Lake Washington earns place on prestigious Advanced Placement District Honor Roll

For the second year in a row, the College Board named Lake Washington School District (LWSD) to its Annual AP District Honor Roll. LWSD is one of only 425 public school districts in the nation and one of ten in Washington to be honored.

The Honor Roll recognizes districts that increase access to Advanced Placement (AP) coursework while maintaining or increasing the percentage of students earning scores of 3 or higher on AP exams. Districts that reach these goals successfully identify motivated, academically prepared students who are likely to benefit from rigorous AP course work. Read more.

LWSD School Board Accepts Task Force Recommendations, Including Recommendation to Build More Schools

School board member Chris Carlson called the Long Term Facilities Task Force's recommendations "spectacular, very useful to us." At its November 23 regular meeting, the Lake Washington School District Board of Directors unanimously approved those recommendations and charged Superintendent Traci Pierce with taking action on them. The district has begun to implement the Task Force's recommendations. One next step addresses the Task Force's recommendation that the district build new schools to accommodate its rapidly growing enrollment. Several Task Force strategies involve efficiency and cost-effectiveness. It provided strategies to lower costs, such as specific cost-effective design principles.

Dr. Pierce has convened a Bond Advisory Committee to provide feedback and advice to the Superintendent on a short-term and long-term funding strategy and project timing plan that is aligned to the Task Force recommendations. The Advisory Committee includes parent and community representatives including members of the Task Force, business and city government representatives. Read more.
