Schools all around Lake Washington School District celebrated Veterans Day with assemblies last week. Here are a few examples:

- At Benjamin Franklin Elementary, retired Coast Guard Radioman First Class David Dominguez spoke to students about his time serving in the Coast Guard from 1982-2006. Dominguez is a familiar face at Franklin – he now works as an LWSD technical support specialist. The school reserved seats in the front for honored veterans – parents, grandparents, great-grandparents and friends of students and staff.
- Inglewood Middle School students heard from Commander Kerry Smith with the U.S. Navy (retired). Smith served in the Navy for 22 years, including two deployments overseas. She attended the U.S. Naval Academy, followed by Navy Flight School where she learned to fly F-14 Tomcats. At the assembly, Smith provided students with insight into the differences between Veterans Day and Memorial Day and gave them suggestions of how to honor our veterans.
