


FROM THE PRESIDENT'S OFFICE

often say that as a community "we can withstand anything, except neglect." In part this means that as long as we keep Listening to each other and keep talking to each other then we can retain our sense of community.

The COVID-19 response that the school adopted and is still adopting includes committees on:

- 1) Student life and engagement;
- 2) Facilities, buildings, and transportation safety; and
- 3) Online and hybrid learning.

But, this isn't the only thing requiring our attention and response.



The school community, like the country, was horrified by the killings of George Floyd, Breonna Taylor, and Ahmaud Arbery. At a school which self-identifies s 49% black, we have particular obligations to take care of our population that is at higher risk—and being a black man in America means being at higher risk than being white in America.

Even though the school wants to believe it has made strides in hiring, in curriculum, and in student life issues; we also need to hear the other things we can and should do. This is part of our evolution as a school that "bends the moral arc of the universe towards justice."

Last August at our Administrative Team Retreat, about 35 of us gathered in a slave graveyard and prayed and discussed history and then carried that back with us to hire a facilitator to help us have ongoing discussions. I was thrilled when an alum from '03, Biko Kujifi, coordinated a series of zoom meetings in June to discuss issues of racial justice and equity and a range of alumni including speakers such as Gerald Jackson '04, Germaine Greene '03, Stephen Danley '03, Bryce Bevill '90, Alfonso Campbell '06, and our new Dean of Students Shaka Dickerson '03 participated.

Faculty members have stepped forward to assist and people are trading ideas and books and responses. And I even appreciate those who disagree with the school's statements — they are participating in the dialogue. All of us at DeMatha are happy to share strides that the school has made and to hear ideas about where we need to go.

I don't believe that "diversity" is enough. Diversity is being invited to the party; inclusion is being asked to dance. A school that through its hiring, its curriculum, and its programming merely invites some people to the party without ever asking them to dance is only part way to justice. We are committed to the education of ourselves and our students so that we repair damage we have done. We will be better.

Nigel Newby's DeMatha Education Inspired His Catholic Faith Journey

his story by 'The Catholic Standard' did a wonderful job at covering Nigel's Catholic faith journey through his DeMatha education that we decided to include the story here:

After Nigel Newby was received into the Catholic Church June 13 at St. Anthony Parish in North Beach, Maryland, he said he feels like a different person.

"Believe it or not, I feel more grounded. I have always felt fully Catholic, but now that I am, I feel it even more," he said.
"When I received the Eucharist for the fi st time, it felt like something inside of me lit on fi e."

Newby, who graduated this year from DeMatha Catholic High School in Hyattsville, credits his education at the Trinitarian-sponsored school for his conversion to Catholicism. In an earlier interview with the Catholic Standard, he said that the example of a Little League football coach who was a graduate of

DeMatha and the theology classes he took there convinced him that the Catholic faith was right for him.

"It is all due to my theology class. I didn't have the answers to the philosophical questions I had until I took that class," he said at the time.

During his junior year at DeMatha, Newby began preparations to convert to Catholicism. In the fall of his senior year, he offi ally began preparing to enter the Church and was scheduled to be confi med and receive his First Communion at this past Easter Vigil. His reception into the Catholic Church was delayed for two months, because safety precautions to prevent the spread of the coronavirus, including limits on the sizes of gatherings, caused public Masses in the Archdiocese of Washington to be suspended from mid-March until recently, as jurisdictions eased their restrictions.

As he waited to become a full member of the Church, Newby spent some of his time volunteering at a pro-life crisis pregnancy center. He said the delay was worth enduring, and on June 13, Newby – who was already a baptized Christian – received his First Holy Communion and Confi mation. Homer Twigg, Newby's theology teacher from DeMatha who helped inspire his faith journey, served as his Confi mation sponsor at the Mass.

"It was a really special, special night and a profound experience," Newby said of the Mass where he and his fellow converts were received into the Church. "Seeing all my (RCIA) classmates have

the same experience made it special with so much love and joy."

Because of social distancing measures still in effect, only family and friends could attend the Mass. Among those who attended were several DeMatha teachers, Newby's sister and his mother, whose return to the faith was inspired by her son's own faith journey.

"I wish the whole parish could have been there," he said, "but I was thinking a lot about the people I have met along the way and how special it was to receive the Eucharist."

Newby will attend the University of Pennsylvania in the fall where he will pursue a double major in physics and economics. He said among the reasons he chose that Ivy League school in Philadelphia is "they have a really good Catholic community on campus, and I defin tely plan on getting involved in that community."

Newby says that now that he has been received into the Church, he will "just continue down this path and help people I meet fi d Christ like I did. I want to be a beacon of God's light in this world."

For others who are on faith journeys similar to Newby's, he offers this advice; "Look for people who are Catholic, befriend them and look at them and how they live their lives and see how special and different and full of joy it is."



Ms. Marilyn Murphy Guiding Students Through The German Language

rowing up, Ms. Marilyn Murphy always admired people who could speak different languages. It became a personal goal to learn multiple languages and live abroad. Ms. Murphy said she wanted to be in the foreign service or work in an embassy, and be able to travel. Although, she never thought during that time she'd be a high school teacher.

"I did not think I'd be here for 20 years," Ms. Murphy said. "But when I came to DeMatha I realized, you don't know the profession until you're standing in the shoes of a teacher."

Ms. Murphy described her arrival to DeMatha in 2000 as being 'fate'. At the time, she had never even heard of the school.

"I stayed home for several years to raise my children and a year in Switzerland through my husband's work. While I was there, I took some German classes to refresh my skills and also went back to school to get my master's degree," Ms. Murphy said. "When I came home from Switzerland, I reached out to private schools because I had previously student-taught. Most wrote back saying they don't teach German. And then (Principal) Dan McMahon called me and said they had just lost their teacher and were scrambling to fi d someone to fill the spot."

Twenty years later and Ms. Murphy has left er mark at DeMatha by teaching the German language and culture to hundreds of students that have come through her classroom doors. She said that during her teaching career, she changed the idea of what her most important responsibility should be as an educator.

"Initially, I was really focused on the content and having the students succeed in learning the content, and then that would refl ct on me being a successful teacher," Ms. Murphy said. "Over the years, especially when I had students who experienced great diffi ulty in learning a foreign language, I'd begun to realize that it all should be based more on the process. If they can enjoy the learning part of it, the grade is not as important."

Ms. Murphy feels proud having students, who initially struggled with the language in her class, come back to her years later and tell her that they were able to use the language while traveling in Germany.

"That's when you say 'YES!' And I'm personally not someone who learns languages easily," Ms. Murphy said. "But I'm willing to put the time in and if I think I can model that to my students. That's a good thing."

In addition to German, Ms. Murphy has also learned French, Spanish, Dutch, and most recently Chinese. Outside of the classroom at DeMatha, she was an advisor to a variety of clubs on campus including the Food Club, Students Against Destructive Decisions and the Anime club, which she served for the longest portion of time.

"I didn't know too much about Anime, but I loved seeing the students have such a special interest in it and share that interest with others," Ms. Murphy said.

Twenty years at DeMatha have fl wn by for Ms. Murphy and she called her time at the school 'enlightening' in watching the physical, mental and emotional growth of her students. She always sought to make her German classes both engaging for her students and a relaxed setting for them to learn.

"I always want to make the classroom comfortable so that, regardless of how difficult or easy the language is for them, they'll grow to become a community in my classroom."

AJ Grant '06 Battling COVID-19 On the Frontlines

hile attending DeMatha, AJ Grant '06 was the captain of the WCAC championship winning varsity soccer team during his senior year. AJ said he thought of trying to go pro in soccer, but quickly turned his attention and career to medicine.

"I was always interested in math and science and taking care of people," AJ said. "Healthcare is a beautiful way to combine all of those interests."

Today, AJ is a Cardiovascular Disease Fellow at Georgetown University Medical Center in Washington, DC. He just completed the fi st year of his fellowship, which saw him perform tasks such as heart ultrasounds and electrocardiogram tests checking for different heart conditions. It was already a hectic schedule for AJ, but things ramped up earlier this year when the COVID-19 pandemic hit the United States.

AJ suddenly found himself on the frontlines of the outbreak.

"At the beginning, things were really crazy," AJ said. "We were stretched very thin. I had colleagues who would be working one day and then in quarantine the next."


The rise in coronavirus patients meant less time for AJ and his colleagues to tend to those who had other health concerns.

"When COVID-19 was really bad in our region, we didn't know how to completely manage it. It was difficult having to tell our patients to stay home until they REALLY needed to be at the hospital. The whole stress on the hospital system affected a lot of people."

Similar to hospitals around the world, AJ and his colleagues at Georgetown feared bringing the disease back home to their families. Thankfully, infection numbers have plateaued recently around the metropolitan region. AJ credits the new norm that's been established in the hospital and around the region, of people wearing masks and physical distancing.

"It's such a novel virus that we don't know much about. So putting yourself in that position is intense," AJ said. "But I think everyone leapt up to the challenge."

After enjoying faculty member Rick Reeves' biology and physics classes at DeMatha, AJ got a scholarship to attend Davidson College in North Carolina. Following graduation, he moved abroad and lived for a few years in Johannesburg, South Africa, working with a non-profit organization called 'Grassroots Soccer', which goes to various townships and teaches HIV education using soccer as a tool.



He then returned stateside to attend Meharry Medical School in Nashville, with additional stints at Washington University in St. Louis, and a residency at Emory University in Atlanta before his fellowship at Georgetown. It was a full-circle moment for AJ as he was born at the Children's Hospital across the street. In addition, his grandfather had years ago worked a job parking cars, which helped his son (AJ's father) get free tuition to Georgetown University.

"For me to come back and be a cardiologist 20 years later is amazing," AJ said. "Huge sacrifices ere made and to see it pay off generation later is truly a blessing."

AJ credits DeMatha for being the strong academic foundation that successfully prepared him for his future years of education.

"One thing I don't think people talk as much about DeMatha are the academics. The academics are top notch."

Many people, throughout his travels, have come up to him and recognized the name 'DeMatha.'

"The DeMatha name carries weight," AJ said. "You can say 'De-Matha' to people and they'll know the type of man you are because of the high school."

AJ was recently selected as a Prince George's County 2020 Forty-Under-40 Honoree for his accomplishments in medicine.

"I was born and raised in Prince George's County. I've lived all over the place, but there's nowhere like Prince George's County. To have your hometown recognize some of the work you're doing is special."

AJ has accomplished a lot so far in his life and is dedicated to continue protecting the community by helping his patients. Th oughout it all, he looks back fondly at his DeMatha years for being a catalyst to the path he's on today.

"I was able to do a lot of things at DeMatha and still keep in touch with my closest friends from there. I'm super thankful for that brotherhood."



Life of Coleman Mellett '92 Celebrated At Documentary Screening

lose to 400 people gathered in late February at the AFI Silver Theatre in Silver Spring, MD to watch, "Sing You a Brand New Song," a 51-minute documentary based on the words and music of Coleman (Coley) Mellett '92, who passed away in 2009 in a plane crash during a snowstorm just outside of Buff lo, NY.

The night was a fundraiser for the Coleman Mellett Scholarship, which is awarded to a DeMatha student who is an outstanding musician involved in the jazz program. To date, eight young men have benefitted from this award. Coley was an all-state musician at DeMatha and was a member of the acclaimed Chuck Mangione Band at the time of his death. The well-received film also includes a companion CD, with a release scheduled for later this year.

The film and CD project were the work of many, but was the brainchild of Coley's wife, Jeanie Bryson, who is also a musician. The evening was hosted by Tim and Kristen Hohman, longtime friends and business partners of Coley's father, Ken. Sponsorships were secured that paid for all of the evening's expenses, which meant that ticket sales (and other sponsorships) helped to secure the \$43,000 the event raised for DeMatha.

"We were thrilled with the evening," Mr. Mellett said. "It was great to see everybody and for everyone to have the chance to see more about Coley, his music, the kind of person he was, and his relationship with Jeanie. We could not have been happier."

Both Ken and his wife Mary Ellen were deeply involved with DeMatha when Coley and his younger brother, Zeb, attended the school. They were presidents of the DeMatha Music Boosters and have stayed involved with the school ever since. Ken is now a member of the DeMatha Board of Directors.

The film has now been screened six times, with the most recent during the online Tokyo Film Festival, where it fin shed fi st in the competition. Once the pandemic eases, additional screenings will be scheduled. "We were very fortunate as it relates to the timing

of this event as it occurred just before the pandemic set in," Mr. Mellett said. "We had a number of people fly in from all over the country to be a part of the event."

"We were also very pleased with the signifi ant turnout from DeMatha alumni, the music program, and the school. That was very special to us," Mr. Mellett said. He added that he wanted to make sure that everyone knew just how grateful his family was for the support they received.

Since Coley's death, the Mellett family has played a huge part in bringing forth safety protocols in the airline industry, which led to the Airline Safety Act of 2010. There have been NO fatalities since the passage of that legislation, according to Mr. Mellett.

Without question, the success of the evening was the result of hard work by many, but also a testament to the Mellett family. Going forward, DeMatha will be sure to keep the community posted on future screenings of the film and when the CD gets released.

BASKETBALL WINS 41ST CONFERENCE TITLE


With the January passing of legendary DeMatha figu e **Morgan Wootten** still fresh in the minds of the varsity basketball team, the Stags used the pain as fuel for a dominant season that culminated in a 70-56 WCAC Championship win over rival Paul VI. It marked the second WCAC title in the last three years and the eighth in 18 years under Head Coach **Mike Jones '91**. The win also marked Coach Jones' 500th win at DeMatha! (Due to the spread of COVID-19

in March, the Maryland Private School Championship and Alhambra Tournament ended up being canceled this year.)

The abrupt end in no way diminishes the accomplishments of this team. The Stags ran through the season with a 30-3 overall record and a 19-1 record against the WCAC. It marked the 19th time in the last 31 years that DeMatha won 30 or more games in a season.

The team once again finished No. 1 in the

final power rankings f om 'The Washington Post' marking the 29th overall time that DeMatha Basketball has finished atop of these rankings. 

DeMatha Stands Tall at The 2020 NFL Draft

eMatha has had a rich and storied legacy of former football Stags achieving success and making it to the NFL. Th s past April, that legacy continued with former Ohio State defensive end Chase Young '17 being selected second overall by the hometown Washington Football Team, Maryland running back Anthony McFarland Jr. '17 selected in the fourth round (124th overall) by the Pittsburgh Steelers and Maryland cornerback Tino Ellis '16 signing as an undrafted free agent with the New Orleans Saints.

"Making it to the NFL was my goal since I fi st stepped onto campus at DeMatha as a freshman," Tino said. "To leave a legacy and try to follow the footsteps of those who came before me."

The social media buzz leading up to, and during, the NFL Draft weekend was incredible both locally and throughout the world.

A big reason for that buzz revolved around Chase being considered one of the consensus top prospects in the draft nd becoming the fi st Stag to ever be selected in the fi st round of an NFL Draft Considering his Ohio State single-season record of 16.5 sacks last year and a bevy of awards including the Chuck Bednarik Award (for best defensive player in college football), and being named First Team All-Big Ten, Big Ten Male Athlete-of-the-Year and a Heisman Trophy fi alist, the growth of hype surrounding Chase and DeMatha was not a surprise.

"DeMatha is defin tely a special place," Chase said in an April interview on the Washington Football Team's website. "My bonds have gotten stronger just through the whole brotherhood. I'm glad my parents told me to move to DeMatha because it was obviously for the best."

Anthony, crediting Ms. Joan Phalen as his favorite teacher, agreed about the way DeMatha prepared him for life in college and beyond. "I knew in ninth grade coming from a public school and transitioning to a private school, seeing how hard the structure and curriculum was, that it was going to be tough for me," Anthony said. "But DeMatha established a toughness about me. No matter what's going on or if I go through adversity, I know things are going to be okay. I feel like the people at DeMatha helped me grow into that mindset."

Each of these three Stags were stars on the football fi ld at De-Matha and subsequently excelled at the collegiate level.

However, the outbreak in March of the COVID-19 pandemic in the United States prevented them from being able to visit teams and hold workouts in person. This led to Chase, Anthony and Tino meeting with teams over Zoom calls and fi ding unique ways to physically prepare for the NFL season outside of a standard gym. Fortunately, Anthony and Tino received great advice from Josh Wilson '03, a nine-year NFL pro and former DeMatha Football coach, to just 'stay focused and enjoy the Draft rocess'.

Chase, Anthony and Tino will join an array of Stags currently in the NFL, which includes free agent defensive end Cameron Wake '00, Philadelphia Eagles safety Rodney McLeod '08, New England Patriots linebacker Ja'Whaun Bentley '14, and Green Bay Packers tight end/fullback John Lovett '14.

While these three Stags are the latest names to be added among the 'DeMatha to NFL successes', they encourage current DeMatha students to simply enjoy their time on 4313 Madison Street, no matter what obstacles stand in their way.

"Enjoy all of the moments of being in high school with your friends," Tino said. "That's something I refl ct upon almost every day. My DeMatha brothers. Enjoy the time because it goes by so fast."




