The Legislature's McCleary Plan: Impacts to Lake Washington School District

Safety Spotlight

We care about student safety. In fact, providing safe and innovative learning environments is one of our strategic goals. Lake Washington School District's 2014 Capital Projects Levy focused on a number of safety projects across the district. Interior window treatments were installed throughout the district. When drawn, these window shades prevent people from seeing into classrooms during a lockdown. The district also installed new classroom door locks. These locks allow classrooms to be locked from the inside, rather than having to exit the classroom to lock the doors.

Redmond-Area Attendance Boundaries Finalized

Lake Washington School District (LWSD) started the work of redrawing Redmond-area attendance boundaries in January 2017. The boundary committee was charged with drawing attendance boundaries for new schools and to redistribute student enrollment due to overcrowding. Many families and community members provided feedback throughout the boundary process. The committee analyzed all feedback to develop a final recommendation. On Monday, November 20, the LWSD Board of Directors took formal action and approved the adjustment of school attendance areas in the Redmond area. The board adopted the final boundary recommendation which can be reviewed on the LWSD boundary review process webpage.
