Many children chose to do a debate on whether primary aged children should be allowed to walk to school.


In Year 3, they split into groups who chose to speak "against" it while another group chose to speak "for" it.



















Russell Powers

What are Russell Powers and why do we need them?

Our Russell Powers are, in a nutshell, learning powers that provide the opportunity to make the 'implicit' learning skills 'explicit' within the classroom. These implicit learning skills, so key in life, are being made explicit to the children and are showcased across the Junior School. They provide children with life-long skills that they will need to be equipped with for successful futures, and importantly they provide a common language for learning across the school.

I have had the pleasure of visiting several classrooms over the past weeks to discuss why our children find Russell Powers helpful. We talked about the exciting prospect of the jobs that they will be doing as successful 25-year-olds that might not even exist yet - we likened this with the creators of popular technology products today and how those jobs did not exist once upon a time! The world is very much a blank canvas in terms of what the children may do, but whatever it is that they end up doing, they will certainly need key skills, or powers, to do it successfully. It was warming to hear from the children about the number of times they have used Russell Powers, whether in school or out of school, and also of the limitless life-span of these powers as they, when asked how long they would need to use their powers for, they simply said, "Forever!".

In the Junior School, we have seven 'Russell Powers' that are embedded into all aspects of school life to build these vital skills from the earliest age. We love using these Russell Powers across all areas of our learning. All of our teaching staff are committed to making these Russell Powers as effective as possible, and as such over the past academic year have undertaken a review so as to maximise their impact. As a result of this, we will be 'tweaking' our Russell Powers and aim to launch this fully in January... so watch this space! In the meantime, you may wish to talk to your child about how they have used their Russell Powers this week!

Forest School

We are so lucky to have our very own Forest School at Royal Russell within our School grounds. The children love being outside in most weather conditions and getting muddy as they are dressed appropriately.

The children use their Russell Powers at every session and it is so lovely to see them in an outdoor environment and the creativity they have.



Currently Nursery and Reception are visiting Forest School once a week and Year 1 and Year 2 visit alternate weeks.





The children take part in a focus activity run by the Forest School Leader which might include sawing, whittling, fire lighting, drilling, campfires and cooking.
