Ready Start Preschool Program accepting applications

Looking for a preschool option? Lake Washington School District's Ready Start Preschool Program will begin accepting tuition-based applications for the 2016-17 school year on March 30 from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. Registration takes place at the LWSD Resource Center. After March 30, applications will be accepted on any school day from 9:00 a.m. to noon and 1:30 p.m. to 3:30 p.m.

If more children than can be accommodated are registered for any one location or session (a.m. or p.m.), a lottery will be held April 4 to determine the students in those classes. Lottery results will be announced by the end of April.

Research shows school facilities affect learning According to a 2002 research review by the National <u>Clearinghouse for Educational Facilities</u>, school buildings themselves have an effect on academic outcomes. Specifically, they found "School facilities affect learning. Spatial configurations, noise, heat, cold, light, and air quality obviously bear on students' and teachers' ability to perform."

Among other research, the <u>Collaborative for High Performing</u> <u>Schools</u> (CHPS) cites a recent study of school districts in California, Washington and Colorado that indicated a strong correlation between increased access to daylight and improved student performance.

The Long Term Facilities Planning Task Force recommended that the district consider strategies that improve the ability of a school to provide educational performance over the long-term. They noted that the district should "continue to leverage natural light (as required by the state) and other concepts proven to have a positive impact on learning environment." That recommendation will be followed in designs for the projects in the April bond measure. Safety Spotlight: How Lake Washington School District partners with local police

LWSD partners with the Kirkland, Redmond and Sammamish Police Departments and King County Sheriff's office to help ensure the safety of all students and staff.

LWSD also holds monthly Safety Advisory Committee meetings that include district and school representatives, parents and representatives from our police partners. We also have School Resource Officers (SROs) from each of these organizations, with a total of six full-time and two part-time SROs serving our schools.

These partnerships allow for excellent communication during an emergency. Police departments have regular access to our school buildings, so they are familiar with our facilities, staff and students.

By holding regular meetings with our representatives, LWSD can partner with the police agencies to ensure that our crisis response plans are current with best practices.
