## MR ABSALOM'S 'DAY IN THE LIFE' OF A MILLFIELD PREP PUPIL

This week, as part of my voluntary teacher placement here at Millfield Prep, I was given the opportunity to shadow one very 'lucky' pupil for the day, **Seb G** in Year 6!

Our day starts with a little time spent reflecting on Mrs Shayler's morning assembly all about kindness, making good impressions and being thoughtful towards others. I'm reminded of my old prep school motto: "Treat others how you would like to be treated" and the lasting impact those words have had on me. I wonder what other valuable life lessons I might learn today?

The bell rings for the start of lesson one and Mr McNulty gets us underway with a spot of double English. We're straight into the festive spirit with a variety of comprehension exercises based around the poem Twas the Night Before Christmas. At the end of the lesson I'm asked to judge a recital competition between the boys and the girls. The girls pinch it by a whisker with extra points awarded for rhythm, diction and good cheer.

On to the art block next, where I get the chance to dazzle Mr Maxwell with my 'sensational' art skills. I attempt (very badly) to sketch a dog, which Seb has loaded onto his iPad from a project the Year 6 pupils are working on, based around German painter Franz Marc. I scribble down various pearls of wisdom I hear from Mr Maxwell during the lesson as he passionately engages with the children, "Does it matter if I make a mistake? - No!" and "If you have a go, the hard gets easy." I like what I'm hearing. I wonder how these teachings might translate to the other areas of a these pupils personal development, whether that be in the classrooms, music rooms, or on the sports fields?

I find myself day dreaming about the return of inter-school matches and I'm desperate to find out if our pupils have managed to get an edge over their opponents during lockdown.

Next, Music - not my area of expertise... I deliberately try to keep a low profile. I leave it to the Year 6 professionals to belt out the high notes of *O Little Town of Bethlehem*. I'm staggered how well these pupils are harmonising. Fifteen lucky students get pulled out from the class to thrash out a few chords on the ukulele - surely this is what it's all about, isn't it? The opportunity to try something new each day.

Onto a spot of Maths with Miss Newman. "What's a parallelogram?", she asks the class. I avoid eye contact, just in case she's looking at me. The other pupils in the classroom kindly save my blushes further by answering for me and clearly explain the fundamental theory behind 'Base  $\,x$  Height'.

Finally, we finish our day off with an intense hockey session up at Millfield, led by Mr Guthrie, on the same pitches where I captained the Millfield 1st XI back in 1998. Talk about coming full circle and back to teaching at the Prep School.

And breathe! So what have I learnt from my 'day in the life of' experience?

Well, every day there are valuable lessons to be learnt, no matter how old we are. It's about listening, observing what's going on around you, absorbing any new knowledge that's out there and then applying it, practising it, embracing new challenges, making mistakes and overcoming existing obstacles, whether that be in the classroom or away from the school environment. That, for me, is what personal growth is all about.

This week's awards are as follows. Two are for kindness, but Oreo is always for achieving a personal goal in inquiry.






### Year 4's Compass Creations

I've killed the planet."


Who got rid of the animals?
