

## Picture of the Week Remembrance Writing


Remember by Dylan P-C

Who remembers the war? Hopefully everyone. Cycling through this beautiful, peaceful place I think of all the people who were protecting our country and risking there own lives for us. On the 11th of November we take two minutes of our day just to remember those who have fallen in the line of duty. On this day an unknown body was taken to Westminster abbey from France and buried in front of the kings.

I cycle through this amazing place feeling like those that aren't with us, actually are. My great grandfather fought In the war and the stories my mum told me about what he was like are amazing. He got taken from home and went to war in his late 20s when my granny was just a baby. He was a soldier, got captured by the German Nazis and was put in a prisoner of war camp. For over three and a half years he was there, and for the first year he was put in an Italian prisoner of war camp and then transferred to a German camp. He eventually came home and his daughter, my granny, didn't recognise him. You wouldn't believe what they went through.

As I pass through it's hard to imagine people as young as 18 years of age having to kill people and watch people die in front of them. As well this, I think of the women who left at home not knowing if their son, brother, father, cousin will ever come home.

Mrs Beer keeps her deer In her dirty, hairy ear


Mrs Dennings keeps her lemmings Inside her giant, stripy leggings

### **Marvellous Models**



Year 8 geographers are learning about the topic 'Coasts' this term. We would usually spend a day out on a fieldtrip at Lulworth Cove in Dorset, finding out about how the sea shapes coastline but due to Covid restrictions, we have had to adapt how we approach the topic. Year 8 were therefore set a challenge to create a model to show how a headland is eroded. They needed to include the following stages: crack, cave, arch, stack and stump. Here are some examples of the creations the pupils made. ## **Christmassy Crisps**

On Saturday during Multis, pupils from Champion and Chestnut (in two separate sessions) took part in a blind tasting of some of the more unusual Christmassy crisp flavours: sausage roll puffs, smoked salmon and king prawn cocktail, pigs in blankets, Camembert and thyme, turkey stuffing bites, butter basted turkey and herb, Aberdeen Angus steak and truffle! Of the seven flavours on offer, two pupils from Chestnut were able to correctly identify two of the flavours - believe me this was quite impressive considering the crisp flavour descriptions and the actual ingredients were hard to match up.

The most popular flavour across both houses were the pigs in blankets flavour; we definitely wouldn't be recommending the Camembert and thyme or the smoked salmon and king prawn!
