

What is the Early College High School program?



What is the Early College High School Program?

The **Early College High School Program** (also called **EDGE** which stands for Earn a Degree, Graduate Early) is an exciting new program for high school students in Tulsa Public Schools.

🎓 Students are enrolled both at their high school (McLain High School or Memorial High School) and at Tulsa Community College

🎓 Students are part of a cohort and receive lots of additional supports (tutoring, college-prep workshops, fun events with their cohort, etc.)

🎓 After a college-prep year in 9th grade, students start taking classes at Tulsa Community College in 10th grade

🎓 Students graduate with both a high school diploma and a college degree from Tulsa Community College!

🎓 Most importantly, this program is free to students!

Wait, what....? A free college degree?

Yes, really!

Costs are shared between Tulsa Community College, the Oklahoma State Regents for Higher Education, and Tulsa Public Schools. That includes tuition, fees, textbooks and transportation.

The program is free to students and families.

Even better!

EDGE will not affect your OK Promise scholarship after high school graduation. It still pays in full.

What will my high school experience look like?

Students who participate in this program get a high school and a college experience at the same time. Some of the things that you'll experience are:

- 🎓 Monthly cohort events with other students in the Program
- 🎓 An introduction to college 9th grade elective class
- 🎓 Summer bridge programs
- 🎓 9th grade college-prep year
- 🎓 Access to college facilities
- 🎓 TCC classes beginning in the 10th grade (students will share their time between their high school and TCC)

How is this different from Concurrent Enrollment?

EDGE: Early College High School	Concurrent Enrollment
Available at Memorial High School and McLain High School	Available at every Tulsa Public Schools high school
Full degree program – participants graduate with an Associate’s degree from Tulsa Community College	Not a degree program – students enroll in individual college courses that can count towards a college degree after high school and high school graduation requirements
Cohort-based	Individual-based
Students go through a college-prep year in 9th grade and start taking college classes in 10th grade	Students start taking college courses in 11th grade
Free!	Students pay some fees
Required extra tutoring, advising, and college connection experiences	Extra tutoring has to be scheduled by student

Who can apply, and how does the application work?



Who is eligible to apply for this program?

All current 8th graders are eligible to apply – even if you don't live in the Memorial or McLain feeder patterns.

The application consists of two required parts:

1. Go to tulsaschools.org/enroll and fill out an enrollment application by February 12th

Select either "Memorial High School Early College" or "McLain High School Early College" as one or two of your six choices on the form.

2. Go to tulsaschools.org/earlycollege and fill out an Early College High School application (in either English or Spanish)

You can also pick up a paper copy from Monroe Middle School, Memorial Middle School, McLain High School or Memorial High School.

Here's what you'll need for the application – be sure to start early because it will take some work!

- ✓ Fill out the **application form** which asks for things like your name, address & student ID number

There are a lot of checkboxes, so make sure to take your time and read the application carefully. Parents or guardians should fill this out with their students..

- ✓ Two **letters of recommendation**

You will submit these with your application (more information on the next slide)

- ✓ One 500 word **application essay**

You can choose from 4 writing prompts that you'll find in the FAQ section of this presentation. You'll submit the application essay as part of the application form.

All of this needs to be completed by February 12th!

Some more information about the letters of recommendation

You need two letters:

1. One from someone within the eighth-grade staff (a teacher or counselor, for example)
2. One from someone outside the school (not a family member). This could be a neighbor, a minister or a family friend, for example.

Every letter of recommendation is different – there is no standard format, minimum length or other requirements. Letters can be typed or written by hand.

This is likely the first time that a student has needed a letter of recommendation so if you have any questions at all, please reach out to your counselor.

This is likely your first time needing a letter of recommendation – here is some advice!

- Every letter of recommendation is different – there is no standard format, or length. Letters can be typed or written by hand.
- Ask early – the adults writing the letter will need some time to write the letter, and get it back to you.
- If the adults writing your letters ask you about it, here are some good things to include
 - How they know you
 - What they think your strengths are
 - Why they think you can succeed in this program
- If you have any questions at all, please reach out to your counselor.

How to submit the letters of recommendation

There are two ways to submit the letters of recommendation.

1. Ideally, you'll upload the letters as part of your online application.
2. If that is not possible, please place both recommendations in one envelope. On the outside of the envelope please write: "Early College High School Recommendations for [student name]". Leave this envelope with your 8th grade school counselor or the appropriate school representative.

Some additional information about the application essay

You need to write one 500 word **application essay**

You can choose from 4 writing prompts that you'll find in the FAQ section of this presentation. You'll submit the application essay as part of the application form.

The FAQ section of this presentation also includes the scoring rubric for the essay.

When writing this essay, you can (and you should!) ask your counselor for support and feedback!


What happens after you submit your application?

1. A selection committee will review each application in a fair, double-blind process.
2. By the third week of March, all applicants will be notified about the committee decision.
3. In August, there is a two-day summer program for all selected students

Once selected, are there any criteria to stay in the program?

If you are admitted to the program, there are two criteria to remain in the program:

- Admitted students must attend Memorial High School or McLain High School and maintain a **3.0 unweighted high school GPA** in 9th grade
- Throughout grades 10 – 12, students must maintain a **college GPA of 2.0** and must be on-track for high school graduation



Answers to frequently asked questions... and who to ask if you have more questions

Can I still participate in athletics?

Yes, you will still be able to participate in athletics. However, the Early College High School program is more academically challenging and time-intensive than being a regular high school student. Experience has shown that many students are involved in 9th grade and 10th grade athletics but many opt out by 11th grade.

I'm already in 9th grade. Can I still participate in the program?

No. Unfortunately, this program is only open to students who are currently in 8th grade.

What do I need to write my admission essay about?

You can find the criteria for the admission essay within the application itself. You will be asked to choose one of the following four prompts:

- Discuss what you feel will be your biggest challenge in participating in the Early College High School Pathway Program in high school.
- Explain what you think the following quote means and how it might apply to your life now or in the future. “It’s easier to build strong children than it is to repair broken men.” – Frederick Douglas
- Describe a real-world problem you have encountered or witnessed and propose a means of improving the problem. Stay away from ideological topics (e.g., prayer or religion in public schools or racism). Focus on tangible issues where there are specific action steps anyone can take.
- Define what leadership means to you and give examples, positive or negative, from your life. Your essay should demonstrate what you learned about leadership and how you hope to use those lessons.

How will the essay be scored?

Here's the rubric the selection committee will use:

ESSAY RUBRIC	Exceeds Expectations 3	Meets Expectations 2	Below Expectations 1
Mechanics	Few, if any errors	A few minor errors but good command of conventions	Several mechanical errors that confuse or obscure meaning
Thesis	Responds to prompt with a creative, original thesis	Responds to the prompt with a clear thesis	Fails to respond to the prompt and has no thesis statement
Organization/coherence	Logical organizational structure, strong transitions between sentences and paragraphs	Clear organizational structure, smooth transitions between paragraphs and sentences	Lacks organization, choppy
Style	sophisticated word choice, varied sentences, use of figurative language	appropriate word choice, clear sentences, consistent tone	Lack of sentence variety, poor word choice
Content	detailed, specific support for thesis, maintains strong focus	provides good support for thesis, mostly consistent focus	Little or weak support, lack of unity

Is participation in the early college high school program really free of charge to students and families?

Yes!

Is this program open to undocumented students?

Yes. If you are undocumented, you can still participate in this program.

Where will classes take place?

In 9th grade, students will take courses at their high school (Memorial High School or McLain High School).

In 10th, 11th and 12th grades, classes will take place both at the high school and at the Tulsa Community College Northeast campus.

Will transportation be provided?

Yes, transportation between the high school and the Tulsa Community College will be provided by the district for classes, summer events, and cohort activities.

What college degree am I earning?

Students will graduate from Tulsa Community College with an Associate of Arts, Liberal Arts degree. This two-year degree is 61 credit hours and has been chosen because of the ability to tailor required courses to each student's goals.

You will work with college staff beginning in the 9th grade to explore careers and then chose a college focus. Within the Liberal Arts plan, you will enroll in courses that will transfer in your chosen major to your chosen university!

When's the deadline again?

February 12th. Be sure to start your application at least two weeks before you plan to submit it because it takes time, and you will need two letters of recommendation.
