Redmond Learning Community Boundary online input

In January 2017, a <u>boundary committee</u> began the work to recommend new school attendance boundaries in the Redmond area due to the building of two new elementary and one new middle schools. The FIRST robotics team from **Eastlake High School**, Top Gun, concluded its season last week in the top 5 percent of robotics teams in the world. They competed at the world championships in Houston, Texas, from April 19-22. During the competition, they finished 5-4-1, ending 22nd in a division of 68 teams. They were selected in the first round of alliance selections by the 7th-seeded team.



They made it to their division quarterfinals and forced a tie-breaker match against the number 3 seed.
