Duncanville High School Automotive Technology students are accustomed to rolling up their sleeves and getting their hands dirty while working on cars in their garage classroom. Recently, they've been focusing on a special project - making repairs to a vehicle that's a raffle prize to raise money for the Duncanville ISD Education Foundation.
