Victor Touts Leading Education Technologies

If you walked by Mr. Dahlstrom's High School Science class during a quiz recently, you might have thought his students looked more like the audience of the popular game show, "Who Wants To Be A Millionaire," holding up hand held devices as if they were locking in the million dollar answer. The truth is they were locking in an answer, but not to a game show question, but rather, to a science question.

Eric Dahlstrom is just one of several teachers on the Victor campus using a wireless Student Response System (SRS). This new hand-held technology gives new meaning to test taking by allowing students to physically lock in answers to questions projected onto an overhead screen via a computer.

Test taking is not all SRS is used for. With the help of special software, Dahlstrom is able to create reviews and even incorporate picture answers when appropriate. He says the system is flexible on many levels. It can be teacher led, which gives teachers the power to set the pace of content, or student-paced, which lets students maneuver through material at their own speed.

Other system features include instant feedback on how students answer questions.

VCS Superintendent Announces Retirement Plans

Board Of Education Begins Search For New Leader



At the January Board of Education meeting Superintendent Timothy J. McElheran announced his plans to retire effective January 27, 2009. McElheran, who has been at the helm of Victor Schools since July, 1998, has been a leading force behind many district-wide changes.

In the 10 years since Mr. McElheran was named Victor's Superintendent, the district's student population has grown by more than 30 percent and the districts facilities have expanded to meet not only the 1,000 additional students influx, but numerous world-class educational programs.

The Board of Education describes Mr. McElheran as: "a man of great vision and character whose commitment to excellence is paramount. The enormous positive impact Tim has made on our school continues to be measured by the thousands of student lives he has touched. Victor has become a destination school district under Tim's guidance. Our com-

munity has been most fortunate to have his leadership for 10+ years."

Filling McElheran's shoes will not be an easy task. The process for finding a new Superintendent is already underway. The Board of Education shared a projected Search Timeline at its March 6 meeting. A community forum outlining the attributes/qualities of the next Superintendent will be held on April 8. Community Vote Slated for May 20

The month of March has been a busy one for the Board of Education, teachers, administrators and community members as they reviewed individual elements of the budget in three separate sessions. Among the topics covered during these special meetings were Buildings and Grounds, Transportation, School and Community Relations, Technology, Pupil Personnel Services, Athletics and Enrollment. Business Manager, Mike Vistocco told the Board that an increase in student enrollment was a key driver in the new budget. Victor's student population is projected to grow by nearly 100 - a trend begun a decade ago.

Face of VCS Board of Education to Change

Two 3-year terms and one 2-year term on the Victor Central School Board of Education will be decided at the May 20, 2008 district budget vote. Board member James Dailey resigned from his post earlier this month opening

up the two-year term position. Board President, Stephen Martin and Board member Kenneth Weigert will complete their current terms in June. Board of Education candidates are nominated by petition. Victor Primary School Students Explore Saudi Arabia

Through a Teacher's Journey

Michele Linse may have returned from the Kingdom of Saudi Arabia last November but her journey continues today in the classroom.

This Victor Primary School Teacher Librarian was one of 25 teachers nationally who was chosen to participate in a two week Educators to Saudi Arabia Program. For two weeks Linse immersed herself in the Saudi culture, meeting with students, teachers and business women, eating exotic foods and touring storybook landscapes. Linse says her experiences gave her a brand new perspective of this faraway place, a view that she hopes her Primary students will embrace.

And, it seems they already are.

Whether they are listening intently to stories of the cultural differences of separation of genders and clothing, or simply exploring the brass trinkets, books, prayer rug, Koran and other treasures she carried back in a suitcase to share with them — "They especially love the candy," she said. — Linse has managed to build an educational bridge of sorts between two distinctly different worlds.

"When students can see pictures of me in this distant land, it brings it all to life," Linse said.

While VPS students' view on Saudi Arabia is clearer and closer than it ever was before, there is still more to learn. Linse said one VPS student likened her abaya – a woman's traditional full-length black robe to that of a Ninja. A Ninja, it is not, but now, thanks to Michele Linse's Arabian journey, they know this.

VHS's Foreign Exchange Students and Resident Host Students Learn from Each Other

Jou already "met" two of our foreign exchange students —Stan Wang and Puttipath (Arm) Tasnavites — in our January 2008 magazine. Now we would like introduce the remaining three.

Much like Stan and Arm, they speak different languages and espouse different cultures, but when they are placed together in the same room, all of their differences seem to fade away. They all laugh. They all learn. They all see the world through the eyes of a teenager.

Victor's foreign exchange students may come from such faraway lands as Thailand, China and Germany, but as they, along with their Victor counterparts have discovered, some of life's greatest lessons do not come from books. They come from each other.

Monika Prokesova comes to Victor Central Schools from the Czech Republic through the Rotary International Foreign Exchange program. Although this 17-year old student says communication has been the most challenging thing about being here,

that has not stopped her from making lots of new American friends. One of those friends is 16 year old junior, Lindsay Manning. What have they learned from each other?

Prokesova says she has learned how enjoyable school can be. "In the Czech Republic we only study. Here, it is very fun

and the classes are much more diverse."

As for Manning's discoveries on Monika's culture; "In history, Monika taught us that the Czech Republic is equivalent to the size of New York City. The other thing that I have learned is how much more lenient American students are than students in the Czech Republic. We can do so much more here."

Transportation is the biggest issue 17-year old

Qian Yu (Susy Q.) faces in America. Susy, who comes from China through AFS, is used to being more mobile. "Back home I take buses, subways and taxis everywhere. Here, teens rely much more on their parents." The other distinction Susy makes about life at VHS is how much more exciting school is here compared to China. "In China, there are not as many classes to choose from. Here, I also get home earlier. Back home, I go to school from 7:10 a.m. until 6:00 p.m. each day. "Susy's new VHS friends, 15-year old Maddie Rochford and 15-year old Alisa Johnson have a new appreciation for Victor Schools. "Students in China don't have as many options as we have here at VHS," Rochford says. Alisa Johnson says she also prefers our dress code. "In China, they have to wear uniforms to school everyday!"

Seventeen year old Rici Grewe, an AFS student from Germany has one pet peeve -- keys! "Keys in America work differently than they do in Germany. They turn in the opposite direction!" > kidding aside, Rici loves life at VHS, even though she finds the curriculum difficult at times. "School here is very hard. You have VERY high standards here but I am learning a lot and am on the high honor roll." Grewe, who was on the indoor track team until she hurt her leg, is intrigued by American sports, especially football. Similar to Susy O. Grewe also thinks that students here are much more dependent on their parents for transportation. "In Germany, I use trains and subways and go everywhere by myself."

The lack of public transportation has not stopped Rici and her new VHS friend, 17-year old Erin Thomas from having fun. "Rici and I go to a lot of birthday parties together or just hang out and talk." Thanks to Rici, Thomas says she has learned a lot about the German culture, in particular about the foods they eat, such as tea and chocolate.







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While students can not see how they have performed on an individual basis, teachers can choose to post percentages of how the class performs on questions. Says Dahlstrom, this feature not only gives

instructors the power to score students on demand, it offers them the knowledge they need to determine whether they should spend more time reviewing a topic or move on. For students this instant scoring feature creates an element of excitement and healthy classroom competition.

Dahlstrom, who separates his classroom into groups named after famous scientists, says his students, each of whom have a designated SRS or clicker number, love this new interactive learning tool because it offers variety and makes material more active and interesting.

The Student Response System isn't the only new technology Victor teachers are using to make classroom learning more interactive and interesting. Another highly popular technology being in many campus classrooms is the SMART BoardTM.

VIS fifth and sixth grade teachers Kylie Rohr and Kristen McAllian are just a few VCS teachers leading the way with this new interactive white board technology. Similar to SRS, teachers use SMART BoardTM software to create and record interactive lessons. Whether they use the software to produce general lessons or quizzes—their material is then projected onto the SMART BoardTM screen using their laptops.

This is when the real magic begins.

Rohr says a variety of hands-on SMART BoardTM manipulative tools allow you to do things you could not do otherwise, especially when it comes to math and science. For example, digital markers and highlighters allow teachers and

students to write, draw and highlight information, while a magnifier unveils hidden answers to questions. From measuring items using an interactive ruler, to moving, flipping and even weighing objects, the SMART BoardTM gives learning a literal depth and dimension that cannot be found in a text book.

Second grade teacher, Carolyn Harper says that when she uses SMART BoardTM the students are "all eyes."


"You can almost see them thinking in their heads the entire time," she said.

"This technology not only engages the children, it challenges them. They have even become good at troubleshooting the technology if it is not working properly," she added with a smile.

Rohr's and McAllian's student responses are similar. "The kids are very excited and it makes present-




Eric Dahlstrom's High School Science class.

ing lessons more exciting. It is definitely all Wows and Whoas when we pull out the SMART BoardTM," Rohr said.

In a world of the endless internet, Wiis and Xbox 360s, it is safe to say that education today is not just about teaching, it is also about reaching a new generation of techno savvy students on platforms that they can relate to - mediums that motivate and inspire them to learn. With technology like the Student Response System and SMART BoardTM, VCS is doing more than teaching. We are reaching out to this next generation of "digital natives."

Kindergarten Registration



Children who turn five on or before December 1, 2008 are eligible to register for Kindergarten.

The following documents are required at time of registration:

- Original birth certificate. (Copies of baptismal certificates can not be accepted as proof of age.)
- Immunization records signed by a doctor.
- Proof of residency. (e.g., driver's license, utility bill, lease agreement, letter of intent.)
- This is also a good time to provide a complete dental examination for your child. Proof of a dental examination will be required in September. If you need assistance in securing dental care for your child, please contact the school nurse.
- Proof of a physical exam will be required to begin classes in September, 2008. This physical must have taken place between September 1, 2007 and September 1, 2008. For more information, contact the VECEC main office at 924-3252, ext. 6410.

Required Immunizations for Kindergarten Registration

Students who will be starting school in September, 2008 are required to have the following immunizations:

- 3 doses of diphtheria toxoid (usually DTP, DT, Td or DTaP
- 3 doses of OPV (or 4 doses of IPV or 3 doses of elPV
- 3 doses of live measles virus vaccine after the age of 12 months (given as MMR #1 and MMR #2)
- 1 dose of live mumps vaccine after the age of 12 months (given as MMR#1)
- 1 dose of live rubella virus vaccine after the age of 12 months (given as MMR#1)
- 3 doses of Hepatitis B
- 1 dose of varicella or proof from health care provider of having had chicken pox disease (varicella)

The Psychology of Video Games

Video games get a bad rap. So says MIT Professor, Henry Jenkins in his recently published article Reality Bytes: Eight Myths about Video Games Debunked.

The perception that video games promote violence and create anti-social behavior is unsubstantiated, says Jenkins. On the contrary, research suggests that good quality video games backed by healthy parental guidance and monitoring offer many benefits to kids. According to the Media Awareness Network, they provide an enjoyable and social form of entertainment, encourage teamwork, increase children's self-confidence, develop skills in reading, math and problem-solving and improve hand-eye coordination.

It is these positive attributes that the district's pupil services staff are tapping into thanks to the donation of multiple video gaming systems by one generous VIS parent who recognized the benefits of this technology at home with his own children. Thanks to this community donor, who wishes to remain anonymous, staff have been using Wii and X-Box systems as adjuncts since December of 2006.

From teaching social skills and learning how to handle frustration to becoming versed in paying a compliment, problem solving and organizing, VIS school pyschologist Mark Behan says the use of video games has been very successful.

While the staff still uses a variety of other traditional activities, Behan says the kids absolutely love the gaming alternative.

Powerful Parent Tips for Video Games

- Limit video game playing time. Recommendation: no more than 1 hour.
- Use Ratings. Do not your children play age-inappropriate games.
- Check KidScore for parentgenerated reviews at www.mediawise.org
- Rent a game to preview it before buying.
- Avoid ultra violent first person shooters.
- Do Not Put consoles in bedrooms.
- Talk about game content.
- Require that homework and chores be done before game playing.
- Learn about parental controls and use them.


