School Responsibilities

The Benjamin Franklin Elementary School will:

1. Provide high-quality curriculum and instruction in a supportive and effective learning environment that enables the participating children to meet the challenging State academic standards as follows;

With the New Jersey Student Learning Standards (NJSLS) at its core, our K-5 curriculum focuses on the whole child by developing a strong academic foundation by building social emotional learning competencies and implementing 21st century skills. To ensure our curricula meets the needs of our diverse student population, as well as state and federal mandates, we routinely revisit our curriculum and update accordingly. Our one-to-one technology allows us to facilitate meaningful learning experiences for students. Within each of our 11 elementary schools, students are afforded a variety of extracurricular events, community service projects, programs, and resources.

- Serving, to the extent possible, on policy advisory groups, such as being the Title I, Part A parent representative on the school's School Improvement Team, the Title I Policy Advisory

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Committee, the District wide Policy Advisory Council, the State's Committee of Practitioners, the School Support Team or other school advisory or policy groups.

Student Responsibilities

We, as students, will share the responsibility to improve our academic achievement and achieve the State's high standards. Specifically, we will:

- Do my homework every day and ask for help when I need to.
- Read at least 30 minutes every day outside of school time.
- Give to my parents or the adult who is responsible for my welfare all notices and information received by me from my school every day.

The Benjamin Franklin Elementary School will:
