State

PUBLIC	PRIVATE
Receive some funding by State tax dollars	Do not receive funding from State taxes
Offer reduced "in-state" tuition rates to students who reside within state boundaries	Do not differentiate tuition based upon student's state of residence
Often larger in size	Often smaller in size
No religious affiliation	May have a religious affiliation
May have a lower "sticker price"	"Sticker price" may appear higher

Admission Plans

Early Decision (ED) - Binding, can only apply ED to one school, private schools

Restrictive Early Action (REA) - Non-binding, rules vary, but restrict what admissions plans that you can use at other schools.

Early Action (EA) - non-binding, non-restrictive, often tied to scholarships, public/private

Regular Decision - non-binding, later deadlines/decisions, public/private

Rolling Admissions - non-binding, ongoing, public/private

Admissions Selectivity


- Varies depending on the college/university and can even vary within the school
- Schools that admit fewer than 25% of applicants are unpredictable
- > Where You Go is not Who You'll Be, Frank Bruni
- Where you start does not necessarily determine where you'll finish a word about community colleges

Admissions Criteria

- Minimum course requirements (English, math, science, social studies, world language, etc.)
- Grades and grade trends
- Course rigor
- Standardized test scores (ACT/SAT)
- Extracurricular and community participation/leadership
- Essays
- Letters of recommendation
- Demonstrated interest

Optional COVID Essay

- Truly Optional.
- Consider keeping any COVID related essay in this section. Show more sides of "student" in the other essays.
- Keep big picture in mind, if nothing really to say, no need to write in this section.
 - ► Illness or loss within your family or support network
 - ► Employment or housing disruptions
 - ► Food insecurity
 - Toll on mental and emotional health
 - New obligations such as part-time work or care for siblings or family members
 - Availability of computer or internet access required to continue your studies
 - Access to a safe and quiet study space
 - ▶ A new direction for your major or career interests




Suggested Coursework

Standardized Testing

- SAT and/or ACT are accepted at all colleges/universities
- Tests are designed to be taken in spring of junior year
- Many (even most) universities are test optional
 - Fairtest.org
 - Go to specific school website
- ➤ April 13, 2021: all juniors will take SAT + essay during the school day

Important Dates



Timeline: Sophomore year

- Seek opportunities for career/interest exploration
- Seek support from your counselor during course selection to help you find appropriate academic coursework and rigor to meet educational and career goals (November, 2020)
- Link your College Board and Khan Academy accounts in preparation for the PSAT and SAT
- Begin to explore colleges and admission criteria
- Attend sophomore SCoPE meeting with your counselor (spring)
- □ CCC event for sophomore families (spring, 2021)

Timeline: Junior Year

- Continue to explore interests
- Attend college fairs and college rep visits
- CCC event for junior families (December 9, 2020)
- Seek support from your counselor during course selection to help you find appropriate academic coursework and rigor to meet educational and career goals (January, 2021)
- Schedule a junior P-SCoPE meeting with post-secondary counselor (spring)
- ☐ SAT exam (April 13, 2021)
- ACT exam (optional)

Timeline: Senior year

- October 1 FAFSA opens (recommended completion by end of October)
- October Attend FAFSA Completion Night and Financial Aid Night at SHS
- Retake ACT/SAT no later than end of October (optional)
- October 15 "recommended" application deadline for all public universities and all ED/REA/EA applications
- November 30 "recommended" deadline for all other four-year universities
- Fall attend college rep visits in the CCC
- ☐ Fall attend college fairs
- Visit college campuses
- May 1 Commit to one college
