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General Information

[A description of the impact the COVID-19 pandemic has had on the LEA and its community.]

The Coast Unified School District is located on California’s beautiful Central Coast in San Luis Obispo County. The District serves grades TK-8 student population of Cambria, San Simeon and surrounding rural areas and the grades 9-12 students of that area and the town of Cayucos. The District has one TK-5 school, one 6-8 middle school, one comprehensive high school, and one continuation high school. There are approximately 606 students with an ethnic makeup of 29% Caucasian, 66% Hispanic, and 5% other groups. The largest target populations served in the district are:

Looking at these student groups across the school sites, it is clear that our demographics are changing within the community. We are seeing ever increasing percentages of both low socioeconomic students and English Learners as we move down the grades across the school sites.

The Governing Board, staff, parents, students and community are committed to educational excellence. The District enjoys a sound budget based on basic aid status, collaborative union and management relationships, excellent support service departments. strong academic success as evidenced by three California State Distinguished School awards, two U. S. News and World Report Silver Medal awards for Coast Union High School, and most recently, SLMS and CUHS were named star schools on the 2017-18 California Honor Roll by the

Educational Results Partnership and the Campaign for Business and Education Excellence and Santa Lucia Middle School has been recognized as a California Distinguished School for 2019. Staff and parents are committed to helping all students achieve the highest standards.

Meaningful participation of all stakeholders is encouraged and expected. The District is, in fact, blessed by the generous support of parents and many other community groups who provide significant financial, personal, and organizational resources.

COVID-19 has had a significant impact on Coast Unified School District and our community. Coast school sites act as centers where the community gathers for more than just education. Our campuses act as locations for entertainment, celebrations, and distribution centers for vital resources such as food, counseling and health care. In response to rising cases of COVID-19 in our county, Coast Unified, along with all other districts in San Luis Obispo County, closed its campuses on March 16, 2020. Staff, students, and families were given notice of this on March 13, 2020. Teacher instruction and student learning were to be carried out remotely through distance learning. The timeline for distance learning extended through the end of the 2019/20 school year.

COVID-19 and the closure of our campuses had far reaching impacts on our LEA and community. Students attended classes from home which created challenges in child care and supervision. Students also needed to be provided with the materials they would need to successfully engage in distance learning. Beyond textbooks this included everything from binders and glue to digital devices and reliable access to the internet. Teachers had to quickly change their delivery of instruction and alter the expectations for instruction and assessment. This was also true for our counseling staff and those who provide services such as occupational therapy, speech, behavioral supports, and others. Field trips and large gatherings (athletics, dances, club meetings, etc.) were canceled. Food services shifted to food pick-up and delivery for families.

The North Coast region of San Luis Obispo County also felt the negative impacts of COVID-19 on its economy, which is largely based on tourism and related services. Many of our families faced additional hardships due to the shuttering of businesses and job loss.

Stakeholder Engagement

Coast Unified School District values the input of all stakeholders. Parent communications have been sent regularly in order to provide district updates to families and staff members regarding the conditions surrounding COVID 19. A Superintendent's Reopening Committee was established to review the circumstances impacting schools and to gather input and ideas on preparations and safeguards necessary for the start of the 2020-21 school year. After receiving input and clarification from San Luis Obispo County Public Health, Coast Unified released its base opening plan to the public and coupled that with a survey to families and staff members to collect their views on school opening and distance learning. Parent and community meetings have also been scheduled to elicit input and additionally refine the Distance Learning

Plan for the district. A district-wide parent meeting was held on August 5th to review distance learning plans and a special District English Learner Advisory Committee meeting was held on August 12th for this same purpose.

These efforts have been made in addition to regularly scheduled public Board Meetings and two emergency Board Meetings established to discuss the opening of the 2020-21 school year.

Coast Unified School District worked in partnership with CSEA and CCTA in developing the Distance Learning Plan and developed Memorandums of Understanding with both bargaining units.

All of our public meetings have been conducted through Zoom, allowing for remote participation. These include Board Meetings, Distance Learning Planning, and the Superintendent's Reopening Committee meetings. Spanish translation has been provided at stakeholder meetings as well.

Through our surveys we had responses from 243 families and 81 staff members. Survey feedback from stakeholders represented diverse perspectives and varying viewpoints. The district has additionally solicited input through email and, as mentioned earlier, will be holding parent meetings (remotely) on the district's Distance Learning Plan for 2020/21.

Through surveying our stakeholders, top concerns were keeping children engaged in good activities, children falling behind academically, and the absence of social interaction with peers and caring adults.

We have developed a Distance Learning Plan that addresses these concerns through daily, live sessions that allow students to have interaction and high quality instruction with their teacher and peers. Support services are also critical elements of our instruction and are included as a part of students' schedules.

Continuity of Learning

In-Person Instructional Offerings

Students will follow a daily schedule of courses and subjects. Schedules include core academic subjects as well as academic supports, art and music, and other elective and enrichment opportunities. Students will receive direct instruction from credentialed teachers and specialists.

Coast Unified School District has discussed plans for initiating in-person offerings. Currently, in-person instruction is not permitted for schools in our district or county as San Luis Obispo County remains on the state's COVID-19 watch list. Our community remains fairly divided on the topic of students and staff returning to our school sites as well. When the scientific data determines a safe return to school is possible (SLO County remains off the state watch list for 14 consecutive days), we are likely to still have a high level of apprehension from some staff and families about returning to school sites.

As we examined a future move away from distance learning we have seen that a hybrid model (staggering student schedules to reduce the number of students on school sites to allow for more social distancing) is not feasible since it would require all staff and students to reenter our campuses regardless of comfort level or willingness to do so. The district does see potential for bringing willing staff and students together in a "learning pod" model where students would continue to engage in distance learning but do so on campus with supervision and support provided by willing staff.

The Learning Pod Program will provide in person support for students on campus while students continue to receive their direct instruction through Distance Learning. All California Department of Public Health (CDPH) guidelines for child care will be followed. Staff will supervise and support student cohorts in groups of 14 or less. All safety protocols from the Coast Unified School Opening Plan will be implemented. Availability of willing staff and willing families will determine the scope of the program. Priority for acceptance into the program will be granted to those students who are determined to need in person services the most. These factors may include but are not limited to Special Education, English Learner, Low-Income, Foster, Homeless, or other factors at the administration's discretion. Participation will be by invite only.

Distance Learning Program

Continuity of Instruction

Students will follow a daily schedule of courses and subjects. Students will receive direct instruction from teachers and specialists. Teachers continue to use standards-based curriculum and instructional materials. Across the grade levels and at all school sites, Coast Unified continued to offer instruction in all content areas and offer all courses. Core/Required subjects along with electives, enrichment, remediation, and support have all been scheduled included in student schedules. The supports and services included in students' Individual Education Plans along with those provided through English Language Development have also been continued.

Access to Devices and Connectivity

Coast Unified school District has implemented a 1:1 digital device program for grades six through twelve in place for a number of years which allowed for a smooth transition in this element of distance learning. The program was expanded to lower grades in order to allow all students access to digital devices during our campus closures. Beyond connecting families with service providers in order to obtain internet, Coast Unified has purchased mi-fi units and service accounts for families facing difficulties with connectivity.

Pupil Participation and Progress

Students will be scheduled into live class sessions that meet or exceed the minimum number of instructional minutes. Standards based assessments are scheduled regularly in order to help measure student progress. Grade books will reflect student participation and performance on assessments and assigned work. Families have access to class grade books, however, the district will communicate student participation and performance regularly. For further documentation of student attendance and engagement, teachers are completing the California Department of Education's Combined Daily Participation and Weekly Engagement Form. This CDE requirement keeps track of the curriculum being covered, student attendance, participation, and student and parent contacts.

Distance Learning Professional Development

Coast Unified teachers and support staff met the challenge of distance learning in the spring and have participated in developing a Distance Learning Plan that makes improvements from this experience. Teachers who have become our resident experts on various online teaching tools and strategies will be training one another through additional professional development sessions scheduled in early August, giving teachers time to incorporate information from these training into their instruction.

The district also has trainings scheduled on a new student information system. All teachers will be trained in utilizing the system for attendance and grading, including how this will be done during distance learning.

All staff will be trained in utilizing new equipment and the procedural safeguards put in place on our campuses. This includes hand washing and hand sanitizing stations, sanitizing equipment, and social distancing measures.

Staff Roles and Responsibilities

There is a need for additional flexibility among all district employees in regards to roles and responsibilities as a result of COVID-19. All staff members are asked to assist, as needed, in connecting our families with needed resources. All staff members are also asked to play an active role in keeping our campuses clean and safe during the COVID-19 outbreak and into the foreseeable future.

Supports for Pupils with Unique Needs

Students in need of additional supports will have those incorporated into their schedules. The district also maintains its Family Advocate position, assisting families in need by connecting them with needed resources.

Pupil Learning Loss

Mental Health and Social and Emotional Well-Being

Coast Unified, in partnership with San Luis Obispo County Mental Health, provides an array of mental health and social and emotional services. These services will continue during distance learning. Services include group and individual counseling, outside referrals as necessary, and Family Advocate services to connect families to outside resources. Counseling staff participate in parent meetings and lead staff meeting sessions in order to provide training on social emotional insights and instructional strategies. Teachers and counselors regularly hold "check-ins" with students to see help monitor social and emotional well-being. School site staff discuss these "check-ins" and the general well-being of students as a team that includes teachers, counselors, administration and other staff members.

Administrators meet with individual staff members to establish goals and as part of the evaluation and support process. These meetings also act as venues for discussing social and emotional well being of staff.

Pupil and Family Engagement and Outreach

Coast Unified staff personally contacts every family in the district to survey needs and answer questions. Attendance and academic performance are recorded regularly and communicated with families. For students who are not actively engaging in distance learning, families will be contacted. In this contact, an assessment of needs will be given. We will also continue to work with families to develop plans for removing obstacles and provide needed resources in order to improve student achievement. Regularly scheduled parent communication and parent-teacher conferences will continue during distance learning. Communication is our first tier of response. Additional layers of support are applied as needed. These additional supports may include our Family Advocate, our School Resource Officer, or additional county resources.

School Nutrition

Coast Unified School District has continued its food services. While campuses have been closed, meals have been prepared and made available for pick up and/or delivery. Meals are available for pick up from our central kitchen at Coast Union High School. Deliveries are made to areas with high student numbers/high need and based on parent/stakeholder request. Daily meals that are provided have consisted of one lunch and a breakfast for the next day. Social distancing has been maintained during meal distribution and district staff have performed their work wearing appropriate protective equipment.

The needs of foster youth, English learners and low-income students have been at the forefront of our planning for distance learning.

The actions and services outlined in this report are principally targeting our unduplicated student populations. As Coast Unified developed plans for carrying out the 2020/21 school year, the potential obstacles to success and related needs to overcome these obstacles were considered first. The district made significant efforts to reach out to all of our families, but specifically to our families in need, to determine what actions, supports, and services would be needed to succeed in this new learning model. Our experience from the spring of 2020 also helped inform these decisions. District administration and school site staff continue to communicate with our stakeholders to determine the effectiveness of the actions and services put in place and to help guide future actions and services. We are also continuing to monitor student data (attendance, behavior reports, grades and assessment data) determine effectiveness.

Total expenditures surpass the apportioned amount. Coast Unified School District has dedicated considerable resources (outlined in this plan) to ensure our ability to provide a quality educational program for all of our students. Unduplicated students will be given priority access to in-person services and supports offered through Learning Pods on our campuses.
