



Pupils in Years 6, 7 & 8 have all been studying Programming & Coding in their weekly Computing & ICT lessons this half of term.

Year 6 have been looking at Kodu Game Lab.

What is Kodu Game Lab?

Kodu Game Lab is a 3D game development environment that is designed to teach basic programming principles. It allows creators to build their world's terrain, populate it with characters and props, and then programme their behaviours and the game's rules in a bespoke visual programming language.

Year 7 have been looking at Scratch and have been creating their own Pac-Man style game.

What is Scratch?

Scratch is a programming language where you can programme your own interactive stories, games and animations. Its graphical nature helps the users to learn how to think creatively, reason systematically and work collaboratively — all essential skills for life in the 21st century.

Year 8 have been introduced to text based programming by learning the Python Programming Language.

What is the Python Programming Language?

Python is a powerful general purpose programming language that is used in web development, data science, creating software prototypes and much more. It has simple easy to use syntax that makes Python an excellent language to introduce text based programming.

I have been really pleased with the way all the pupils have engaged in their lessons this term and they have shown great creativity in the different programming & coding tasks completed.

7AYC - most productive group, creating more than one entry


8ECC - smallest entry, but very thoughtful


