

Welcome to the 2009-2010 school year!

After more than two months of the three R's (and much more!), VCS students, staff and parents are off to a strong start, a great beginning.

Whether they are meeting new and exciting academic challenges or engaging in a myriad of athletic, artistic and community service pursuits, our students are proving, yet again, that they are 21st century students.

From our youngest Preschoolers to our most experienced juniors and seniors, our students are learning to be adaptable, collaborative and balanced. And, this includes the 147 additional students we welcomed to our district at the beginning of the school year!

While I am confident that all of our students have what it takes to meet the 21st century's opportunities and challenges, it is no secret that as a nation, state and community, we are facing some of the most difficult times in recent economic history. Last month, in an attempt to fill a three billion dollar budget gap, Governor David Paterson proposed a series of mid-year budget cuts. If the legislature approves his plan, cuts to school aid would total about \$480 million over the rest of the state's fiscal year, which ends in March. A further \$200 million would come out of the 2010-2011

education budget. The proposed gap elimination adjustment for VCS is \$1.3 million.

If these cuts are approved, they would be the first midyear cuts from the state's school aid in nearly 20 years.

Despite looming cuts, VCS continues to do what we have been doing best for many years, develop fiscally conservative budgets that respect not only the quality and integrity of our programs but the needs of our community, as well.

As one of only a few school districts in New York State that continues to grow on a yearly basis. (Our research projects that by 2019, we will have 4,912 students.) I, along with school district staff and the Board of Education, am committed to ensuring that we address the growth with grace, integrity and vision.

If "the beginning is the most important part of the work," as Plato so eloquently said, than I am confident the future of VCS is bright.

On behalf of the Board of Education, welcome to the 2009-2010 school year!

A Growing Issue

VCS Enrollment Projections Anticipate Over 400 New Students by 2015

Excellent schools, great housing, affordable taxes and wonderful family-focused communities.

These are some of the reasons families continue to move into the Victor Central School District, and some of the reasons that, unlike many other area school districts, the VCS School District continues to see growth in its classrooms. This school year alone, VCS saw an increase of 147 additional students.

The doors opened in September with a record 4,302 students, Pre-K-12.

According to enrollment projections prepared by FACTS*, an independent research firm, this growing trend is not about to end soon. In fact, in a recent report compiled by FACTS, the VCS K-12 campus community is projected to burgeon to 4,698 by 2015 and 4,912 by 2019. *(This figure does not include our current 190 Pre-K students.)


How is the District preparing for this continued growth spurt? Thoughtfully and proactively, according to VCS Superintendent Dawn Santiago-Marullo.

"Over the last few years several of our district goals have been specifically focused on monitoring the growth of the student population. For example, Mike Vistocco, VCS Business Administrator and Chris Marshall, Director of Facilities and Operations meet with building administration annually to evaluate the usage of space in every building. In addition Darren Everhart, Director of Transportation, monitors a variety of external factors, such as new housing.

From keeping a close watch on student enrollment to overseeing physical building changes, Santiago-Marullo says the District's goal has, and will continue to be,

to ensure our space meets the needs of students, which will likely include a future capital project.

Santiago-Marullo says that she will continue to work closely with the Board or Education and the Administrative Team to ensure that our students have the best learning environment possible. "As a community living in some of most difficult economic times in recent history we need to recognize the need for balance, giving our children the very best education in the most fiscally responsible manner possible. This will always be our top priority," Santiago-Marullo said.

What Makes For A Snow Day?

Each year, in the wee hours of a cold and snowy winter's morning, many parents and children wait and wonder.

Will school be closed? When will we know? How will we know?

VCS is committed to the safety and well-being of children all year long, but during winter months, that commitment takes on a new look and feel . . . BRRRR!

The following information was compiled by school administrators to give you an inside perspective on what makes for a snow day at VCS.



How does VCS make a decision on road conditions when weather is inclement?

VCS Director of Transportation, Darren Everhart follows a number of steps to determine the severity of road conditions. From personally driving on certain roads on his way into work to checking the latest weather forecasts and radar and collaborating with other VCS administrators as well as officials from the towns of Victor and Farmington highway departments, Everhart looks at road conditions from a variety of perspectives. After gathering "internal data" he contacts transportation supervisors at school districts that border Victor to get their input. Once all of this information is compiled, Everhart formulates a recommendation and contacts the Superintendent of Schools.

How will I know if school is closed?

Once the district has determined to close schools, parents, students and community members are notified through a variety of channels. The first line of communication to parents and students comes in the form of a phone call directly to your home, via a Connect-Ed* message from Superintendent Dawn Santiago-Marullo. Other forms of notification include the local media, including sources such as Y-News, WHEC-TV, WROC-TV, WOKR-TV, WHAM, Democrat and Chronicle, etc. An updated school status is also recorded on the school district's main telephone switchboard.

This process applies to not only full day school closings, but to early dismissals and evening cancellations as well.

School is closed and it's not even snowing! Why?

The elusive wind-chill factor...

According to a document authored by VCS Physician, Dr. Cynthia DiLaura Devore and reviewed and approved for use by the Monroe County Public Health Department, consideration for cold weather school closures include the following:

- No one should be outside with unprotected skin with wind-chill factors in the range of -40° F. If there is such a thing as a medical reason for closure, this would be a probable medical indication for school closure and suspension of outdoor activity, including interscholastic outdoor sports, even cold weather sports.
- Injuries can occur sooner and at higher temperatures. As we are approaching wind chills of -25° F, it may be time to consider closure.






















VCS Music Faculty Recital Slated for November 19th

Red Cross Teaches 300 ECEC Kindergarters With Scrubby Bear Program

Last month, Red Cross volunteers taught a total of 300 Victor Central School kindergarten students how to stay healthy and germ free through the Red Cross Scrubby Bear program; a hand washing program used to teach children the importance of good habits to help prevent diseases such as Infectious Diarrhea, Hepatitis A, colds, and more.

During the visit children were introduced to proper hand washing techniques through a song and a familiar story line. Students also received interactive handouts, stickers, badges and a card signifying membership in the Scrubby Bear Club to commend them on completing the session.

"The American Red Cross Scrubby Bear program is a fun and exciting way that the West Ontario County Office teaches children primarily in the four to six year age range that hand washing is the number one universal precaution for preventing the spread of communicable diseases and viruses," said Judy Bennett, Director of the West Ontario Red Cross. "With the current threat of the H1N1 virus it's important to teach and reinforce good habits among this vulnerable age group of children," she said.

> Last year the Red Cross reached more than 600 area children through the Scrubby Bear program. They have presented it to Victor Central School Students for the past three years.

to solve. Our students really became personally connected, almost like outside




Boys Soccer Teams Score Off the Field


Heather Zollo, VJH Teaching Assistant and SOAR committee member says the program is important in planting the seeds for lifelong enjoyment of reading. Studies show that beginning in 8th grade, reading for enjoyment drops off and continues to decline during the high school years. Studies also report that students who read regularly, read better, write better and perform better on standardized tests than students who do not read on a regular basis.

Victor Marching Blue Devils Take the Field

The Victor Marching Blue Devils took first place with a score of 90.50 in the National Class division at a New York State Field Band Competition on October 17, 2009 at Victor's Corbit Field. The Blue Devils performed their program "Spirit of St. Louis: A Transatlantic Journey" before a crowd of over a thousand spectators. The Victor program features music by Richard Saucedo and catalogs the historic and dramatic journey of Charles Lindbergh's first Transatlantic flight in 1927. The Victor Marching Blue Devils musical journey begins on a quiet morning in Roosevelt Field New York where Lindbergh starts his plane, travels across the Atlantic and culminates with a triumphant conclusion in Paris, France.

The Victor Marching Blue Devils begin the 2009-2010 season competing for a second year as a nationally-ranked field band and are celebrating their 28th season of involvement in the New York Field Band Conference. The groups' successful and storied history includes winning six New York State Field Band State Champi-

onships and an 8th place finish at the USSBA National Championships last year.

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
