Virtual Music Festival


Senior school

In conversation with... Menisha Gela, Development Director



Tell us a little bit about yourself and your team.

I am from Cambridgeshire, but came to Newcastle University and settled permanently in the city in my mid-twenties. Over the last ten years I have worked primarily with St Oswald's Hospice as well as a range of other organisations across the North East on projects such as Durham Brass Festival, Freedom City and The Great Exhibition of the North.

I've been working with the Schools on a part-time basis since the beginning of the year and joined on the 2nd November as a permanent member of staff.

The Development Team consists of me and Tove Elander, Development Officer.

What is the role of the Development Office?

Primarily we work to grow and develop new relationships with the School's immediate and wider community. Be that through conversation, events or online tools. Our aim is to gain support for Schools objectives such as creating new opportunities for our students, increasing pupil numbers, supporting our alumni and wider community and improving our facilities. We want to give people from all backgrounds across the City and further afield an understanding of the wonderful opportunities there are to both learn and work at Dame Allan's Schools.

Where can we find you?

We're based in the Bursary at the Senior School. The door is always open, so do come and introduce yourselves.

What are your plans for the future?

To be able to do my job effectively I need a good understanding of the organisation and its community. It's very clear that Dame Allan's is well regarded by lots of people. I want to hear as many of the voices out there - tell me what makes Dame Allan's unique and wonderful. I also want to hear about aspirations for the Schools. My ultimate

aim is to help to build a positive future for our Schools and strengthen our standing within the independent schools sector in Newcastle and the North East.

Why is this important for the Schools?

We have lots going for us at Dame Allan's and a long legacy of providing young people with an outstanding education grounded in the generosity of our founders and the hard work of generations of staff, students and supporters. However, in buildings that have stood since the 1930's there is always work to be done and improvements that can be made. Having a functioning Development Office should help us to begin to work with our communities to realise our aspirations and create exceptional new programs and facilities for the benefit of our students.

What are your biggest challenges ahead?

There is a risk that once a
Development Office is set
up we are expected to work
in isolation and make things
happen. You see it in lots of
organisations. Where there
is success however, there
is an understanding that
Development is a shared
responsibility and takes a
collective effort. I'm a glass half
full kind of person, so whilst
there are the obvious challenges

given the times we live in, I am fortunate to work for an outstanding organisation and have the support of an excellent team, including the Principal, the Bursar and the Governors. The Covid-19 Bursary Appeal we launched earlier in the year to support members of the Dame Allan's family experiencing hardship was well supported and shows the good will out there. Indeed, everybody I have spoken to so far has been very positive about how they can help me in my new role and support the Schools.

Of course, getting to know an organisation, planning and taking into account all the factors that need consideration to work effectively takes time but I think we have lots going for us as a School and a community and I'm really looking forward to the future.

Has COVID-19 affected your future plans and how?

One of the best things about this job is that I get to meet and talk to lots of different people - which I absolutely love. Given Covid restrictions, meeting face to face won't happen for a while, but I do look forward to crossing paths with many of you at some point in the future.
