A Tradition Endures

IWA's Ring Ceremony and Mass is Reimagined for the COVID-19 Pandemic

he Junior Ring Ceremony is a rite of passage.

Typically held in the spring, it's when those in Incarnate Word Academy's junior class who choose to purchase one are given their class rings, and when they are recognized as heirs to the current senior class.

This year, the COVID-19 pandemic pushed back the tradition, but there was never a question of not having it. Held Sept. 30, in a socially distanced Mass at Annunciation Catholic Church, the Class of 2021 had their rings blessed and took the Women of the Word Pledge, a promise to look first to God for happiness, to uphold His teachings, and to be women of peace and mercy. Fellow students and families watched the Mass via livestream.

"I hope that every time you look at [your] ring, it will be a reminder to remain faithful to what you have learned," said the Rev. David Michael Moses, who presided over the Mass. "Because faith will give you wisdom for salvation."

The Women of the Word Pledge echoes the beatitudes, drawing on Jesus' lessons of the relationships we have with God, as well as with one another. Sister Lauren Beck, C.V.I., Incarnate Word Academy president, asked the students to consider the sacrifices made by their families and the support they received from family, faculty and each other during their time at Incarnate Word. She noted that the freshmen, sophomores and juniors look up them, and with the privilege of being seniors comes the responsibility to be role models.

"You all have been real troopers," she said, thanking them for their steadfastness. "There are many verses in Scripture that I love, but the one I want to say for today is, this is the day the Lord has made. Let us rejoice and be glad. And I think that today more than ever, we need to hear something like that."

Each senior received a rose as she exited the church, and there was a reception for the students hosted by the IWA Mothers' Club following the Mass.

"The experience of the ring ceremony was definitely different than previous ceremonies," said Mia Mendez '21. "But it was worth it, just to share that moment with close friends."

Welcome Back!

IWA Campus Opens for Hybrid Learning

hen the IWA students, faculty and staff left for spring break back in March, no one imaged the pandemic would mean they wouldn't return to the 609 for the remainder of the school year. And certainly no one imagined that as the 2020–2021 academic year began that we'd still be fully remote.

All that changed Sept. 21, when IWA welcomed students back with a hybrid learning model. Students were divided into groups A and B, depending on last name. Students had two days of on-campus, in-person class and two days of remote learning. All students were remote on Wednesdays, which were dedicated to teacher office hours.

"It is wonderful to back together as a community!" said Andrea Smith, M.Ed., LPC, NCC, IWA's principal. "This was a long time coming, and we were very cognizant that the safety of our students, faculty and staff was paramount in how we paved the road to return to campus."

Safety precautions included one-way traffic in the halls and on stairwells, using the auditorium as an overflow lunch room and seating students two to a table in the cafeteria, daily temperature checks and health screens, and hiring a COVID-19 coordinator to ensure the school was complying with mandates from both Houston and Harris County, as well as the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention.

Coming back to campus meant that upperclassmen could see pals they hadn't seen in person since March. (In some cases, it also meant making new friends, especially when a girl's core friend circle wasn't in her newly assigned group.) But the freshmen had a different experience; prior to hybrid learning, they hadn't seen each other as a full group at all.

"It's been a real blessing to get to finally meet our freshmen girls face to face," said biology teacher Stephen Comer, who teaches all the freshmen. "I can't describe how much I missed getting to see my kiddos every day. I love getting to hang out with these amazing freshmen four days a week. It's great to start building relationships again."

School counselor Erika Eberhart agrees.

"Peer interactions are so important to them at this age," she said. It's really wonderful having them taking part in classes and activities together."

IWA will return to 100 percent on-campus instruction Jan. 11, 2021.







Freshman Retreat is a Time for Reflection

bviously, the COVID-19 pandemic has changed many things about school life at IWA. But one of the things it can't change is our commitment to helping young women live out their faith and be sisters to each other.

Every year, the school offers retreats for each of its classifications. They are days of activities, discussion and prayer, designed to help the students bond, learning more about each other and themselves.

This year's Freshman Retreat, "Fly High: Break Out of Your Shell and Grow Into Your Butterfly Wings," took place Oct. 28. In a nod to the precautions necessary because of the pandemic, the event was held on campus (retreats are usually held at the Co-Cathedral of the Sacred Heart or a retreat center) and hosted on a Wednesday, which is an all-remote learning day for the student body.

They took part in activities that centered on how they could grow, as high school students, in their sisterhood together and in their faith. The day's agenda was designed by IWA's Campus Ministry Team. There was even a special DIY retreat for IWA's remote learners, which offered self-guided reflections and activities.

"I am so proud of the work the CMT put into this event," said Ana Paula Panzarini, IWA's campus minister. "They have been so creative and so dedicated to finding ways to keep us together as a community."

Faculty and students clearly felt the event was a success.

"It was so great to hear them giggle and bond together," said Kathleen Kelly, who teaches freshman English. "It really warmed by heart."

"The Freshmen are beaming this morning!" reported Catherine Neaves, who teaches freshman social studies, the day after the retreat. "Everyone did such a great job!"

The senior class had their retreat on Nov. 13 as this magazine was in final layout. The sophomore and junior retreats were in December.

Incarnate Word Academy Choir and St. Thomas Singers Join Together for an Innovative Collaboration

ach October, the Incarnate Word Academy Choir and St. Thomas High School's St. Thomas Singers host a joint concert. Conducted by IWA choir director Josh Wilson, who also directs the St. Thomas Singers, the concert is an opportunity to showcase the talents of both ensembles.

This year was different.

"The challenges of the COVID era temporarily made standard concerts difficult to impossible to put on," said Wilson. "I had the idea for doing a concert based on the rosary, using various settings of the Ave Maria (Hail Mary) and the Our Father, so I decided to make it a recorded project that we could share with the IWA and St. Thomas communities."

"A Choral Rosary" made its debut Nov. 20. In addition to the two school ensembles, the concert also featured Nora Navarro '23 on the harp and Anna Gardner '23 on flute. They were accompanied by Aaron Hervey on piano and Dr. Crista Miller on the organ of Co-Cathedral of the Sacred Heart.

Wilson said the project's creation was challenging, because the full choir was never in the same place at the same time.

"At both schools, we had hybrid models [for classes] that meant I only got a portion of the students in on any given day," he explained.



Some choir students spent the semester fully remote and were never at in-person classes. They used Zoom to be part of daily rehearsals.

"Working on this project felt harder than our other projects because I had to learn the songs and record them from home without being surrounded by the voices of my peers," said Iman Haddad

'23. "It was a fun challenge and I think it helped me to learn a lot about my abilities to learn as a singer."

"We recorded our songs in class, but then I had to edit together all the takes from the four groups of singers plus the individual singers from their homes," said Wilson.

very day on my drive to school I see many homeless people," said Tessa Watson '21. "I never know whether or not to give out money so when I can I'll buy extra Chick-fil-A nuggets and give them to someone at a red light. It just hurts to see all these people, who are just like me, with no one."

Tessa wanted to do more to help, though. It occurred to her that she could make care packages, but admits she wasn't sure what the best way to do that was. She texted her friend Emily York '21. It turns out Emily, too, was looking for a way to help the homeless.

"We came together to start collecting donations to make care packages that we could hand out to some of the people we see on our drive to school," Emily said.

Campus Minister Ana Paula
Panzarini helped them spread the
word about their work, encouraging
other IWA students to help out.
They hosted care package creation
sessions during Flex Time this fall
and, in the end, with help from
their classmates, they created nearly
100 care packages. In addition to
snacks and personal care items, the
bags contain socks, water, T-shirts



and notes of encouragement. Tessa and Emily plan to give some of the bags to individuals, as well as donate some to Magnificat Houses' Loaves and Fishes, a Houston non-profit that helps the homeless.

"Homeless shelters can only do so much," said Tessa. "Sometimes they have to turn people away and then who is left? That's why Emily and I want to individually deliver them and write notes. That human connection is so very important."

oting in Houston this year set records. And one IWA student got to see some of that happen in real time. Emily Chaires '22 spent Election Day 2020 as a high school electronics support specialist.

She applied for the position last summer and trained on polling place procedures and systems. On Election Day, she volunteered at a Kingwood elementary school polling place. Emily set up the voting machines, greeted voters, ensured no one was wearing political attire and helped two Spanish speakers cast their ballots. She also manned the judge's booth control (JBC).

"We scanned the photo ID the person gave us and gave them an access code to vote," she explained.

"The access code came from the JBC and is important because the access code is unique for that person to cast their ballot."

Emily said volunteering was a great way to see how American democracy works. She liked seeing how the voters came from different backgrounds and also learned a great deal about the voting process.

"When it is my turn to vote for the next election, I will know how to cast my ballot," she said. "And I can look back on how I helped people cast theirs."

She chose to wear her IWA letterman jacket along with a school spirit shirt for her shift.

s she was deciding where she wanted to go to high school, Fiona Cosgrove '22 said her parents encouraged her to "take the risk."



Volleyball Faces Rebuilding Year

hen Head Volleyball Coach Whitney Moffitt looks back on the 2020 season, she's grateful to have had so many players return from 2019. But she also acknowledges the challenges she and her team faced this year.

"We didn't have a preseason [because of the COVID-19] pandemic," she explained. "And we use those games to really settle in and mesh as a team."

And then, there were rules about wearing face masks and not having spectators in the stands.

"It's hard not having your parents and friends cheer you on," Moffit elaborated.

Still, Falcon volleyball persevered, and by the second half of the season, the team had upped what Moffitt calls its "volleyball IQ."

"That's really a term we use in the sport. It's about how you increase your knowledge of the sport, of your court awareness, and how you harness what you know, then build on it to become a

better player."

She said that was in evidence in the team's game against St. John XXIII High School.

"Mary Turner '22 had such a great game. She really showcased that it's not about how hard you swing, but about figuring where on the court to place the ball. And Jasmine Valladeres '23 placed really well through the whole game. So it was a cool moment seeing all that come together."

As she looks ahead to next year, Moffitt is encouraging her team members to play more volleyball during the off-season to better build where the team left off this year. She's also excited to have both Jasmine and Mary, along with several other players returning to the squad.

"These girls are more mature than some 18-year-olds I've coached," she said. "They are a pleasure to be around. They are so responsible and adult-like and intellectual. That stems from their academic environment, and they can not only understand things but apply them. That's the really cool thing about IWA."



Athletic Director Rick Perez Reflects on 20 Years at IWA

Faith, family, sportsmanship. Those could be considered the cornerstones of Rick Perez's life. A passionate supporter of athletics and its ability to transform lives, and a devout Catholic, Perez has spent two decades helping Falcons achieve their potential.







wim team to the bus on Capitol!
Soccer team to the bus on
Jackson!" The words puncture the afternoon atmosphere, ringing from the intercom through the corridors of Incarnate Word Academy. They're delivered with a staccato cadence that is the unmistakable voice of Athletic Director Rick Perez. In their wake, feet stomp down the stairs, girls chatter and doors bang as the teams head off to practice and meets. Perez, standing arms folded by the front desk, cheers them on. "Good luck, girls!"

"Coach Perez" (or simply, "Coach"), as he's known, is a beloved figure at the school. Any student who's taken part in IWA athletics, or signed up for his popular weight training class, can talk at length of the care he has for his students, his good humor, his encouragement.

"Coach always said, 'You get out of it what you put into it' and it was great seeing how we all improved as the semester went along," said Julia Romualdo dos Santos '20 who took Perez's weight training class as an elective. "We all made so much progress!"

That's exactly what Perez hoped for when he created the class.

"The girls sign up for that class for a reason," he said. "And from day 1, you look ahead. You have a goal to achieve. If they take it in the fall, by November or December, they're seeing and feeling results. I just love it when they email me and tell me how much they love the class or how it's helping them physically. When we

were in remote learning last spring and at the beginning of the year, they told me the workouts were helping them with stress and keeping them motivated."

Motivation is only one of the things Perez hopes IWA students learn from IWA's athletics and physical fitness offerings. The others include grit and gratitude, as well as learning to work together.

"Athletics teaches so many important life lessons," he said. "You learn about sacrifice. You learn about failure. Whatever happens, it's important to get back up. There's camaraderie in athletics. But you see that all over the school here."

Perez came to IWA at the start of the 2001–2002 school year, taking a job as the physical education or health and psychology teacher. At the time, he'd been teaching physical education at Mt. Carmel High School, but he had something of a relationship with IWA. His wife, Patricia (Trostmann) Perez '84, is an alumna. So are his sisters-in-law. One of Perez's daughters, Lisa, graduated in 2014. Several nieces are also alumnae.

"The whole building was so different back then!" he remembered. "I walked through this single gray door, and there was this one, slow elevator. There was a stage in the cafeteria. The library was on the first floor. There've been so many changes."

One of them, of course, was Perez's promotion from teacher to athletic director in 2003. At the time, IWA offered six sports for its students; over the last 17 years, Perez

added swimming, golf and cheerleading, which is offered at St. Thomas High School.

"Those additions help us with enrollment," he said. "When we first began offering them, you could see how excited the 8th graders who came to tour, that they had those options here."

Perez feels IWA's size and the sisterhood of its students help prospective Falcons see all the school has to offer. He also believes that it gives the girls here opportunities they might not have in other high schools.

At IWA, students often land on varsity teams in their freshman year. One is Claire Michael '23 (see page 19). Another is Lily Hatcher '17, who is now a senior marketing major at Lee University. She transferred to IWA the second semester of freshman year and immediately found a home on the softball team. She now plays the sport in college. And she keeps in touch with Coach.

"I love Coach Perez!" she said, her affection evident even through the static of her car's Bluetooth system. "He's a really great person. He was always pushing me to be my best, and wanting the best for me. For all of us. He still is."







regularly, and she said he joins her family for dinner a few times a year. That mentorship is important to her, and she said the lessons she learned playing softball for him still resonate.

"He taught me to work hard and how to be a leader," she said. "How to stay calm, be humble, to lead my team by example."

Fellow IWA alumna Hallie Lyons '19, now a sophomore at Texas A&M majoring in environmental studies, agrees. She played volleyball and basketball at IWA.

"He has this sort of relentless attitude," she said. "He always pushed us to do our best, to never give up. And he was always there. Coach put in a lot of late nights. If there was a game, at night, on the weekend, he was there, cheering us on."

"Rick always wants what's best for the students," said Assistant Athletic Director Bryan Gonzales, who's worked with Perez for six years. "He does whatever needs to be done to help the athletic department stand out."

For Perez, all of it — the hard work, the support of students, the love of athletics —

is part of the job. But it's also part of his own set of principles. He grew up in southeast Houston, attended the University of Houston, received a master's degree from Grand Canyon University, and has been a middle school and high school football, basketball and softball coach. As a kid, he played baseball. He's devoted to his wife of 27 years, as he is to his faith.

"God first," he said. "And my wife and kids — wow. "When I have a rough day, I know I'm going home to them, and it keeps me grounded. 'Don't bring it home,' I tell myself. They're everything to me."

When he's not cheering on IWA teams, Perez is a vocal supporter of Houston's major-league sports, especially his beloved Astros. A recent showdown on IWA's Instagram asked who was a bigger 'stros supporter, Perez or IWA math teacher Kristan Siegel. The competition was close, but Perez claimed the victory. "We both got a good laugh out of it," said Siegel.



"I love watching sports, but I have to be active, I have to be moving," he said.

That's exactly what he plans to continue doing with IWA athletics: Moving the program forward, building on its success.

"Our girls can really shine here," he said. "I want them to know they can come to IWA, be part of a team and go on to play in college. Even if they don't, I want them to realize they can accomplish whatever they set their minds to."

ike many young women their age, AnaSofia
Aragon '21 and Lily Collora '21 love trendy
clothes. But earlier this year, the pair became
aware of the perils of so-called "fast fashion,"
mass-produced, inexpensive items made from inferior
materials. These clothes are often worn only a few times
before they're discarded, only to be replaced by more of
the same.

So they created LANA Thrift Flips in order to do something about the problem. Launched in June 2020 and bankrolled by a \$150 loan from their parents, the pair headed to thrift stores, purchased clothing and upcycled it, creating blouses from square, silky scarves and adding ornamentation to pants and jeans. Most sell for between \$10 and \$20.

"I've always had an entrepreneurial spirit," said Lily, who wants to study business in college. "And we both love fashion. So, we thought this was a great way to help the environment, as well as offer unique, affordable options."

"We really wanted to create a business with a purpose," added AnaSofia.

They sell their creations from their Instagram page













and on Depop. Since opening, they've made about \$650, they estimate, enough to have paid back their initial investment and turn a profit. The pair have been diligent about investing their profits back into their business. Currently, they have around 56 items in their inventory, and they plan to keep adding more.

In addition to being a money-making opportunity, LANA, a combination of their first names, has allowed both girls to get hands-on experience in running a business.

"I've really learned how to handle finances," said AnaSofia. "And how we communicate as a team."

"The marketing!" echoed Lily, in discussing what they've learned.

"And we've developed a relationship with the post office," AnaSofia laughed. Lily, who handles most of the company's shipping, nodded in agreement.

A news story about their business posted in IWA's "Weekly Word" newsletter attracted the attention of alumna Jeanice (Guzzetta) Netzel '79, who spent most of her career with Foley's and Stage stores in retail merchandising. She met with AnaSofia and Lily and was impressed with their business acumen.

"I was amazed that they were so sound on the business side," she said. "They have a great idea of who their customer is and have worked out what they should pay for goods and what the markup needs to be to be profitable. And they've got foresight over what they want to do with this business. That's a real testament to their families, and to the education they've received at IWA."

AnaSofia and Lily agree that IWA has helped them. They point to Leading With Service, where students work in teams and each person has a specific job to do, and Textile Art and Design, offered through IWA's fine arts program, as inspirations.

Netzel is helping the pair with their business efforts. She's put them in contact with fashion blogger Roz Pactor, who she feels can further help get exposure for LANA.

"I am also going to join them on a shopping trip to the resale shops to see how they work," Netzel said. "I want to be able to look at a before and after of what they buy and what they create."

The students are excited to have Netzel's support. Going forward the girls are increasing their inventory and



firming up plans for how they'll continue their business in college.

In the meantime, they'll be hitting the thrift stores, searching for fast-fashion pieces they can turn into new treasures.


