#### **Intellectual Theological Education**

Christian life involves the whole person. We want our students to be able to engage their faith with all of their intellectual power, and with all of the Church's wisdom working beside them.

#### **Develop Your Identity**

We provide a distinctively Catholic intellectual formation in the Holy Cross tradition that is open and hospitable to other religious identities and experiences as well as to questioning.

#### Dialogue with Difference

## Regular Course Offerings - Theology

All of these courses are one-semester and have honors-level options.

#### **Knowing God**

Christian Foundations: personal identity, natural revelation, the Bible, the Mass.

#### **Following Jesus**

Fundamental Christology: the person and work of Jesus Christ, the plan of redemption.

#### Living in Christ

Moral Theology: the nature and structure of moral acts, sin, and the commandments.

#### **Loving God**

Foundational Doctrines: the Trinity, the Incarnation, creation, redemption, the theology of the body.

#### Being the Church

Fundamental Ecclesiology: the nature of the Church, the sacraments.

#### Serving God's Kingdom

Catholic Social Teaching: principles of justice and virtue in building a just social order.

# Senior Year — Dual Credit Option!

#### **Encountering World Religions**

Students study five major international world religions—Judaism, Christianity, Islam, Hinduism, and Buddhism—from the perspective of Catholic inter-religious dialogue in this year-long course.


#### Marymount Dual Enrollment

#### **Interesting Field Trips!**

Including the Basilica of the National Shrine of the Immaculate Conception, the Franciscan Monastery of the Holy Land in America, the John Paul II National Shrine, Diyanet Center of America and the United States Holocaust Memorial Museum. World Religion classes visit and engage in conversation with leaders of other faiths.

#### Representation in Catholic Culture

Our students are regular winners of the John Carroll Society annual essay competition, and are given the option of participating in the yearly March for Life in January.



### Flex Your Faith

#### **Campus Ministry**

We offer recurring weekly opportunities for spiritual formation: Mass, Confession, Adoration, Rosary, prayer, *lectio divina*, praise and worship. We celebrate Mass as a gathered school at least monthly.

#### **Social Justice**

All students are required to complete service hours each grade level to serve the young, the old, and the disadvantaged.
