Remembrance Day













On Wednesday morning, the school gathered in their year group bubbles for an act of remembrance for Armistice Day. Socially distanced we were able to join together to mark this significant day in the freedom of our nation.

The choir opened with a beautiful rendition of In Flanders Fields, which you can watch a recorded version of here. Reverend Kitto then lead a service and prayers, with some lovely readings from Mrs Shayler and Mr Close.

Mrs Shayler laid a wreath at our Tommy war memorial, with clay poppies scattered around it, as the Union Jack was lowered. Mr Hall played The Last Post on the cornet as we stood and reflected for two minutes before the flag was raised, the reveille played and we ended in prayer.

It was a solemn and poignant moment of gathering and remembrance, and was the first time we had gathered together since the initial lockdown earlier this year.

You can wear mufti clothes to school! Please bring a donation of £2 to go towards the charity.


ODD SOCKS DAY

BEBRAS COMPUTATIONAL THINKING CHALLENGE

During their Computing & ICT lessons over this week, Year 7 pupils have been taking part in the National Bebras Computational Thinking Challenge.

What is the Bebras Computational Thinking Challenge?

Bebras is an international initiative aiming to promote informatics (Computer Science) and computational thinking among school pupils at all ages. The challenges are made up of a set of short problems called 'Bebras tasks' and are delivered online. The tasks are fun, engaging and based on problems that computer scientists often encounter and enjoy solving. The tasks are solved without prior knowledge, but instead require logical thinking.


Even though some of the challenges were pretty hard, our pupils thoroughly enjoyed having a go at solving them and we eagerly await the results, which should be with us before the end of term.

VIRTUAL TOUR OF THE BATTLEFIELD OF HASTINGS

This week, 7BM were the first group be able to experience a virtual site visit to the Battlefield of Hastings. This has been a first for the Millfield Prep History Department and has involved working with Mr Ingram, Head of History at Claverham Community College, whose school is only a few miles away from the battlefield. Over the past few months, the department have been designing an immersive experience for pupils to experience as they examine what happened on that fateful day in October 1066.

Alongside a selection of 30 photographs that have been taken over the summer, the History Department have designed the virtual tour of the battlefield with the route that school groups would take when visiting the site.

Starting from Battle Abbey, the pupils were taken across to the Norman starting position, took in the sweep of the field, the information boards which detail the events of the day and climbed up Senlac Hill to end the tour at Harold's Marble. We were very fortunate that Mr Close added his narration, guiding the class expertly across the battlefield, identifying key moments and decisions, places and people who shaped this monumental event. This gave pupils the chance to add extra details, make valuable links to events and highlight key moments by seeing the battlefield. We hope this gives pupils a real sense of history coming to life!

This virtual site visit will be given to all Year 7 pupils in their History lessons next week as they prepare for their Hastings assessment.

The Scorch Trails review by Henry C






So, you wanna hear about the plot? Well you should read the book but here's an intro.






RECEPTION ARMISTICE DAY
