## **Book Club!**

Kim Iorillo, our WAY Michigan ELA Lab Expert, will be hosting a Book Club in February! The Club will be reading the 1997 Newberry Honor recipient *A Girl Named Disaster*. Written in 1996, the story follows the coming of age story of Nhamo, a girl living in a rural village in Mozambique as she goes on a quest to find her father in Zimbabwe. Excerpt from the back of the back of the book:

"Nhamo's mother is dead, and her father is gone. When she learns that she must marry a cruel man with three wives, before her 12th twelfth birthday, she runs away. Alone on a river, in a stolen boat, Nhamo is swept into the uncharted heart of a great lake. There, she battles drowning, starvation, and wild animals, and comes to know Africa's mystical, luminous spirits. Nhamo's journey will transport readers into her world, in a story that is poignant, humorous, dramatic, and extraordinary."

Similar to other coming of age/personal journey novels like Island of the Blue Dolphins and Julie of the Wolves, A Girl Named Disaster will allow students to work on their reading and comprehension skills, communication skills, and will give them the chance to study African history and culture as well as gain a better understanding of the human experience that affects people of all cultures and locations. Kim lorillo will be sending out a sign up sheet with all of the requirements and instructions. Students will be meeting via Zoom 1-2 times per week for about 1-2 months in order to read and discuss the book, again starting in February. A finalized schedule with be forthcoming. Students grades 9-12 will be able to earn ELA credit for whatever grade level they are currently working on.
