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
Dorothy DiAngelo Named ECEC Principal

Important New Transportation and School Schedule Changes!

On Tuesday, July 29, the Victor Board of Education approved a proposal by district staff and parent representatives to consolidate two bus runs - K-3 and 4-6 into one bus run - K-6.

This recommendation was the result of an earlier request by the Board of Education to look at ways the district could reduce energy consumption and related costs. After a thorough analysis of current transportation practices (VCS buses travel 1,000,000 miles per year and average about seven miles per gallon.) VCS Transportation Director, Darren Everhart concluded that a single bus run would save the District approximately \$200,000 per year.

One consolidated bus run will mean several things for students —new transportation pick-up and drop- off times and new school schedules for the Primary School and Intermediate School students. (The ECEC schedule will not change.) The 2008-2009 school schedules are as follows:

VIS Students exchange letters with middle school students in China

This past April, Alice Chen, our former visiting teacher from Chonqing, China, contacted VIS teacher, Amy Smith-Faczan to ask her if she could round up some students to write letters to her middle school students in China so they could practice

the school day wasn't all our students were surprised to learn. They were also amazed to discover that most Chinese students do not have pets like we do. Despite their cultural differences, Smith-Faczan said the children found that they still had many things in

common, like music, favorite/least favorite subjects in school and similar hobbies.

Smith-Faczan said the letters were such a hit that almost everyone wanted to write back and they quickly got another box of letters together and mailed it in early June. "This time, our students included

> their home address so the Chinese students could



writing in English.

"The response was overwhelming...I had more than 100 letters from fourth, fifth and sixth graders and we mailed them in one big package. About five weeks later, we received

a package of response letters and our Intermediate students were THRILLED!" Smith-Faczan said.

Smith-Faczan said the letters, which were written in beautiful penmanship, were full of questions, like how long they studied at night and what their favorite music was. Some of the Chinese students even included coins and other small trinkets. Smith-Faczan said our students were surprised to learn how long a school day was at Verakin. Their day begins at 8:00 a.m. and ends at 5:00 p.m. Verakin students also attend study hall every evening from 7:00 - 9:00 p.m. The length of mail letters directly to their home. Some also included email addresses," Smith-Faczan said.

Smith-Faczan's students were not the only ones who engaged in this international letter writing exchange. Alison Sheridan's fifth grade class also corresponded with a group of Chinese students from Verakin in Chonging, China this past year.

VCS Teachers Earn National **Board Certification**

Victor Central Schools recently honored two teachers, Alison Sheridan and Joanne Lowe, for receiving their National Board Certification. National Board Certification is the highest symbol of professional teaching in excellence. Teachers who receive this distinction must engage in a rigorous reflective

process that includes everything from producing videotaped research to completing spontaneous timed on-line assignments and in-depth written portfolio activities.

Mrs. Sheridan, a fifth grade teacher at the Intermediate School says she was inspired to become nationally certified by an already certified colleague in the district whom she greatly respects. "I continually make professional goals for myself and this is one I wanted to reach. It was a multi-year process for me but I simply set incremental goals along the way to achieve it." Sheridan said.

Mary Szlosek, Victor Intermediate School Principal says Sheridan's recent National Board Certification simply supports what she is already doing in the classroom. "During her ten years at VIS, Alison has challenged her students to always do their best, reaching their potential. Her utilization of inquirybased activities and differentiated instruction has been the impetus for her success with children," Szlosek said.

Joanne, Lowe, Victor Primary School (VPS) Suzuki Strings and general music teacher, and the only music teacher in New York State to become certified in 2007, said she never heard of National Board Certification until several teachers at the Primary School became certified a few years ago. "I talked to them about the process and what they had to say about the benefits to their teaching and to the profession intrigued me. They felt it was the best thing they had ever done for their teaching and since I am always looking for ways to improve, it seemed like a wonderful way to do that. I also love a challenge!" Mrs. Lowe said.

Michelle Cramer, VPS Assistant Principal says Mrs. Lowe's desire to elevate her professional skills has a positive personal effect on many. "Joanne consistently discovers ways to refine her professional practice and add to her repertoire of skills for working with varied cognitive and social/emotional differences. In addition, Joanne serves on building level as well as district level committees and collaborates with colleagues to find ways to integrate music education throughout the students' day. It is evident that Joanne sees the special gift that each child has and finds ways to foster their own unique special gifts through music."

1959 Grad Is Named Victor Central Schools' 2008 Graduate of Distinction

Author and Newspaper Publisher **Lewis Fisher** Was Honored

When Lewis F. Fisher graduated from Victor Central High School in 1959 the quote beside his photo read: "Who costs to write a line, must sweat." It seems that Mr. Fisher has lived these words well.

After graduating from Victor Schools, Mr. Fisher received a bachelor's degree from Allegheny College and a master's from Columbia University's Graduate School of Journalism. He was a captain in the U.S. Air Force, serving in Izmir, Turkey and Wiesbaden, Germany.

After working as a reporter for the San Antonio Express-News, he left in 1971 to establish The North San Antonio Times, which grew into a group of ten suburban weekly newspapers that he published for 21 years. He

was elected president of Suburban Newspapers of America for 1988–89. His Maverick Publishing Company has published more than 30 general interest books on San Antonio and Texas, ranging from San Antonio place names and great motorcycle rides to a guide to Texas wines. He has received numerous local. regional, state and national citations for newspaper editorials and column writing plus the Texas Society of Architects John G. Flowers Award and the Friends of the San Antonio Public Library Arts and Letters Award.

Fisher is the author of nine books about San Antonio, Texas.

He is also the author of Victor: The History of a Town, written in 1996 and

reviewed in New York History Magazine as "an eminently readable and authoritative history of the town, a balanced study."

Mr. Fisher was formally recognized at a special Graduates of Distinction breakfast ceremony on Sunday, June 29 at DiPacifics restaurant in Farmington, N.Y. Following the reception, he then joined the class of 2008 as they processed to their graduation ceremony at the Constellation Brands-Marvin Sands Performing Arts Center at Finger Lakes Community College.

The Graduate of Distinction program was initiated in 2002 as a way to recognize VCS alumnus who have demonstrated outstanding achievement and made significant contributions to society.

Primary School Seeks Book Buddies
