Throughout the unit, they explored the many different ways that people use their imaginations to think, create and express themselves. In their art lessons with Mrs. Henbest, the students created magnificent ceramic hand puppets. They then used their ideas for these puppets to write a narrative, focusing on the story elements of characters, setting and plot. After individually writing their narratives, the students worked together to collaboratively write a play script for some of these stories, applying dialogue to their ideas. HUMAN MIGRATION by Isaac Driver, G3 teacher

Grade three has been exploring human migration through the big conceptual lenses of function, causation and change. Our related concepts are society, population and diversity. We are interested in the reasons why people migrate, the history of migration and the effects that it has on individuals, places and societies.

Using the library, online sources and a presentation from historian Mr. Mecklem we learned about migration throughout history and presented our findings in groups. We visited the National Museum of Ethnology for further our knowledge of human movement and integration. We explored our personal history by collaborating with our parents to create family trees and we reflected on the impact of movement within our family history. We have read news articles from online news reports that highlight issues and attitudes concerning immigration. We went on a walking tour of the local area to investigate signs of intercultural connections. We have been reading literature about human migration stories as well as real stories written by children.

On Friday 3rd April we visited Minoh Intercultural Center (MAFGA) where we met with employees, locals and foreign community members. We rotated in groups and interviewed them about their experiences as locals and foreigners based around five main migration areas. The areas were change, feelings and attitudes, services, education and barriers.

All the grade three students were respectful, engaged in asking relevant questions and making meaningful connections to their own experiences. We all deepened our knowledge and conceptual understanding of migration as a complex human experience.

GRADE 4 LESSONS ON AIKIDO & KENDO IN PE CLASS

As a way to learn more about traditional Japanese cultural practices and values for their recent inquiry into the transdisciplinary theme Where We are in Place and Time, the Grade 4 class had the opportunity to experience the martial arts of Aikido and Kendo in their PE lessons before the spring break. Under the expert supervision of elementary PE teacher, Ms. Leanne Entwistle, and guest teacher Fukai Sensei, the students began with the study of Aikido, and practiced the art of peaceful resistance or "the way of unifying with life energy". After their lesson, instructor Fukai Sensei commented on the "great positive ki and love" she could feel coming from the hearts of the Grade 4 students! In their later study of Kendo, or "way of the sword," the class was able to look at a very different approach to self-defense. Armed with "shinai" (bamboo staffs) and suited with Kendo armor, yells of "men" and "do" could be heard throughout the gym as the students practiced administering light tapping blows to targeted head and chest parts on their partners' armor.

Both of these experiences in PE class were an awesome way for the students to become more familiar with two Japanese martial arts while gaining a deeper insight into some of the ideals that were valued long ago and (in some cases) are still valued today in the Japanese culture.









MODEL OF THE UNITED NATIONS by Tara Cheney, MUN coordinator







SPRING CAMP REPORT - The Group 4 project by grade 12 students

The group 4 (science) project is a compulsory part of the IB diploma programme. It requires students to show how they can be self motivated, persistent and conscientious. They work in small groups so that co-operation, collaboration and communication are important. Students must also show self awareness in order to utilize their personal strengths and to enable other members of their group to compensate for their weaknesses. It is the team-work that is most important. All of this is done within a real science activity, applying the scientific method to new situations. We hope it is also fun to do. Most of the time it is.

This year we had three teams and each worked within the broad topic title:

Prepare and present a lesson to teach an important scientific principle to a group of 8-10 year old children. They presented their work to grades 3, 4 and 5 on Friday morning. This year every student showed significant personal qualities and gained good marks to add to the Internal Assessment section of their Group 4 subjects.

Eiichi, Lara, Haruka, Yuuki, Jamie and Mirai worked on ice cream.



They included information on its chemistry, its nutritional value and the physics of freezing. They demonstrated one method of making it without using a freezer too.

It was tested and approved by all.

GRADE 11 SERVICE TRIP TO THE PHILIPPINES by Richard Fitzpatrick, science teacher / G11 advisor

The current OIS grade 11 class chose to go to Cebu in the Philippines to undertake their service learning trip during the final week of the spring trimester.

The months of planning were over and the fundraising (which included valentines gift distribution, photo booths and drinks / cookie sales) had ended. It was now time to go and pass on the money that had been raised along with all the books that had been kindly donated by the SOIS community.

After a relatively painless journey to get to Cebu, the students' time there was split between working with two different organisations. Firstly, The Budlaan Reading Centre. This centre was located in one of the poorest and oldest communities in Cebu and was set up to help children from the ages of 2 upwards learn to read, and give them the best possible chance at getting a good education.

As we walked in to the reading centre both the students from the reading centre and from OIS seemed apprehensive, but their nerves quickly disappeared and they were soon playing together. Throughout the two days that were spent there the students helped out with arts and crafts, feeding the students, reading to and playing with the children in addition to organizing the books in the reading centre's library.

It was a great experience all round and many people were sad to leave at the end of the second day.





The second organization the class were helping out was called Gawad Kalinga, which strived to renovate communities and improve the living conditions, whilst also trying to build skills in the community so that the residents can gain employment of their own.

During the two days we spent working with GK, we went to two regions that were most in need of help renovation. The first just happened to be in Buldaan, right next door to the reading centre. This was a great surprise and whilst they were having a break from their painting duties they were able to go and meet their friends from the previous two days.

The final day of service work saw everybody pitching in to paint the inside and outside of a local community centre which was in need of renovation. This community was in an area that had become a little isolated, but everyone there welcomed the group and helped them out where ever they could.



Overall, the entire group worked very hard on the service activities and gained a lot from the experience.
