#### from the desk of the head, Bill Kralovec

Recently I attended a workshop hosted by our Extended Essay Coordinator, Ms. Tara Cheney. The purpose of the event was to help students progress with this core component of the IB Diploma Programme (DP).

The extended essay is a requirement for earning the IB Diploma. It is an independent, self-directed piece of research, culminating in a 4,000-word paper. Students can choose an area of interest in one of the six subject disciplines of the DP. The activity is a great practical preparation for university undergraduate research. Students are expected to spend up to 40 hours to complete the paper. I like it because students use scholarly resources, such Google Scholar, J-STOR, and Project Muse, to read and synthesize results of studies by professors in academic journals. They learn valuable skills such as citing sources, creating a bibliography, as well as formulating a research question and using logic to present an argument. This will put them at an advantage at university to have this experience.

Each student chooses a supervisor to give advice and guidance to them. The supervisor is usually a teacher at the school, and most often, an expert in the subject matter. For example, one student is investigating in English literature, the role of the supernatural in Hamlet and MacBeth, two famous plays by Shakespeare. The student's supervisor is OIS English teacher, Mr. David Algie.

The research begins in the winter term of grade 11 and is completed in the winter term of grade 12. Ms. Cheney's role is keeping everyone on pace to meet the many deadlines of the steps to complete the paper. The workshop last month gave the opportunity for parents to learn about the process and they will be able to give support to the student during the summer holiday. It is an independent activity, so students need to be researching and writing over the summer.

Some of the research questions OIS grade 11 students are writing about are as follows:

- economics A cost/benefit analysis of the new Gamba Osaka football stadium;
- history What political influence did Marie Antoinette have on the French Revolution?
- English Analysis of the World War II speeches of Winston Churchill;
- English How English is hybridized in Asia by Chinese and Japanese speakers;
- biology Does left handedness increase or decrease as students go through school?
- physics Does the calcium carbonate content of seashells correlate to physical strength of the shell?

It is exciting to see OIS students contributing to humanity's knowledge base and produce academic work at such a high level. Congratulations and good luck to Ms. Cheney, the supervisors and most of all, our developing researchers!

Not all classes will have an exam but all students will be participating regardless of whether or not they are planning on completing the full IB Diploma. Grade 11 students and their families are also busy preparing for graduation. That may seem odd considering that they are still more than a year away from finishing school. However, there is a long tradition at OIS of the grade 11 hosting the graduation. The students organize the theater and the other venues, act as ushers for the ceremony and then serve snacks at the reception following graduation. Their parents prepare the food for the reception. The Grade 4 students recently had a chance to gain some real-world experience in the business world by creating their own "Grade 4 Emporium" as part of their inquiry into HOW WE ORGANIZE OURSELVES: Businesses depend on the ability to produce goods and supply services that can be exchanged. In teams of 3 or 4, students worked to form their own business communities where each team member was responsible for thinking of and marketing his or her own good or service for the team business. Business communities and offerings ranged from magic-related items to fun games, beauty services, cool products and an array of food and drinks. In addition to working on team social skills such as group decision-making and adopting a variety of group roles, individual self-management skills such as time management (a.k.a. "meeting deadlines") and personal organization were also put into play during this learning opportunity.

Our Grade 4 students were fortunate to have several opportunities to present their emporium offerings over a couple of school days to a wide range of customers, from children to adults, using mediums of exchange including real Japanese Yen and virtual US dollars. This gave all students the chance to reflect on which things worked well for their businesses and which things did not, and then think of ways to refine their group marketing campaigns to improve for the next time. Many mathematical skills were also utilized throughout, including problem solving, money handling and a great deal of computational work involving the use of fractions, decimals and percentages. Students were also responsible for collecting, organizing and analyzing the data during their experience in the form of surveys, tables, bar graphs and pie charts. Start-up costs were also factored in and repaid to parents or friends before calculating final team profits.

In the end, the Grade 4 business teams were proud to announce their combined earned profits from sales generated on our Open Day of 12,925 Japanese Yen! The students have decided to donate this money to the Save the Children/Red Cross charity who are now working to help the children that are suffering in Nepal from the recent earthquake disasters.





