ing about Fall and what makes this season so exciting. Our students discovered the scientific reasons of how and why leaves change color when the weather starts to get colder. They participated in a fun hands-on activity of crayon rubbings of tree leaves where they were able to take a closer look to observe the characteristics of leaves from their own neighborhood.

We then moved on to bugs, bugs, bugs. Big and small bugs. Jumpy leapy bugs and slimy crawly creepy bugs. Brightly colored winged bugs and stripey swipey sting bugs. Well, you get the idea! We found out that all these bugs are important to our ecosystem and were slowly able to differentiate between arachnids and creepy crawlers.

Now we are focused on nocturnal animals. You know, the ones that make this year extra creepy!

TK NEWS

It's that time of year where leaves are changing colors and pumpkins are all around us. In our TK class, students are having fun with the pumpkin unit of study. However, this year with Phase 2 learning in progress, we had to modify our lesson. Instead of having a science experiment set up as a center, it was taught as a whole group with virtual and in-school students. We did an investigation with the little, class pumpkin.

We began by drawing a picture of our pumpkin. Then we measured the height of the pumpkin, counted how many lines it has, and how many seeds were inside. Students were asked prior to the counting of the seeds to estimate about how many



seeds they predict were inside the pumpkin. The estimated guess was about 20 to 25 seeds. As you can imagine, they were amazed when they discovered that the actual amount of seeds inside the pumpkin were 159.

We proceeded with the experiment by putting our hypothesis to the test to see whether the pumpkin would sink or float in the water. Again, the children were astounded to see the pumpkin floating on the water, thus predicting it would have sunk given its weight.

The lesson was extended to learning about the parts of a pumpkin and its lifecycle. We also read books and sang songs about pumpkins throughout the week. In short, the students had a "pumpkin" old time with this topic and learned so much, while having fun, as a result.

2nd GRADE NEWS

Second grade has been busy rolling into October and learning new things. In Science, we learned why pumpkins are orange and why they grow in the fall. A spooktacular time was had by all creating pumpkins



after reading Spookley the Square Pumpkin. Students then demonstrated their creativity by writing about their numpking. Fun Fridays allow



tivity by writing about their pumpkins. Fun Fridays allow the students to be creative and have fun with directed drawing art lessons.

1ST GRADE NEWS

We have had students in class for the past five weeks. Students are continuing to gain an understanding of the expected behavior for First Grade. We have introduced the Zones of Regulation



to help students regulate their emotions.



We began a new Unit of Study in Language Arts. We are learning about "What makes a Community", which includes jobs, buildings, communities in nature, helping in our communities and finding our way.

The skills we have been focusing on are story elements, inflectional endings with _ed and _ing, contractions, and singular and plural nouns. We continue to work on building short vowel words and much more through our Wonders series.

The students have just finished our unit on subtraction. We will begin Topic 4: Adding and Subtracting numbers to 12.

This last week of October was our Red Ribbon Week. We will be teaching the first graders how to make good choices to keep their bodies healthy.

4TH GRADE NEWS

The first trimester will soon be in the past on November 13th, and the students are doing a fantastic job of acquiring the necessary 4th grade skills. Their first report card will be coming home soon. I encourage families to view the AERIES grade report that is sent to your email bi-weekly with your student, and discuss with your student what they are doing well, and what they need to improve upon. This is also a good time to ensure all assignments have been turned in by your student. Students are also encouraged to check their grades during the school day. This is a good habit to start early in their education.

Hip-Hop-Hooray for P.E.!!! The kids are super excited on Mondays and Thursdays for our P.E. days with Coach Joel. He does a great job of creating fun games for the kids to play while keeping them physically distanced. We have been busy in math with place value, adding and subtracting large numbers, and we

will soon move on to multiplication. Students will be exposed to different ways of multiplying two digit by one-digit numbers and must be able to solve problems by using the different strategies taught. Students

have also been working on iReady to strengthen their math skills.



In social studies, students are working hard learning all about California Indians. Students are working on different projects to help cement their knowledge of the tribes.
