My response varies. Through both good and hard times, I grew as an individual through many experiences. Although my host parents would quickly point out the ten hour Christmas dinner, I cannot pinpoint one part of the trip where I was the happiest. What I can remember is one moment of serenita' when I was sitting outside of a café baking in the sun listening to my Italian friends talk and just letting it soak in. I was not happy per se, but I was peaceful. A wise man once told me, "Quando si parla un'altra lingua, tutte le porte si aprirono." (When one speaks another language, all the doors will open.) I have had the opportunity to exchange my culture with other people and in turn share the Italian culture. I sincerely hope that all of you will consider taking a year away from high school and going off into the world in order to let the doors open.

Greetings from Oberlin

I will be graduating in May from Oberlin College and Conservatory after five years here. I am graduating from Oberlin's Double Degree program and have spent my time earning a Bachelor of Arts in Biology with an Environmental Studies minor and a Bachelor of Music in Historical Performance on recorder with a minor in Baroque flute. I came to Oberlin after Uni High because I knew I wanted to do biology and Oberlin has a great Biology program. What I didn't know until I visited is that I wanted to keep up with music too, and Oberlin is perfect for that combination. In fact, I'm one of three recorder playing biology students here.

Oberlin is a small school, only about 2,500 students, but the small size means I've had a lot of great opportunities. I've been able to play recorder and flute in a Baroque orchestra and in opera performances. I've also been able to work on studies of sexual selection in goldfinches and chewing lice on catbirds. The community is friendly and I have met some wonderful friends here, other stu-

dents, professors and staff, though being in a five year program means most of the students have already graduated and left. I also found a wonderful boyfriend who has graduated but not left (and has won familial approval, lucky him). On one of my visits home I took him to visit Countryside and I think he was suitably impressed.

This fall I will start graduate studies at Stony Brook University's Department of Ecology and Evolution. Hopefully I'll have time to keep up with my music with the Stony Brook Baroque Players. It will be funny going back to Stony Brook. I was born there, and my dad taught there for 22 years before he and my mom came to Urbana when I was a baby. It will be fun, too, and I expect to be doing lots of exciting research. Hopefully my classes with be exciting too! I'll mostly be studying lemurs, and I'm going to Madagascar for the summer to start a research project on habitat use in nocturnal lemurs. I'm really looking forward to it.
