Our assembly on Monday morning was led by Mrs Austin who focused on how those who fought and died in war did so in the service of others and we reflected on how we can honour their memory by being of service to those around us.

Our small service in the chapel on Wednesday was shared with the school community across Microsoft Teams and a representative from each year group placed a small cross with a poppy in the Memorial Garden alongside the wreath laid on behalf of the Junior School by our Heads of School, Tegan and Ava.

The children in Year 5 have also created the most wonderful poppies from clay as part of their Art lessons. The individual approach, attention to detail and care that have been put into their crafting have created a thought provoking display. My thanks to Miss Ciccone for leading this endeavour.

Alongside the reflection and thoughtfulness that surrounds Remembrance Day, there is always an enduring sense of hope. Hope that those lives taken, the sacrifices made and the service given were not in vain. A hope that by honouring those who died, that we will continue to strive for peace and to resolve differences without conflict. This hope is rooted at the very heart of Royal Russell and is as important today as it has ever been.

Where there is hope, there is the room for kindness. Although Friday the 13th may not be the most auspicious of dates, it is World Kindness Day today and in our Celebration Assembly, Mrs Pain asked our community to think about how we can show kindness to each other. However we choose to show that kindness to others, now is an important time to do so.










Remembrance Day

The Importance of Conversation

Talking and listening to children brings about a multitude of benefits. Chatting about everyday things is an excellent way to help develop language and communication skills, which is an important life-skill.



By hearing people's thoughts, we consequently learn and observe facial and body expressions that show emotions.

Conversation, by its nature, advances self-reflection and enriches confidence and self-esteem. Furthermore, it is a physical connection between people. With technology being an ever-present aspect of our day-to-day lives, we need to remain mindful of screens not replacing face-to-face interactions and find an appropriate balance.

Undoubtedly, speech and communication lie at the heart of classroom practice. At Royal Russell, teachers and teaching assistants support oracy in the classroom in a multitude of ways.
