At-a-Glance COVID-19 Handout

NC DHHS has clarified that in order for someone (student or employee) to return to school after having symptoms that could be COVID-19, **a negative molecular PCR (polymerase chain reaction) COVID test**, rather than a rapid antigen test, is required along with the other below details.

Individuals who receive a positive COVID-19 test should provide a statement from their physician clearing them to return as long as that is in line with school policy.

* Recovery is defined as the resolution of symptoms and absence of fever without the use of fever-reducing medications.

** Fever-free is defined as the absence of fever without the use of fever-reducing medicines.

Testing

Testing is done based on CDC recommendation for those with symptoms, those who do not have symptoms, but came in close contact with someone who has tested positive, and those who are in a CDC-defined high-risk group. MSD recommends that employees and families utilize their primary care physician (PCP) to seek medical care. CDC does not recommend widespread, asymptomatic testing, and instead recommends that all individuals take preventative measures including wearing face coverings and maintaining physical distancing to reduce the spread of the COVID-19 virus.
