LEADERSHIP THROUGH A CRISIS-TEAM WB


From ordinary to extraordinary: It's hard to remember now, but everything seemed to start fairly normally the week of March 9. Little did we know then the extent of the crisis that would be thrust upon us. Given the circumstances we were witnessing in our nation and world, my leadership team and I initiated a discussion on March 9 regarding the potential that our schools could be shutdown at some future point. We began defining the issue as a series of challenges and solutions. What follows are some key challenges and solutions that resulted in the formulation of our Cloud Learning Initiative, www.wbsd.org/cloudlearning.

Challenge 1: How would we react to a long-term school closure, similar to what was taking place in the Seattle area? What did we need to have in place for such an event? Who should be a part of the planning effort? How could it be quickly implemented?

Solution: We decided to alter the agenda of a previously planned March 11 District Learning Design (DLD) Team meeting. We focused on creating an action plan to address the myriad issues involved in shutting down our schools. How could we "have school" while our facilities were closed? The DLD Team, comprised of innovative teachers, principals, central office administrators and school board members, determined that we needed a plan that kept students learning and teachers teaching. The key was to think differently about teaching and learning. This group rose to that challenge by laying out the elements needed for effective distance learning.

Challenge 2: How could we, a team of just 25 people, quickly make plans for an entire school district of 5,700 students, over 300 educators, 8 schools, plus a Special Education Transition Center and an early college campus?

Solution: We needed time for all employees to plan. Consequently, I canceled school on Friday March 13 for students. That enabled all staff across the school district to participate in what we called a Cloud Learning Planning Day. The DLD Team created the agenda and assisted in facilitating the planning activities. The principals, teachers, and support staff across the district worked the entire day making plans for delivering instruction remotely. Learning support teams (food service, maintenance, transportation) also met to develop plans



to best support teaching and learning during a shutdown. Little did we know when creating the agenda on Wednesday that Governor Whitmer would announce an order on Thursday, March 12 closing schools statewide on Monday, March 16. Our planning exercise intensified as we now had one day to develop a plan that would be executed immediately.

Challenge 3: What platform could we utilize to deliver instruction in a virtual learning environment?

Solution: Since many of our teachers and students were already using and familiar with Google Classroom, we determined to adopt that approach system wide. Teachers created templates that they could use for instructional lesson planning and discussed practical teaching methods conducive for distance learning.

Challenge 4: How could we ensure that all students had access needed technology and internet service at home?

Solution: Being a one-to-one technology device system, we had an adequate supply of Chromebooks for each of our 5,700 students, we just needed to determine how to distribute those devices to students not already having one at home. Parents were notified to pick up their students' Chromebooks. We also established a system to determine whether or not families had home internet service. For those not having access, we purchased and supplied hot spots. Families who had not picked up their Chromebooks were called and we then delivered the devices to those families via school busses.

Challenge 5: How would we track "attendance"?

Solution: We created a Google check-in document that students would fill out for each class at the secondary level and for each teacher at the elementary level. The check-in includes some form of interesting activity or reflection related to that day's activities. Our attendance over the first five weeks of Cloud Learning has averaged 92% similar to our average attendance for September through March 12 of 92.6%.

Challenge 6: Would we teach new content or simply offer review and/or supplemental or enrichment learning activities?



Solution: We wanted Cloud Learning to closely match, as much as feasible, the learning taking place in classrooms.

This included introducing new material, holding "discussions", completing assignments and creating assessments (products) showing student understanding. We've evolved into a mix of new learning combined with opportunities for review and extension of that learning.

Since March 16, we've encountered many additional challenges, some anticipated and others not. With each new challenge we clearly state the problem and develop creative solutions. We're building and modifying the system as we evolve. These dynamic conditions necessitate creativity, collaboration and communication between and among all stakeholders. Thus far feedback from teachers, students and parents has been mostly positive and appreciative.

A Looming Challenge: What will school look like this fall?

Potential Solutions: We've recently expanded our District Learning Design Team to bring more expertise and voices into the conversation regarding what school might look like this fall. Given the uncertainty about guidelines related the pandemic (testing, social distancing, personal protective equipment, sanitation and hygiene), there is no one solution readily apparent. Consequently, we're developing multiple scenarios that address whatever conditions we're facing this fall. I'm confident, given our current track record, that, no

matter what the conditions, we'll be prepared to provide quality learning experiences for all students we serve.

Success Factors: What accounts for the success of our Cloud Learning Initiative and my confidence that we can meet

future challenges? There are two main factors. First, we've been implementing our Portrait of a Graduate for the past two years. Through the implementation process, we've been modeling the Portrait of a Graduate elements. We are constantly Collaborating, Critically thinking/creatively problem-solving, Communicating and Contributing to support our students learning and social/emotional needs. This crisis has tested our capacity to lead through difficult times. We're leading by putting the 4Cs into action.

However, our success is due primarily to the strong relationships we've established within the WBSD learning community. Relationships between teachers, principals, support staff, and parents have fostered respect, openness and trust, which anchor our ability to work as a team in supporting all students. Additionally, the positive relationships our students have with each other, their teachers and other adults provide a source of strength critically important in coping with this crisis.


As WBHS Principal, Eric Pace, wrote in a letter to his staff, "We hold a conviction that it is our work on relationships, culture, and accountability over the course of a school year, and a school career, that allows us to be as effective as we are in a virtual environment. The students and staff know each other, and feel a sense of accountability to one another, along with a responsibility to support one another. Without the strong relationships you have built, our online success would not be near what it has been."

The talents within Team WB continue to rise to the top as we

navigate these new challenges.

DISTRICT SUMMER CONSTRUCTION WORK



onstruction crews will be busy in the West Bloomfield School District this summer. The district's operations team has been hard at work identifying projects through our 2017 Bond program and our Building and Site Sinking Fund to improve our district at all levels.

WBHS Baseball and Softball Field Renovations

Both the varsity baseball and varsity softball fields will see extensive renovations beginning
June 1, which includes converting the surfaces of both fields into full synthetic turf. The project is being managed by Foresite Design
Inc., who is an industry leader in synthetic field design and construction. In addition, drainage in both practice fields will be installed which will allow the fields to properly drain for use in the typically wet spring weather in Michigan. New fencing will be installed around both fields including reconfiguring the field dimensions and bullpen areas.





West Bloomfield Middle School

Construction will continue on the new state of the art middle school this summer, and is on schedule to be completed for the start of the 2022-2023 school year as originally planned. Trade areas working on the project this summer include earth work, masonry, steel, mechanical, electrical and plumbing. Our community will notice masonry walls start to be erected and steel framing put in place. Site work will continue including shaping of the play fields and surrounding areas of the building footprint.

Scotch Elementary Partial Roof Replacement

The district continues to follow its roofing replacement cycle with work on 6,875 square feet of roof being replaced at Scotch Elementary this summer.

WBHS Phase III Renovations

As a part of the 2017 Bond Issue, phase III work at the high school includes renovations to the theater and surrounding fine art spaces. The work includes a complete refresh of the area along with updated theater technology, and new stage rigging. The heating and cooling systems will also be upgraded.

WBHS Pre-Cast Panel Replacement

Exterior wall panels near the roofline of the high school around the pool and main gym area have reached the end of their useful life and are being replaced this summer.

Gretchko Parking Lot and Light Pole Replacement

The parking lot and circular drive in front of the main entrance are being reconstructed in their entirety. This is not a "top coat" but rather a reconstruction requiring the full removal of existing asphalt surfaces. In addition to the parking lot reconstruction, all parking lot lights will be converted to LED for improved performance and energy conservation.



STUDENTS PARTICIPATE IN OAKLAND SCHOOLS GAME AND INVENTION CHALLENGE

Student teams from Roosevelt and Scotch Elementary competed in the Oakland Schools Game and Invention Challenge in March. The event recognized local student STEM skills, creativity. As part of the competition, students used creativity, critical thinking and Science, Technology, Engineering and Math (STEM) skills to develop games, inventions or solutions to real-world problems.

The team from Roosevelt consisting of members **Julia Bailey**, **Jatifah Benjamin**, **Noor Khattab**, **Vincent**

Samborski and **Molie Shelters** took home top prize in the Most Creative Concept category for their project about Time Travel.

The team from Scotch consisting of members Lyla Costello, Jordyan Law, Bianca Palazzolo and Natalie Rebtoy took home top prize in the Most Marketable Game Concept for their Trivia Break-In. In earning this top honor, the team received entry and travel costs to compete at the Chicago Young Inventor's Challenge in November 2020.

DISTRICT CELEBRATES TWO GREEN SCHOOLS

The district is proud to announce that two schools are 'Michigan Green Schools' for the 2019-2020 school year. A school is eligible to receive a Green School, Emerald School, or Evergreen School Environmental Stewardship Designation if the school or students perform the required number of activities, with a minimum of two activities from each of the four categories: Recycling, Energy, Environmental Protection, and Miscellaneous Activities.

IS MY CHILD READY FOR KINDERGARTEN?

any parents are probably not even thinking about next school year, but now's the time, especially for future kindergarten students! While we encourage you to ask questions, tour buildings and meet our staff members to prepare for your child's first day of school, it's not too early to ask yourself - "Is my child ready to start kindergarten?"

When thinking about whether or not your child is ready to begin kindergarten there are many things to consider. Below are 3 lists of skills (social, academic, independence) most incoming kindergarten-age children demonstrate most of the time.

Socially:

- Can tell an adult his/her name.
- Can interact with peers appropriately (Be able to talk, play nicely with and share.).
- Can verbalize needs and feeling appropriately.
- Can follow simple 2-3 step directions.

Academic:

- Can identify some capital and lowercase letters.
- Can provide some sounds for letters of the alphabet.
- Can count up to 20.
- Can identify some numbers 0-10.
- Can write his/her name.
- Can identify colors.
- · Can identify some shapes.
- Can write his/her name.
- Is excited to learn new things.

Independence:

- Can use the bathroom independently (including wiping, washing hands, and making sure clothes are on correctly before opening the door.).
- Can care for their own belongings.







- Can put on/off coat and backpack independently.
- Can put on their own shoes.
- Can clean up after themselves.
- Can eat independently and open containers and packages for lunch and snacks.

Here are some (early on) ideas in order to prepare your child for a successful Kindergarten school year:

- Talk about school in a positive way.
- Drive by the
- school you will be attending and tell your child the name of the school and the principal's name.
- Visit the school playground and let your child play on the equipment.
- Visit your child's school and spend some time walking around the school and talking to teachers and staff.
- Find the district on social media to learn more about the school district community.
