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It's a Great Day to be a Hannan Hawk

Within Archbishop Hannan High School's comparatively brief history, the institution has known numerous periods of transition and, in spite of various hardships, the school persevered. It was those who believed in the mission of the school who continuously saw to its growth and success. Father Charles Latour proved to be among these advocates; as principal, servant leader, and pastoral guide, Father Latour laid the foundation for the Archbishop Hannan High School known and loved today.

In August 2005, Hurricane Katrina devastated Archbishop Hannan High School – a home to 570 students in Meraux, Louisiana. What followed was an Archdiocesan decision to relocate the school to the Northshore – a region in desperate need of a co-educational, Catholic high school. While the facilities and physical location changed, the inherent intangibles that made Archbishop Hannan what it was remained. Commitment to the mission and motto of the school carried the institution through even the darkest transitional moments that many schools would not survive; and yet, Archbishop Hannan not only subsisted, but grew to the magnanimous institution it is today.

Much of this could be attributed, as aforementioned, to the school's most devoted advocates – among them, Father Charles Latour, who entered the Hannan family in August 2010. What followed this welcoming, one can only assume, was a falling in love with Archbishop Hannan High School, on the part of Latour. When examining his litany of contributions to the school, one can only tie such passionate devotion to a deep love for community. His tenderness for each student and his unrelenting will to witness the school's success translated into a number of individual contributions which, in sum, embodied positive growth.

PERSONNEL

As the saying goes, "It takes a village to raise a child." Anyone working within education as a teacher, counselor, or principal knows this to be true. Father Latour embraced this mentality in his initial construction of a dynamic administrative team and experienced faculty. Joseph Hines, former Athletic Director/Disciplinarian and present Dean of Students, stated, "[Latour's] biggest contribution was how quickly he put a staff together that turned this school in the right direction. He, as well as Dr. Donalyn Hassenboehler and Mrs. Nancy Baird, found quality teachers to come in and quickly make an immediate impact on this school – namely, on the students. It changed public opinion of the school almost instantly." Among the influential teachers hired in Latour's initial years of service was Timothy Anger of the History department, who noted, "I remember when I was interviewed by Father Charles for a job at Hannan over a decade ago. I was so impressed with his vision for the school and his commitment to making this the best possible environment for students that I was immediately sold. I knew that this was where I wanted to continue my teaching career. I have never regretted my decision to accept the job and I owe Father Charles a debt of gratitude for selecting me to teach at Archbishop Hannan High School." It was, in fact, Latour's vision and his commitment to it that proved so contagious in his rebuilding of the school. With a mindfulness regarding Archbishop Hannan's traditions and inherent values – all of which served as a foundation – he propelled the school community forward, alongside individuals who likewise believed in his vision.

What naturally followed the hiring of an experienced and devoted faculty and staff was a strategic structuring of that staff. Various positions – Director of Student Activities, Technology Integration Specialist, Advancement Director, and Assistant Principal for Administration – were newly instituted under Latour's leadership, in order to ensure that due attention was paid to various aspects of the student experience. Additionally, preexisting structures were reimagined in order to stimulate productivity. Departments were converted into Professional Learning Committees (PLC's) and PLC Leaders became the vehicle of communication from the classroom to administration via Curriculum Council – a monthly gathering of department leaders and administrators alike, designed to further develop preexisting procedures, curriculum, etc. These systemic changes, among others, oriented a devoted faculty, staff, and administration towards constant improvement; it created a culture where "average" was not permitted.

ACADEMICS

The expectations set forth by Latour and his fellow administrators naturally translated to students as well. "Academic Excellence" became an axiom which guided, and continues to direct, academic life; in fact, it fully characterizes the academic progress witnessed under Latour's leadership. In his first year as principal, the school offered a total of three Advanced Placement (AP) courses; today, the curriculum boasts fourteen different AP classes in various departments and a schoolwide pass rate of 85%. This past school year, Archbishop Hannan named 40 AP Scholars: students who have taken multiple AP exams and earned exemplary scores on each. The Project Lead the Way (PLTW) Program is yet another way in which high school students can earn college credit; in both the Engineering and Biomedical tracks, Archbishop Hannan students have celebrated great success. Since 2010, Archbishop Hannan has named 15 National Merit Semifinalists – a national title granted to elite eleventh graders who have scored highly on the PSAT. The ACT 30+ Club – an in-house recognition of all Archbishop Hannan students who have scored a 30 or above on the ACT – has 89 members. At present, Archbishop Hannan offers 45 electives to accompany a stout core curriculum and develop each student holistically.

These exemplary honors stem from an academic and curricular focus under Latour's leadership; not only were the curriculum guide and course offerings updated, but strides were made to ensure that students were learning. In order to effectively teach a generation of students surrounded by technology, Latour updated the 1 to 1 technology program. MacBooks replaced iPads and in 2013, Archbishop Hannan converted to virtually all e-book textbooks. Latour ensured that he consistently provided students with the premiere educational experience and worked to provide this reality through a variety of means.



FACILITIES

Under Latour's leadership, Archbishop Hannan's student body went from 185 students in 2010 to 620 students by 2020. This exponential growth over a mere ten years, of course, necessitated a rapid expansion of facilities – and like in all other aforementioned realms, Latour did not disappoint. Over his ten-year tenure, he oversaw the building of the following facilities: the library, the 300-classroom building, Hawk Field, the weight room, the cheer and wrestling building, the band/choir room, the victory bell, and others. He likewise reimagined spaces like the chapel, the counseling center, the front office, the technology center, various science labs, etc. The focus upon providing students with the upmost experience, within and outside of the classroom, made Archbishop Hannan High School all the more enticing to incoming students. Spaces in which to practice, exercise, and learn were always striven for; rarely did students ever have to live without. Therefore, a surge in athletic and activity participation was the subsequent result.

ATHLETICS

Under the direction of Joseph Hines, Athletic Director, and a talented coaching staff, Archbishop Hannan's athletic department likewise thrived. Latour cherished the notion that athletics cultivate virtue within student athletes; he continuously ensured that coaches led, and students performed with this mentality. Joseph Hines noted that "Latour's effect on athletics came from his understanding the importance of athletics to a high school's culture. He moved quickly adding facilities: a stadium, a weight room, and so on. It all spoke to the importance of athletics, in his mind." His drive to propel the athletic department forward resulted in notable success for various LHSAA teams. During Latour's time as principal, the following District Championships were won by Archbishop Hannan teams:

Girls' Volleyball: 2009, 2010, 2011, 2012, 2017, 2018 Girls' Cross Country: 2014, 2015, 2016, 2017 Girls' Track: 2010, 2011, 2014, 2015, 2016, 2017 Girls' Softball: 2010, 2011, 2012, 2013, 2014, 2015, 2016, 2017, 2018

Boys' Baseball: 2010, 2011, 2012, 2013, 2014, 2016, 2017, 2018 Boys' Cross Country: 2015, 2016, 2017 Boys' Basketball: 2015, 2016, 2018, 2019 Boys' Football: 2018 Boys' Track: 2014, 2015, 2016, 2017 Boys' Golf: 2015

In addition to the litany of District Championships, Latour celebrated three softball state championships in 2011, 2012, and 2019, as well as a volleyball state championship in 2018. In 2013, when our football team advanced to the state championship A number of Archbishop Hannan athletes have continued onward in collegiate athletics, contributing all that they learned on the court, on the field, in the weight room.

STUDENT LIFE

The students of Archbishop Hannan High School boast well-roundedness as among their finest qualities; active participation in the classroom, in athletics, and in student activities is encouraged as they grow into men and women of God. Father Charles Latour consistently supported students – whom he consistently called "his kids" – in their various endeavors, and he always made a point to celebrate their subsequent successes. After appointing Mr. Charles Baird as Director of Student Activities, the extra-curricular offerings naturally expanded; the introduction of various clubs, honor societies, and intramural sports ensured that every student at Archbishop Hannan High School had a home. Charles Baird declared Father Charles not his boss, but his "mentor." When asked about his personal experience under Father's leadership, Baird stated that "[Latour] entrusted [him] to expand student activities – in particular, student council and the development of student leadership. I was empowered to teach my class, develop an overnight leadership retreat, and start a multi-day leadership academy. He truly exemplified an educator at heart, as he worked to develop the whole student." Adolfo Rodriguez, as a teacher and advisor of the Blackfriars Theatre Troupe, testified, "One thing for which I am grateful to Father Charles is his courage in allowing the Blackfriars the artistic freedom to pursue works that might have caused some controversy or even offended some...he gave us the creative space to be real artists on stage, and it has borne much fruit in the lives of many. For that, I will always be thankful."

HIS LEGACY

Timothy Anger, a veteran teacher at Archbishop Hannan, recalled, "When I reflect upon some of [Latour's] numerous contributions to our school, I immediately think about his level of dedication and commitment to making Archbishop Hannan the premiere high school on the Northshore...He helped build a strong foundation that will benefit our school for years to come." It is difficult to truly articulate one's contribution, when so much of a legacy is comprised of intangibles. For while I – as the author of this article – can recount every facility added to campus and every district championship won, so much more comprises the spirit and heart of a school. I would perhaps challenge that, while Father Charles Latour's physical contributions are nearly innumerable, they are not the weightiest influences.



Rather, here are a few notable accounts worth mentioning:

Hawk Field opened in 2012, and for as long as the song was reasonably popular, Father Charles would sit on the railing of the student section and sing "Chicken Fried" – yes, he would sing about fried chicken and cold beer and the radio on.

When Archbishop Philip Hannan passed away in 2011, Father Charles bussed the entire student body and faculty to his funeral in New Orleans. Certainly, this was a logistical feat – and yet, attendance of the Hannan family was a priority in his eyes.

At every graduation for ten years, Father Charles would address the senior class. The addresses gradually become more and more elaborate – sometimes even including PowerPoints and video clips – all in an effort to make fun of the graduates one last time. And while laughter always ensued, he nevertheless choked back tears each time as well in saying goodbye to "his kids."

Father Charles made a point to respect tradition while also incorporating new customs over the years. Among the updated rituals was an annual performance with the varsity cheer squad at the Homecoming Pep Rally, in which he always ended up in an impressive stunt position by the end. He was always ready to put his life on the line for a good laugh.

His attire became more Hannan-like over the years. Most notably, crimson pants became a frequently worn part of his wardrobe.

He flew to Orlando, Florida for nearly every senior class trip during his ten years. His job did not allow a three-day Disney adventure, and yet, he always made a point to reserve one day to share with each senior class.

Surely, one can attribute Archbishop Hannan High School's success to the number of accomplishments achieved by Father Charles Latour in his ten years as principal. That being said, running a high school – being an educator – is a matter of heart. Mrs. Nancy Baird, Father Charles' successor as Interim Head of School and present Associate Head of School calls Latour "an excellent mentor for [her] as a pastoral leader as well as an academic leader." She characterizes him as "a relationship builder [who] taught her the importance of maintaining effective relationships with individuals on all sides – pupils, parents, colleagues, and visitors." It is indeed that legacy – his legacy as "a relationship builder" and charitable force – that subsists in Archbishop Hannan High School. Archbishop Hannan was and always is a family in which many yearn to partake, and it is not because of the upscale facilities or classroom capacities. Rather, it is because of the prospect of having relationships – of having a high school experience – like the one Father Charles Latour created for students of Archbishop Hannan.

To conclude, with one final contribution – perhaps among the most notable – Father Charles instituted a favorited turn-of-phrase: "It's a great day to be a Hannan Hawk. All day, every day." The Hannan family prays that – for each of his days – he may cherish his time as a Hannan Hawk. All day, every day.

New Head of School, Same Hannan

It has been a year of change at Archbishop Hannan High School.

From being forced to close during the COVID-19 pandemic at the end of the 2019-20 school year to opening under heavy restrictions – new Head of School Chad Barwick has had anything but a normal start to his life at school.

Barwick said despite the challenges the school year has been a blessing.

"It was all up in the air. But I'm so grateful for our wonderful administration, faculty, staff, parents and students showed flexibility and patience as we prepared," Barwick said. "The Holy Spirit gave us the grace to open and keep our Hawks safe."

Despite the challenges, the school has experienced a successful start to the 2020-21 year and Barwick has made a positive impact with his perspective.

"From the sanitation to the unique scheduling with online students as well as in-person students we moved mountains to make sure our students could be here in person," Barwick said. "The year has been incredibly successful so far despite the challenges and I'm proud of our Hawk Family for everything they have done."

Barwick was hired after Archbishop Hannan High School School embarked on a nationwide search in the Spring of 2019 after Fr. Charles Latour, O.P. announced his resignation set to begin in January 2020. Guided by the educational consulting firm Partners in Mission, the School's Interview Committee reviewed materials from an experienced set of candidates. They then selected two finalists to visit the campus for more extensive interviews with representative members of the Archbishop Hannan community. Barwick's appointment by Dr. RaeNell Houston, the Superintendent of Catholic Schools, was based on the wholehearted recommendation from the various interview groups.

Barwick has a rich background in Catholic education, having served 20 years in Catholic schools in a variety of roles including principal at Montgomery Catholic Preparatory School, in Montgomery Alabama, and St. Anthony de Padua Catholic School in South Bend, Indiana, as well as teacher and coach at Mount de Sales Academy in Macon, Georgia.

The Alabama native holds a Bachelor's degree in History from Auburn University, a Master of Educational Administration, and a Master in Education degree from the University of Notre Dame.

"Education has absolutely been a vocation and not a job for me," Barwick said. "I need the Eucharist and the ability to be in prayer to do this job...I'm incredibly lucky that my faith life is also my work life.



"I love to give back to the Church by doing what I love with kids, teachers, and families."

Barwick has ties to the Covington area and is looking forward to raising his family within the close-knit Northshore community, as well as the little joys of life that Louisiana can provide.

"I have six kids, and when my wife was pregnant with the sixth, we came and visited Hannan and every kid that I walked by said hello, every adult made time to make us feel welcomed," Barwick said. "One of the first things my kids are looking forward to doing is throwing the football in the backyard, riding the bike down the street. We are just thrilled to be in this area and have all the benefits of having family close by provides."

They each have an incredibly strong work ethic and are never satisfied with less than their best. As their math teacher, I appreciate their desire to understand. These young ladies are not satisfied with knowing how to do something; they want to know why. I am proud of each of them for becoming National Merit Semifinalists, but more importantly, I am proud of the students they are."

We would like to also congratulate Alexander Lala who has been recognized as a Commended Student. About 34,000 juniors receive Letters of Commendation in recognition of their outstanding academic promise. Although they do not compete for National Merit Scholarships, some Commended Students do become candidates for scholarships sponsored by corporations and businesses.
