

Views from the Head of School, BILL KRALOVEC

The OIS faculty participated last week in a child protection workshop. It was not the most cheerful way to start the new year, but it is a very important topic. We want to strengthen our child protection program at the Senri & Osaka International Schools. Jim Hulbert, a lawyer and international school consultant from the Jane Group, gave our teachers some sobering statistics on the prevalence of child abuse around the world in his presentation. This should be a wake up call for all of us to raise awareness of the problem and act in protecting children against abuse.

There are many forms of abuse, sexual, physical, emotional, neglect, etc. With the United Nations International Rights of the Child as the base, we have produced a school child protection policy. A child protection team, led by the counselors of both schools, will lead the program. Besides our work with faculty and staff, we are looking to raise awareness and train parents and students to recognize abuse. With the #metoo movement gaining popularity in the USA and the world, OIS students should graduate and be able to recognize and stop harassment.

In addition to protecting children, the workshop discussed ways teachers can protect themselves. The case of Neil Bentleman, a former Canadian administrator at the Jakarta Intercultural School, serving a 10-year prison

sentence in Indonesia, brought the issue to the forefront in the international school community. We are reminding teachers to take precautions and put the welfare of students first and maintain appropriate boundaries between adults and children. However, we value close, caring relationships between teachers and students. Strong child protection measures do not rule out warm relations and pastoral care from teachers.

International schools and OIS in particular, are putting in place stronger criminal background checks and screening of adults working with the students in schools. The idea is to dissuade child predators of applying at our school and other international schools. The recent case of William Vahey, an infamous predator who taught at a variety of international schools, should be a warning to all of us to be aware that abuse takes place. The added measures are mirroring a trend in national schools.

We plan to hold parent workshops later this year to inform parents on what they can do to protect children.

Views from the ES Principal, CAROLYNE MARSHALL

Reflection is a cornerstone of learning in the PYP. Reflection enables us to evaluate where we've been and plan where to go next. Students are regularly encouraged to reflect on their learning, but reflection is important for the OIS staff as well. As the IB learner profile states: 'we work to understand our strengths and weaknesses in order to support our learning and personal development'. In addition to our day-to-day reflection, for the last eighteen months the OIS community has been engaged in a process of formalized reflection. This is in preparation for a visit by teams of educators from the International Baccalaureate (IB) and the Western Association of Schools and Colleges (WASC) which occurs every five years to assess the effectiveness of the school's operations and to maintain our membership of both organizations. This regular evaluation combines an internal and external assessment of the teaching and learning at OIS to ensure high standards are met.

Since August 2016 teachers have met in varied groups to gather evidence and evaluate progress in our teaching of the three IB programmes. These findings have been compiled in detailed self-study questionnaires which have been sent to the visiting teams this week. Action plans have been drafted from these findings to guide developments over the next five years.

Teachers were not the only people to reflect on practices. To ensure the inclusion of a spectrum of stakeholders in the self-study I met with various groups in June 2017 who completed parts with which they were familiar. Student representatives, the Actioneers, considered practices connected with demonstrating IB philosophy and the learner profile. They discussed their viewpoints then recorded their assessment and comments. The three classroom assistants met to assess teaching and learning from their perspective as they worked in the classrooms. Also, four parents on the PTA met to reflect on the school's provision of resources and support for learning.

This structured self-study process, with input from all sections of the community, enables us to assess our practices and plan the next stages in the development of OIS. It also allows the visiting teams from WASC and the IB to understand our unique context and enables them to 'hit the ground running' when they arrive at the school in February.

From 19 - 22 February the combined teams of eight IB and WASC visitors will spend time at OIS. They will view classes, examine samples of student work and interview teachers, students and parents. They will compare what we have described in the self-studies with what they find at school. Their reports will inform us how effectively we

are teaching the PYP, MYP and DP. They will assist us in developing and maintaining a school community that reflects the standards and objectives of the IB. They will also show how well we are supporting high achievement and meeting the needs of all our students. If we meet all these standards, we will be granted re-accreditation to the IB and WASC.

KG Update

Harvard and Kwansei Gakuin Students Team Up to Discuss Sustainable Development

Sunday, January 7th, five students from Kwansei Gakuin University and five students from Harvard University participated in an open forum entitled "Continue to Challenge for the World Issue - Things We Can Do For SDGs," organized through a collaboration between Kwansei Gakuin University and the student-led Harvard College Japan Initiative. The event was held at the Nishinomiya City University Exchange Center in Nishinomiya.

The opening presentations were given by two mixed groups of students from both universities, and addressed potential ways that localities and countries could work to achieve the 17 Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) set by the United Nations. Both groups focused primarily on Goal 11, sustainable cities and communities, and Goal 12, responsible consumption and production.

The first group did a cross-city comparative analysis of three major world cities: Los Angeles, Manila, and Osaka. In one section, they looked at what steps are being taken in each city to limit carbon dioxide emissions, and suggested several specific ways for each nation to step up their efforts, such as constructing more green spaces in urban areas in Japan and building up the public transportation infrastructure in the Philippines. Later, they compared waste management practices in the three cities, and talked about the possibility of adopting biomass recycling techniques in Japan, as well as the need to improve environmental awareness in the USA and in the Philippines.

The second group performed a case study on electronic waste (E-waste) management in Morocco, and proposed ways to improve the current situation, such as the creation of a waste separation plant which would process the E-waste into precious metals for domestic use or for export. The group observed that Morocco already has a strong trade relationship with Japan, as the latter imports Moroccan octopus for consumption, and noted that working together on E-waste management would be mutually beneficial. Both groups emphasized that sustainability begins at the individual level, and that environmental education is essential if nations are going to solve their sustainability challenges.




After the group presentations, there was a panel discussion with the five Harvard students about controversial global issues. The students spoke passionately about the current American administration's stance on climate change and renewable energy, and how it would affect the global effort to meet the Sustainable Development Goals. Some students felt that America's decision to withdraw from the Paris Agreement and focus on fossil fuels would have a strongly negative impact. Other students disagreed, saying that other countries such as China, Japan and India would take the lead on combating climate change and developing renewable energy sources.

Finally, to close out the forum, the students formed small groups with audience members for a lively exchange of views. Amanda Mozea, a senior majoring in Social Studies at Harvard University, remarked after the event that "People asked a lot of fascinating questions, 'think about how to solve the world' questions, which I think is awesome." Haruki Ume, a junior at the KGU School of Policy Studies, said "I really enjoyed the opportunity to talk with the Harvard students. We discussed sustainable development, which is very complicated, but they helped us, and this event made me stronger for my future dreams."

The Harvard exchange with KGU, which is shepherded by Prof. Shun-ichi Murata of the KGU School of Policy Studies, began three years ago and was originally just a one-day event. It now spans three days, and with this year's forum event also a great success, students at KGU and Harvard can look forward to continued fruitful cooperation in the future.
