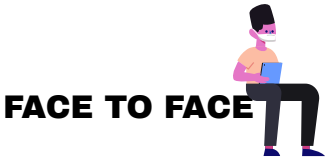

STUDENTS HAVE THREE WAYS TO GET ATTENDANCE CREDIT



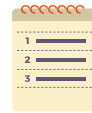
FACE TO FACE

Physically on campus with an educational professional.



SYNCHRONOUSLY

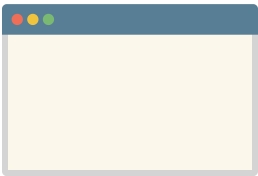
Virtual student that is logged in at the time attendance is taken.



ASYNCHRONOUSLY

Attending virtually in Pre-K through grade 2; or Submitted, engaged or made progress on daily assignment before 11:59pm on the date of absence (All grade levels).

ABSENCES DON'T HAVE TO STAY ABSENCES



STUDENTS CAN COMPLETE ASSIGNMENTS

If a student misses class, but they login to make progress on assignments the very same day, their absence will be updated to asynchronous present.



PARENTS CAN SUBMIT DIGITAL NOTES

STUDENTS WITH COVID OR FLU SYMPTOMS MAY HAVE EXTENDED ABSENCES

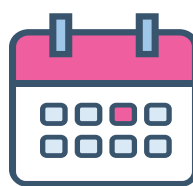
Students experiencing COVID-19 or Flu-Like symptoms should attempt to gain attendance credit virtually, either synchronously or asynchronously, depending on grade level and ability. Parents must notify the campus electronically, and campus staff will excuse the absences for days missed.

TEXAS ATTENDANCE LAWS ARE STILL IN EFFECT



TRUANCY

Students or parents of students who have 10 or more unexcused absences may get a referral for court proceedings to enforce the compulsory attendance law.



LOSS OF CREDIT

The Texas attendance rules say that a student in grades K -12 must be in a class at least 90% of the time if they want to be sure to get credit for that class.
