Class of 2017 Finishes in Style

International Baccalaureate Diploma Programme (IBDP) students receive their exams results on July 6 (IB Results Day). Many have conditional offers from universities and their admission depends on reaching a specified score on the exams. IB Results Day sometimes can determine their future path. A student needs to score 24 points out of a possible 45 to earn the IB diploma. Around 75% of all students pass the exams and only around 200 of the over 150,000 students sitting the May exams, have a perfect score of 45.

The OIS class of 2017 scores from the May 2017 were outstanding, with an average score of 33.3 compared to a world average score of 29.95. Only 5% of all IB candidates score 40 or above. Kai Junge, Airi Wakasa and Corrine Watanabe scored over 40 points, which is 16% of this year's class. Kai scored perfect 7s in his higher level science and mathematics courses, a first for OIS. All OIS students taking the full diploma programme scored 25 or above!

Most of the students this month are off to their universities to begin the next step of their academic career. The students weighed the offers this summer, some after receiving their IB scores. Students are matriculating in the following universities this year:

Japan: Kwansei Gakuin University, Ritsumeikan Asia Pacific University, Temple University, Osaka University, Keio University and International Christian University.

At the start of the new school year it is important to build a strong sense of community so new students feel welcomed and returning students feel motivated to learn together. The PYP is a very social programme founded on group-work and collaboration so community is particularly important.

Community is also the last word in the SOIS mission statement so this is a good foundation to focus upon. In the first week of term each grade examined one word of the mission. The students considered the meaning of that word and related it to their own experience. Grade 4 made posters and a skit that demonstrated the meaning of informed "If you give people lots of information they will be informed!" Grade 1 made a large poster that portrayed examples of caring behavior, "We need to help and be kind." KA thought about being creative and noticed they did lots of different artistic activities in class so they posed for photos showing themselves being creative with paint, blocks, shapes and dressing up clothes. KB reflected upon what it means to be individuals and painted pictures of their classmates showing how they are each unique yet also the same, "We like different kinds of play." Grade 5 pondered how you behave if you are contributing and decided that this included "being a good role model, kindness and being principled and school spirit." Grade 2 observed that global included everyone on our earth and "It's about respecting that people are different." Finally Grade 3 investigated what and who makes a community and they found many local examples such as shops and soccer teams. "A community is the world working together. It is families, neighbours, schools and friends. It is a team working together. A community can be a school like here." All the grades contributed their research to our first assembly together and there is a display of this

Probably the most important part of my job as head of the school is recruiting teachers. The quality of the teacher is one of the key factors of student learning. Brilliant, committed teachers equate into a great school. For an international school, we have a very low rate of faculty turnover. The average length of stay at OIS is 6.86 years and in the past seven years, we are averaging 5 full-time teachers leaving.

This year's new faculty is a bit larger than average and it gave the school the opportunity to bring new ideas and teaching techniques to the school. I feel like a general manager of a sports team, evaluating candidates and looking for certain skills, interests, experiences, personality traits, etc. It is a goal of the school to have a balanced and diverse faculty in regards to gender, age, nationality, experience, etc. I believe it makes for a better school.

They arrived literally from all over the world last month, and have been busy settling into their apartments, school, and life in Japan. There is a lot of work that goes on behind the scenes to help the newcomers acclimate and feel comfortable and ready to teach. I would like to recognize the business office for all of their outstanding work. Veteran teachers as well volunteered during their summer holidays to come in early and assist with errands and getting them set up in their new homes.



Claudelle Lewis taught the past six years at the Luanda International School in Angola. She is an expert in mathematics teaching, serving as the PYP mathematics coordinator at her previous school. She is from Trinidad & Tobago and has a Master's degree of International Education from

Framingham State College in Massachusetts, USA. She majored in Environmental and Natural Resources Management from the University of the West Indies and taught at the International School of Port of Spain on her home island. She will be teaching grade 4 this year.



Kelly Deklinski comes to us from the Leysin American School in Switzerland where she taught general music and band. Her specialty is the trumpet and she is an active member of the International Trumpet Guild. She has a degree in music education from Indiana University of

The fall sports season is already up and running. Current Sabers athletes have attended pre-season information meetings and have completed the mandatory online Sabers Sign Up. At the meetings, we discuss the importance of commitment to an athletic team and of balance among athletics, academics, music, and other interests. We talk about eligibility requirements and costs. We emphasize the importance of appropriate behavior on and off the playing field, behavior that is consistent with our concept of the 5 respects and with our mission of developing "informed, caring, creative individuals contributing to a global community." We tell students that there are three kinds of sportsmanship: poor sportsmanship, good sportsmanship, and - at the very top - Sabers sportsmanship. We have high expectations of our students.

SOIS Shines at World Scholar's Cup Global Round



30 SOIS students traveled to Hanoi, Vietnam this summer to participate in the World Scholar's Cup Global Round. The goals of World Scholar's Cup to motivate students of all backgrounds to discover new strengths and practice new skills and to inspire a global community of future scholars and leaders. The event is a celebration of learning centered around 4 academic events, including debate, knowledge bowl, collaborative writing, and a challenge test. Included in between these are social events to get students to make connections with others. More than 3000 students from over 50 countries were in Hanoi. All of the students had to qualify for the round through local events.

All of the SOIS students did well, making many friends and learning much about themselves and the topics of this year's event. Several students placed very high in the standings, considering the over 1,000 teams in the two divisions. Grade 9 Emily Yoo finished 44th overall in the junior division. The team of Tyus Sheriff (4th overall), Skye Inada (30th place) and Minami Matsushima (43rd place) won third place in the senior division. SIS English teacher Steve Sheriff won the Coach of the Year prize for his efforts in building the program at our school. Congratulations to all the students and teacher involved in the program!


