

A Message from Superintendent Timothy J. McElheran



Dear Residents,

The 2008-2009 school year began in an incredibly strong manner. From welcoming dozens of enthusiastic new students and staff to the rededication of Corbit Field your support continues to amaze me. Unfortunately, with every positive moment we celebrate, it seems we are faced with challenges, as well.

Over the past several weeks our state and nation has been grappling with liquidity issues in the financial markets, plunging stock prices, a subprime mortgage debacle and credit crunches that are preventing not only individuals from running their households but businesspeople from operating their businesses.

From rising unemployment figures to numerous bank foreclosures and failing financial firms, the news has been extremely distressing.

As an outsider, it is easy to perceive this crisis as something beyond us or something that will be taken care of for us. After all, Congress recently passed a \$700 billion dollar rescue plan for our financial systems and global banks joined in solidarity to cut interest rates. While these are both positive steps toward remedying our ailing financial situation, this may by no means end the storm and that is why I am writing to you today.

Thirty-five percent of our school district's revenue comes from state funding – funding from a state government that is has been directly hit by this financial storm. Last week, Governor Patterson projected that New York State would end this fiscal

year with a \$1.5 billion deficit and projects a \$12.5 billion dollar deficit in the next fiscal year beginning on April 1, 2009.

Governor Patterson has not minced words or worries, telling the Associated P the crisis this year and in 2009-2010 without raising taxes.” He has also said that while he wants to avoid midyear cuts in school aid, schools should prepare for reduced spending in the coming fiscal year. On November 18, he is calling the New York State Legislature back for a special budget session to discuss the economic issues we are facing.

As Victor Central Schools moves forward in developing next year's school budget, I can assure you that we will be taking an extremely conservative approach – analyzing, strategizing, streamlining and tightening areas that will have the least impact on our students. It will not be an easy task but I am confident that together we will emerge stronger than ever. At this time, I am asking all of our staff for suggestions they may have on economies we can make in the coming fiscal year. Your ideas would be most welcome, as well. The bottom line is that next year's budget will be the most transparent ever. Now, more than ever, you have the right and the

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
need to know where our dollars are going. Together, we will demonstrate that, despite difficult times, we will not let our children down. We can and will persevere.
