

FROM THE PRESIDENT'S OFFICE

Dear Alumni and Friends of DeMatha,

ince DeMatha opened its doors for the fi st time on September 9, 1946, we have always talked about our strong brotherhood that permeates the school and our members. Th s refl cts the original brotherhood initiated by St. John de Matha back in 1198 in France, which was the foundation of the Trinitarian Order. Th s concept of brotherhood is in our brochures and in our conversations about the unique aspect of life at DeMatha. Sometimes we wonder if this quality of a De-Matha education is embraced by our students and then by our



alumni. We had our answer on May 5, 2019, when we had a combined reunion of the classes of 1949 (our fi st graduating class) through 1968.

On that wonderful day, we had over 150 people attend. We began with mass in the original gym, which was not only the gym when these men were students, but was also the only place large enough on campus to accommodate assemblies, the baccalaureate mass and even graduation. As we sang together and prayed together, I looked out over the assembly and the sense of brotherhood was palpable in the large room. Clearly, they loved being together at prayer one more time. We then went to the Antler Room and the conversations and enthusiasm for all that is DeMatha were the driving forces throughout the afternoon. Dr. McMahon spoke with the group and gave some updates about our current DeMatha life. We gave awards to the oldest alum who was there from the class of 1949 and the alum who traveled the longest distance to attend (Washington State), and as we looked at all of the tables and listened to all of the voices, it was a grand testimony to everything that is good about our school, our personnel and our alumni.

I shared some of this story with the Class of 2019 at their graduation practice in the Convocation Center a few weeks later so that they could realize their enthusiasm, their love for each other and their connection with DeMatha has a very long history, and they are now joining the ranks of over 10,000 men who cherish the words: 'I went to DeMatha.'

We count on the support of countless individuals to make this connection possible, and please continue to pray for the Class of 2019 and all of the alumni who bring the story of De-Matha everywhere they are. We are truly blessed with One. Strong. Brotherhood.


Rising senior **Christopher Prokopchak** recently graduated from the Maryland Boys State program.

Principal's Perspective

n June 7 when the class of 2019 completed their graduation exercises, I came back to DeMatha and had lunch with members of the class of 1969. Th s ritual of looking out at the current graduates and then celebrating with the Golden Anniversary class is something I look forward to every year as each class adds another chapter to the great narrative that is DeMatha.

The class of 2019 had multiple students who have had brothers graduate and many others who have brothers coming behind them; it had 22 grads whose fathers are also grads. Of that combination of 44 alums, I taught 15 (or more—sometimes I



can't recall all of the ones I have taught!). The commitment of generations of families helps give DeMatha a wonderful sense of continuity.

When I come to school each day I am profoundly conscious that despite the changes to the physical campus and the introduction of new technologies, that the school is perfectly recognizable through its ethos and character (and some of its people—Joe Carroll, Bill McGregor, and Doug Tschiffely all taught me and Fr. Damian and Fr. James overlapped with me when I was a student).

I talk to classes at the end of the year and I tell them that the distinctive characteristic of DeMatha men is that they leave any place better than it was when they arrived. I ask them to accept that challenge and all that it implies. That legacy is evident in the classes of 2019 and 1969 and I am proud to be part of that tradition.

ZACHARY SHIEH '19 DeMatha Musician and Leader

any Stags strive to take advantage of everything offered to them at DeMatha and to leave their mark in the school's storied legacy. Recent graduate Zachary (Zach) Shieh is one of those examples as he showcased his talent across a wide spectrum of activities while on 4313 Madison Street. But it did take Zach some time to get comfortable with the ebbs and fl ws of high school life early on as a freshman.

"I was actually homeschooled beforehand," Zach said, "I was drawn to DeMatha from what I had heard from other people and even though the transition was a little rough at fi st, I was able to adapt."

And adapt he has.

Zach serves as the coxswain for the varsity crew team, fin shed up his senior year with a 4.3 GPA while taking classes like AP Calculus BC and AP Physics, and has been one of the top musicians on campus. He successfully auditioned for the Sinfonia Orchestra before he arrived at DeMatha and quickly impressed the music faculty by serving as Concert Master for three years

and being named to numerous All-State Ensembles. Th s past school year, Zach was selected to the prestigious All-Eastern Orchestra, which made him the fi st strings player in DeMatha history to ever be selected for that ensemble.

"Zach Shieh is one of the fi est young men I have ever taught," Sinfonia Director Mr. Matthew Bickel '95 said. "He is a tremendous musician, top ranked student and an invaluable member of the DeMatha

crew program. Even more impressive than all of these feats is his leadership and humility. He is the true defin tion of a faith-filled gentleman and scholar."

Zach did say there's one aspect of DeMatha that makes the school truly unique as an educational institution.

"It's the diversity," Zach said, "I think that's what separates it from any other school. You can fi d other people who like the same things you do and are in the same niche as you. It really defi es us as a school."

Th s past June, Zach started the next chapter of his life journey as he entered the US Naval Academy. He plans to study mechanical engineering and continue playing the violin, either in a small chamber music group or in church. Back in May before he had graduated from DeMatha, Zach said the military background

in his family made a big impact in his decision to follow in their footsteps and serve his country.

"My dad was in the Air Force for 28 years as a reservist and my grandmother and grandfather were both in the Navy, which is how they met," Zach said, "All of that inspired me to go to Navy and what really pushed me to go there was my inner desire to do my best academically."

Zach left h s mark at DeMatha and will next be looking to leave his mark in his military career. He said he realized that a lot of the lessons that he learned at DeMatha will carry him forward at Navy.

"I've learned how to work with other people, to be a team player, and to also be a leader in whatever community you are in," Zach said. "Just strive to be the best you can be in anything."

SGA Displays True Brotherhood Through Action

he word 'Brotherhood' gets thrown around at a lot of places, but at DeMatha it's about helping your fellow Stags in need. That was the case this year when the DeMatha Student Government Association (SGA) utilized part of their funds to install handicapped accessibility buttons at entrances around the school buildings.

Within the fi st few days of school, fellow students noticed freshman Kyle Bickel struggling to navigate DeMatha's campus. Kyle, son of faculty member Mr. Matthew Bickel '95, has a rare condition called Spinal Muscular Atrophy (SMA). He uses a mobility scooter to get from class to class and building to building.

"I don't think you realize how difficult it is to open and close doors when you are on a scooter until you are faced with that obstacle. You quickly learn to plan your routes based on the location of elevators," said Mr. Bickel.

While Kyle's classmates always opened doors for him, SGA leaders knew they needed to do more. SGA President Eric Najarian '19 and Vice President Tommy Halligan '19 were inspired to help their friend.

"We heard that sometimes it was inconvenient for Kyle to go around campus because the accessibility wasn't as readily available for him," Tommy said.

"If we had the accessible funds, we wouldn't shy away from using them to make it easier," Eric added.


The SGA contacted President Fr. James, Principal Dr. Daniel Mc-Mahon '76 and Dean of Students Mr. Dave Gardiner '87 to detail the situation and explain what they wanted to accomplish. Soon after, the plan came into fruition.

"It's exactly what we're trying to instill in our students," Mr. Gardiner said, "It was nice seeing all of the guys come together and help another student."

Mr. Bickel said the students and faculty have been extremely supportive of Kyle from the moment he arrived on campus.

"We always talk about a brotherhood and I think that brotherhood was perfectly exhibited from the very fi st day Kyle came to school. Th s is a testament to the character of DeMatha students," Mr. Bickel said.

There is no cure for SMA. However, just before Christmas in 2016, the FDA approved the fi st ever treatment for the condition. Since

April of 2017, Kyle has been receiving intrathecal injections of the drug, Spinraza. The injections help stop the progression of the disease and strengthen the individuals.

Kyle has not let SMA dictate his life on 4313 Madison Street. In addition to being involved in the music department and a challenging academic course load, he also competed on the school's dive team.

"Kyle has defin tely gotten stronger this year. It was such a blessing for Kyle to be on DeMatha's Swim and Dive team," Mr. Bickel said. "I was nearly brought to tears when I saw him dive at his fi st practice. Something he loved to do as a kid but stopped due to SMA was now possible again. We hope with continued treatments and the development of other medications that are in clinical trials that there will come a day when SMA is cured."

Kyle is extremely appreciative of the SGA's kind gesture.

"Th s whole action has helped me feel included and will hopefully help any future students that have a disability feel as if DeMatha is a home," Kyle said. "I feel there is a real strong brotherhood here and that students are looking out for me."

The SGA's action will have the ability to positively impact future Stags.

"It opens up the diversity at DeMatha that the school prides itself on," Tommy said. "We can have all types of students."

Mr. Bickel agreed and said gestures like this make DeMatha a place for everyone. "It reaffirmed that I work at a special place. The DeMatha community has my back and my family's back," Mr. Bickel said.

Helping current and future Stags is a part of what makes DeMatha a true brotherhood.

"We were lucky enough to have this opportunity and leave a lasting impact," Eric said.

GRADUATION OF T The Lifelong

here was a palpable energy at the Basilica of the Shrine of the Immaculate Conception on June 8 as proud family members and friends, fellow students, and faculty and staff gathered to celebrate the Class of 2019 for the 71st Commencement of DeMatha Catholic High School.

As the awards and diploma recipients were announced by Fr. Damian, it was easy to admire the impressive academic, service, artistic and athletic accomplishments made by the Class of 2019 throughout its four years on campus. And it displayed the effectiveness that this class showed in leaving its mark in the history and legacy of the school.

This year's Commencement guest speaker was Mr. John L. Walker, Jr., Esquire, '65, believed to be the first Stag to attend and graduat from an Ivy League School (the University of Pennsylvania), then began practicing law in Mississippi in the early 1970s. In his long career, Mr. Walker took up the cause in his legal practice to help those who were disenfranchised because of the color of their skin. Mr. Walker encouraged the new graduates to follow the WWJD (What Would Jesus Do) moral compass as they embark upon a new stage of their lives.

"If you follow that compass, your life will be less stressful and more productive and beneficial to the community at large," M . Walker said. "And as you come to meet new people in the workplace, seek first t understand and then to be understood."

He 'Eyed' A Career in Medicine

s a professor of Clinical Ophthalmology and Chief of the Cataract and Refractive Surgery Division at UCLA's David Geffen School of Medicine, Kevin Miller '77 is considered one of the world's most renowned eye doctors. But he never envisioned this kind of career while at DeMatha.

"No," Dr. Miller laughed. "I ended up going to college to study and get a degree in electrical engineering. I figu ed after graduation I'd

work at NASA or a similar organization."

At DeMatha, Dr. Miller had developed an interest in engineering due to taking former faculty member Mr. Rocco Mennella's calculus and physics classes and helping program some of the fi st computers in the classroom.

But by the end of Dr.



Miller's sophomore year at Johns Hopkins University, his curiosity led him to take a 'Sensory Communication' class, which turned out to be an intensive introduction to vision neurophysiology. After shadowing faculty members at Johns Hopkins' Wilmer Institute, he decided to prepare for medical school.

The only problem? Dr. Miller had to play serious catch-up since he hadn't been on a pre-med track.

"I had to load up on all of these pre-med courses, in addition to the advanced engineering courses I was taking and so my last year was the year of hell. I took 25 credits during my last semester. I ended up getting into Hopkins' Medical School under the condition that I fin sh my last six credits of prerequisite humanities," Dr. Miller said.

After surviving medical school, Dr. Miller was accepted into an ophthalmology residency at the UCLA School of Medicine where he continues to work and teach today. His clinical practice is devoted to cataract surgery, laser refractive surgery and the rehabilitation of eyes that have experienced complex anterior segment surgical issues.

In addition to this intensive work, Dr. Miller trains medical school students, residents and fellows in the practice of ophthalmology. He has served on numerous scientific c mmittees for professional organizations including the World Congresses of Ophthalmology and the American Society of Cataract and Refractive Surgery. Dr. Miller is also an editor for the *American Journal of Ophthalmology* and has written hundreds of scientific apers, book chapters and trade journals.

Yet his most rewarding professional experiences end up being fairly simple.

"The big one is obviously taking care of patients," Dr. Miller said.

"And it's rewarding seeing the trainees under me make presentations at local and national meetings and progress throughout their own schooling."

Dr. Miller has been awarded several endowed funds for cataract research at UCLA, which led him to experiment with different visual systems and devices that have been FDA approved for commercial use. He said he fi ds research an extremely rewarding process.

"For a short portion of time, you are the only person in the world who know something," Dr. Miller said. "Writing and publishing your results are definitely cool things, but the initial discovery makes it truly special."

Dr. Miller said he encourages all DeMatha students to pursue their interests and to be willing to take risks. Living on the west coast for almost 30 years now, he hopes they'll expand their horizons beyond the East Coast and look for great opportunities anywhere.

"I understand that a lot of students end up going to a school or living within 500 miles or so (of DeMatha), but I'd recommend pursuing things outside of that bubble," Dr. Miller said.

Th ee decades into his medical career, Dr. Miller remains excited about the future.

"I'm just going to keep doing what I do because I love it. It borders on being a hobby."

James reminded was not only used for athletic events, but also originally for Mass and Commencement. More importantly, Fr. "Even though the campus may look differently now than it once did, the mission of educating Faith-Filled Gentlemen and Scholars has remained the same," Fr. James said.

Fellowship continued after Mass with lunch in the Antler Room and it was remarkable how many Stags from different classes were in attendance. For instance, Jim Webb '55 flew in al the way from Washington State and Thomas Quinn '49 was back 70 years after he himself had graduated. There were other Stags also present who not only sent their sons to DeMatha, but have been able to see their grandsons attend as well.

Dr. Daniel McMahon '76 spoke just after lunch had concluded and remarked on how many of the alumni from their classes went on to do countless great things in their lives. Reunions are always a special event and that day for the Classes of 1949-1968 was no exception. Not only was it a time to reminisce on the classes and teachers they had and how life was at DeMatha back then, but the opportunity to see how the school has evolved was provided as groups got to tour around the entire campus to see what had been built up and constructed after they graduated, most notably the LT. (SEAL) Brendan Looney '99 Convocation Center.

It was an opportunity to reflect on the past, admire th present and look forward to the bright future that DeMatha has in educating the next herd of Stags.

"DeMatha men - since the beginning - recognize and perform their duty and they have a reverence about the past and a respect for the future," Dr. McMahon said. "I promise you that Fr. James and myself and our current students will honor that by trying to leave DeMatha better than it was when we got here; but you have set such a high bar. Thanks for leaving DeMatha better than it was when you got here."

BASKETBALL REPEATS IN MD PRIVATE SCHOOL AND ALHAMBRA TOURNEYS

Coming off last season when the varsity basketball team won the WCAC, Maryland Private School and Alhambra Invitational Championships, the Stags began the 2018-19 campaign with huge national expectations. Despite falling short to St. John's in the WCAC Semifinals i February, the team responded in dominant fashion by winning the MD Private School Championship and the Alhambra Invitational for the second consecutive year. The Stags finished 33-5 (19-3 against th WCAC), and it marked the 18th time in the last 30 years that DeMatha won 30 or more games in a season.

The Stags finished No. 1 in the fin power rankings from *The Washington Post* and it marked the 28th overall time that DeMatha basketball finishe atop those rankings in the history of the program. Senior **Justin Moore** was named the Gatorade Player-of-the-Year for boys basketball in the state of Maryland and Player-of-the-Year in *The Washington Post.* Junior **Earl Timberlake** made *The Washington Post* All-Met Second Team,



The DeMatha Bond of Army-Navy Lacrosse



(*This story was originally published in early April before the April 13th Army-Navy lacrosse game. A postscript after the story includes the result from the contest.)

rmy-Navy is arguably the greatest rivalry in all of sports and the Army and Navy men's lacrosse teams will square off this Saturday in Annapolis as the two service academies seek to remain near the top of the Patriot League. Th s particular game, the 100th overall meeting, will be big for the DeMatha community with two 2014 grads, ARMY senior defensemen Johnny Surdick and NAVY senior midfi lder Greyson Torain, facing off or possibly the last time.

"There's just so much emotion and enthusiasm playing in front of 15,000-

20,000 fans," Greyson said, "The tradition of the game is special."

Johnny and Greyson's friendship goes back to the third grade as they played football together and later lacrosse. Years later, they attended DeMatha and left a asting mark on the DeMatha lacrosse program and around campus.

The two friends were often told from various faculty members and coaches about Brendan Looney, a 1999 grad of the school.

"My family is close with the Looney family and Brendan was always someone I looked up to," Johnny said. Greyson added that hearing about Brendan made themselves and others want to be more like him.

Brendan was a star athlete at DeMatha and later played football at the Navy, but switched to lacrosse after his sophomore year and became a force for the Midshipmen. He wore the No. 40 jersey, received numerous accolades for his play and held fi m to a belief he shared with teammates and others: 'Be Strong, Be Accountable, Never Complain.'

Brendan graduated from the Naval Academy in 2004 and started out as an intelligence officer efore later joining the Navy SEALs. While serving as a SEAL in his deployment to Iraq, Brendan completed approximately 59 missions. On September 21, 2010, just days before he was scheduled to return to the United States, Brendan was

killed after his SEAL team helicopter went down in the mountains of Afghanistan. He was just 29.

While playing at Army, Johnny wore the No. 40 jersey as a way to honor Brendan.

"It was just something I had wanted to do as a way to remember him," Johnny said.

Greyson said he admired Johnny's decision.

"Yes, Brendan was a Naval Academy grad," Greyson said, "But a big part of his life was his high school experience at DeMatha. It's cool Johnny honors him in that way at Army."

The Naval Academy lacrosse coaches have recently made it a tradition to select one player who encompasses similar character traits as Brendan to wear No. 40.

Members of the DeMatha lacrosse program and other alumni will be at this Saturday's game, as well as former DeMatha lacrosse head coach Dick Long, who won a national title at Navy in the late 1960s.

Johnny and Greyson will graduate from their respective service academies in May and both said they know a certain chapter in their lives is ending. They will soon embark on military assignments to different parts of the country and the world. But on Saturday, they'll compete against each other once more.

"The Army-Navy game is always special," Greyson said. "But this one will be even more so because it might be the last one where I get to play against a good friend."

Army defeated Navy 9-8 in an overtime thriller. Johnny had one shot and three groundball pickups in the victory for the Black Knights while Greyson had seven shots and scored a goal for the Midshipmen.

Following the season, Johnny won the William C. Schmeisser Award for the college lacrosse Defensive-Player-of-the-Year. They were both then selected in the inaugural Premier Lacrosse League (PLL) College Draft, both by Chaos LC, with Johnny taken sixth overall and Greyson 18th. Both players will put a pause on their professional lacrosse careers this fall to begin their military service.

So at least for this summer, the two are teammates once more.
